LETTER FROM TEXAS ATTORNEY GENERAL GREG ABBOTT

December 9, 2005

The journey of life takes us down many pathways. For too many Texans, violent crime means an unexpected detour, a shattering experience that brings days filled with the challenge of simply getting their lives back on the right path. That is why I find it so inspiring to see victims and family members who go beyond their pain and their struggles to help others.

This year, I was honored to help People Against Violent Crime (PAVC) plant a tree at the State Capitol to honor crime victims during Crime Victim Rights Week. PAVC was started by Nell Myers after the senseless murder of her daughter. Nell committed herself to helping other crime victims by supporting legislation that became the Texas Crime Victims' Compensation Act and created the Compensation to Victims of Crime Fund. Many believe that Nell's testimony before the Legislature was a turning point in the legislative process. Nell stated, "I don't want another mother, the day after she finds out her daughter was murdered, to have to go to the bank to borrow the money for her burial." Last year, we paid more than \$5 million for funeral and burial costs, helping nearly 1,400 families.

Without courageous advocates like Nell Myers, many victims and their families might not have had the Compensation to Victims of Crime Fund to assist them in their time of need. During Fiscal Year 2005, we received 37,892 applications and awarded more than \$85 million in benefits. In addition, our Crime Victim Services Division provided more than \$36 million in grants to organizations that help victims with emergency shelter, counseling, court accompaniment, and other direct services for healing and recovery.

None of this would be possible without the vision and help of the Texas Legislature. In 2005, the Legislature took important steps to make sure the Compensation to Victims of Crime Fund remains solvent. Long-term solutions are still needed if victims are to stay on a path to recovery, but we are making significant progress. I look forward to continuing the dialogue between the Office of the Attorney General and the Legislature to ensure that the Compensation to Victims of Crime Fund is healthy and available for the next generation of Texans who are in need of assistance.

Few things in life are more challenging than being a victim of violent crime, and few things take more courage than walking the path of a survivor. In years to come, people will walk a path to that tree on the Capitol grounds – Nell Myers' tree. It will always symbolize the commitment and dedication of victims and advocates who help us overcome the obstacles along life's pathways.



REVENUE SOURCES

The Crime Victims' Compensation Program (CVC) is supported through a legislative appropriation from the Compensation to Victims of Crime Fund (the Fund). The passage of the Crime Victims' Compensation Act in 1979 reflected the Legislature's intent for the Fund to assist innocent victims of violent crime and to encourage greater public cooperation in the investigation and prosecution of criminals. The Fund represents public policy at its best - revenue for the Fund is collected from offenders through criminal court costs, fees, fines, and restitution then made available for victims of violence most in need.

State Court Costs - The Fund receives 37.6338% of all consolidated court costs submitted to the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts by local governmental entities for felony and misdemeanor convictions. Conviction Fee by type of conviction*:

Felony Conviction	\$133
Misdemeanor Conviction punishable by imprisonment or fine of more than \$500	
Misdemeanor Conviction punishable by imprisonment or fine of \$500 or less	\$40

Federal VOCA Grant - The federal Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) allows the collection of fines, fees and forfeitures for federal convictions. Passed in 1984, VOCA has awarded grants to the Texas Crime Victims' Compensation Program since 1986. These grants are made on the basis of a formula that gives each state 60 percent of the state's funds paid to victims two years prior.

Restitution - Offenders may be ordered to reimburse the Fund for compensation payments made on behalf of their victims. CVC staff provides local prosecutors with information on the amount of money that has been paid on behalf of victims so that reimbursement to the Fund can be included in restitution orders. Recent changes to the laws governing restitution will now allow for a one-time fee of \$12 to be assessed on an offender who pays restitution in installments. Half of this fee is deposited into the Fund.

A judge may require offenders to pay a one-time probation fee of up to \$50 for misdemeanors and up to \$100 for felonies to the Fund. Prior to September 1, 2005, this fee was deposited into the General Revenue Fund.

Parolee Supervision Fee - Offenders on parole for crimes that occurred after September 1, 1993 pay \$8 per month to the Fund. The state's parole officers are to be credited for their efforts to collect these fees from parolees.

Donations - Jurors are provided information about the Fund and are offered the option of donating their daily reimbursement to the Fund.

Subrogation - When a crime victim is awarded money in a settlement or a civil suit, the Attorney General shall ask that the victim or claimant reimburse the Fund the amount paid on behalf of the victim, up to the amount of the civil award.

CRIME VICTIMS' COMPENSATION PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Crime Victims' Compensation Program (CVC) is administered by the Office of the Attorney General and is dedicated to ensuring that victims of violent crime are provided financial assistance for crime related expenses that cannot be reimbursed by insurance or other sources.

The Crime Victims' Compensation Program is "the payer of last resort" after primary sources of payment such as health insurance, Medicaid, Medicare, auto insurance, or Texas Worker's Compensation. CVC program staff assists applicants in coordinating the utilization of all available resources.

TO BE ELIGIBLE a person must:

- Be a U.S. resident with the crime occurring in Texas or a Texas resident who becomes a victim in a state or country without a compensation program;
- Report the crime to a law enforcement agency within a reasonable period of time but not so late as to interfere with or hamper the investigation and prosecution of the crime; and
- File an application for CVC within three years of the date of the crime

TO QUALIFY a person must:

- Be a victim of crime who suffers physical or emotional harm or death
- Be a dependent of a victim
- Be an authorized individual acting on behalf of a victim
- · Assume the obligations or voluntarily pay certain expenses related to the crime on behalf of the victim
- Be an immediate family or household member related by blood or marriage who requires counseling as a result of the crime
- Be a peace officer, fire fighter, or individual who has a duty to protect the public and who is injured as a result of a violent crime

BENEFITS:

Financial assistance may be limited or unavailable depending on the laws in effect when the crime occurred and is dependent upon the applicant providing necessary and required documentation. Claims may be approved for benefits up to a total of \$50,000 for crimes occurring on or after September 1, 1997. Individuals who suffer total and permanent disability as a result of the crime may qualify for an additional \$75,000, which may be used for specific and limited expenses such as lost wages, prosthetics, rehabilitation, or modifications for making a home or automobile wheelchair accessible. Benefits may be awarded for:

- · Medical, hospital, physical therapy or nursing care
- Psychiatric care or counseling
- One-time relocation assistance for a victim of family violence or a victim of sexual assault who is assaulted in the victim's place of residence
- Loss of support
- Loss of wages and travel reimbursement for participation in or to attend investigative, prosecutorial, or judicial proceedings; to seek medical treatment or counseling; or to attend the funeral of a deceased victim (bereavement leave)
- Funeral and burial expenses
- Care of a child or dependent
- · Crime scene clean-up
- Items seized by law enforcement
- Attorney fees

APPLYING FOR COMPENSATION:

Law enforcement agencies and prosecutor's offices in Texas are mandated to provide victims of crime with information about the Crime Victims' Compensation Program. Applications are also available at hospitals and non-profit agencies who work with crime victims.

Applications in English and Spanish can be obtained directly from the Crime Victims' Compensation Program. CVC staff is available to help victims and their families access this program.

 - \$360.30 was the average amount awarded per sexual assault exam reimbursement







Awards may be made in the following categories for necessary expenses related to the crime, up to the maximum award in effect on the date of the crime. Benefits for crimes occurring before September 1, 1997, have a \$25,000 maximum award. For crimes occurring on or after September 1, 1997, awards on any one claim may not exceed \$50,000. Victims who have suffered a catastrophic injury may be eligible for additional benefits as listed below:

Medical expenses related to the crime are paid using established guidelines. Benefits may be paid for hospitals, doctors, ambulance services, prescriptions, dental work, nursing homes, and medical appliances, such as wheelchairs and prosthetics.

Mental Health Care in a hospital facility may be available to a victim for a maximum of 30 days at a rate of \$600 per day. Victims and claimants may receive outpatient counseling from a licensed provider up to a maximum of \$3.000.

Lost Wages may be paid to a victim who is unable to work as a result of physical or mental injuries related to the crime. Lost wages may also be awarded when a victim takes time from work to seek medical treatments for injuries related to the crime or when the victim or claimant takes part in the criminal justice process (other than testifying). The award maximum is \$500 per week.

Travel expenses may be reimbursed for costs related to seeking medical treatment, counseling and for costs associated with the victim's or claimant's participation in or attendance at investigative, prosecutorial, judicial, or post adjudication proceedings. Mileage is covered for travel of more than 20 miles one way. The actual costs of commercial transportation, food, and lodging are paid for travel of more than 60 miles one way. Additionally, expenses for travel to the funeral or memorial for a victim (who died as a result of criminally injurious conduct committed on or after September 1, 2003) may be paid for certain family or household members.

Child/Dependent Care expenses may be covered if the expense is new and a direct result of the crime. Pre-existing child care costs are not reimbursable. For dates of crime occurring on or after May 8, 2005, child care benefits for dependent(s) of a surviving victim may be limited to a maximum of 90 days. The award is paid at the actual cost of care, not to exceed \$100 per week, per dependent or minor child in a licensed day care facility or provider.

Funeral and Burial expenses include reimbursement for professional burial services, flowers, caskets, urns and grave markers. The maximum award on these costs is \$4,500. The costs for transporting the body to another state or country are eligible costs in addition to the \$4,500 award.

Loss of Support benefits are available to dependents of homicide victims. Payments are based on the victim's salary, and the maximum is \$500 per week. Loss of support is also available to dependents of victims (usually in family violence cases) for 90 days.

Crime Scene Clean-Up costs must relate to the removal of crime scene elements that may cause further trauma to the victim or family members. The reimbursement is limited to \$750.

Evidence Replacement awards may be made for items that have been seized by law enforcement for use in the investigation or prosecution of a case or items seized and damaged during evidence collection. The maximum award for this expense is \$750.

Relocation expenses are available as a one-time award of up to \$3,800 (\$2000 for relocation expenses and \$1,800 for rental assistance). This benefit provides victims of family violence and victims of sexual assault (in their residence) with funds to pay for moving expenses, utility deposits, moving vans, and rent.

Catastrophic Injuries are those that create a total or permanent disability for the victim. An additional award of \$25,000 (for crimes occurring before September 1, 1997), \$50,000 (for crimes occurring September 1, 1997 to August 31, 2001), or \$75,000 (for crimes occurring on or after September 1, 2001) may be used to pay for items that directly assist the victim, such as lost wages, making a home or vehicle accessible, job training and vocational rehabilitation, home health care, or training in the use of special appliances.

Bereavement Leave is available for dates of crime on or after September 1, 2003, to immediate family or household members of the deceased victim at the time of the crime. The reimbursement is limited to 10 days up to a maximum of \$1,000.

Attorney Fees may be paid for legal services related to the Crime Victims' Compensation process. Attorney fees are paid only if the victim is awarded compensation. Those fees are limited to the lesser of \$300 or 25 percent of awarded benefits. If the claim is appealed, the attorney may be entitled to 25 percent of the amount the attorney assisted the victim or claimant in obtaining.

Emergency Awards may be requested if a victim or claimant would suffer undue harm or hardship if an award is not expedited. The award limit is \$1,500 and will be deducted from any future awards.







CVC FUND HISTORY & HIGHLIGHTS

In 1979, the Texas Legislature passed the Crime Victims'
Compensation Act, which created the Compensation to Victims
of Crime Fund (Fund) and the Crime Victims' Compensation
Program (CVC). The primary purpose of the Fund is to encourage
greater victim participation in the apprehension and prosecution of
criminals, and to reimburse innocent victims for certain out-of-pocket
expenses incurred as a result of the crime.

CVC was initially administered by the Texas Industrial Accident Board, later known as the Workers' Compensation Commission. The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) performed the limited role of investigating claims. In 1991, the entire program and staff were moved to the OAG and the Crime Victims' Compensation Division was created.

CVC's ability to provide financial assistance to crime victims has always been related to the solvency of the Fund. The majority of the revenue for the Fund comes directly from convicted offenders in the form of court costs and other fees. In early 1993, the financial soundness of the Fund was jeopardized when requests for victim compensation exceeded the amount of funds that had been accrued from court costs and fees. As a result, CVC reduced compensation payments to service providers by 40%. In 1993, the Legislature passed a bill that increased the amount of court costs and fees going into the Fund. Within one year, CVC was financially able to reimburse victim service provider payments at 100%. As a result of the increase in court costs and fees, the Fund balance began to increase – exceeding the amount of payments to victims – resulting in a surplus.

In 1997, the Fund became a constitutionally dedicated account to be used only for the purpose of providing victim-related compensation or assistance. In addition, the Legislature amended the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure to authorize the OAG to use monies appropriated from the Compensation to Victims of Crime Fund for grants and contracts supporting victim related services or assistance. During this time, the Fund continued to experience exceptional revenue growth. As the balance in the Fund began to increase, the Legislature expanded compensation benefits offered to crime victims and increased the maximum award amount on claims. As a result, CVC offered benefits for catastrophic injuries, crime scene clean-up, as well as relocation expenses for victims of family violence and sexual assault in their residence.

In 2001, the Legislature appropriated funds to the OAG for the purpose of providing grants to a broad range of victim-related service organizations. Victim services such as domestic violence shelters, rape crisis centers, hotlines, victim advocacy, education, assistance with CVC applications and other victim-related services were available as a result of these

partnerships and grants. The ability to offer grants to victim service providers reflected the intent of the Fund by continuing to expand the types of services and benefits offered to victims of crime. However, beginning with the 2000-2001 biennium, legislative appropriations from the Fund began to exceed revenues, causing concern about whether the Fund would remain solvent.

In January of 2004, Attorney General Abbott convened a diverse group of Texas' leading victim advocates, representing thousands of crime survivors, for their suggestions and recommendations to help protect and ensure the solvency of the Fund. Their objective was to develop recommendations that addressed the needs and concerns of all types of crime victims throughout the state of Texas. In January of 2005, General Abbott submitted recommendations on their behalf to the Legislature.

The Legislature acted on these and other recommendations by passing legislation that will increase Fund revenue in years to come. Specifically, changes to the laws governing restitution will now emphasize that the Fund is an eligible recipient of court-ordered restitution, allowing for a court to order an offender to pay restitution directly to the Fund for any amounts paid from the Fund on behalf of a victim. Another change to the laws governing restitution will allow for a one-time fee of \$12 to be assessed on an offender who pays court ordered restitution in installments. The Fund will receive \$6 and the court that assessed the fee will retain the remaining \$6. The new fee takes effect January 1, 2006. Legislation was also passed that requires certain counties and municipalities to implement a court cost collection program to increase the collection rate of outstanding court costs and fees. Because these fees are the main source of Fund revenue, this change in the law will have a meaningful impact on the Fund. While the changes made in the 2005 session represent a positive change, much more still needs to happen to ensure the long term solvency of the fund.

As we conclude another fiscal year of providing victim compensation, victim benefits, and grants for victim-related services and assistance, we realize that the ability to continue providing these services depends heavily on the Texas Legislature. Without their continued support, the solvency of the Fund would remain in jeopardy. We look forward to working with the Legislature to continue providing much needed assistance to those most in need — victims of violent crime.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In cooperation with the Texas Legislature, the Office of the Attorney General (OAG) provides vital support to victims of crime through grants and contracts awarded to numerous local and statewide victim assistance programs throughout Texas. These awards demonstrate the continued commitment of the Office of the Attorney General to cultivating a compassionate environment where the needs of crime victims are promptly identified and effectively met in large and small communities. Working in partnership with local agencies and non-profit organizations dedicated to these values, the OAG continues to focus on minimizing the physical and emotional trauma experienced by children and adults who are victimized by criminal activity. The fiscal support provided by the OAG helps to empower communities to develop strong local networks reflective of the needs of their respective crime victim populations.

The Texas Code of Criminal Procedure, Article 56.541, authorizes the OAG to use monies appropriated from the Compensation to Victims of Crime Fund for grants and contracts supporting victim-related services or assistance. The OAG administers the following eight victim assistance grant programs as authorized by the Legislature:

- Other Victim Assistance Grants (OVAG)
- Victim Coordinator and Liaison Grants (VCLG)
- Sexual Assault Prevention and Crisis Services Programs (SAPCS)
- Statewide Automated Victim Notification System (Texas VINE)
- Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA)
- Children's Advocacy Centers (CAC)
- Crime Victim Civil Legal Services Grants (CVCLS)
- Sexual Assault Services Program Grant (TAASA)

In Fiscal Year 2005, the OAG awarded \$36,441,598 to organizations that provide vital victim services in the state of Texas. In addition, the OAG used a total of \$1,922,083 (5.0%) in administrative costs for the oversight and administration of these grants. These direct and indirect administrative costs include salaries, travel, operating expenses and the costs associated with audit and monitoring activities performed by CPA firms to ensure compliance with state and federal guidelines.

AUDIT AND OVERSIGHT ACTIVITIES

All programs are carefully monitored to ensure the effective use of dollars awarded to the local and statewide programs. To achieve 100% audit and oversight of the OVAG, VCLG, and SAPCS grantees, the OAG conducted one or more of the following:

- OAG program staff monitored monthly invoices, financial status and program performance reports.
- External CPA firms conducted financial and programmatic monitoring using agreed upon procedures.
- The Internal Audit Division of the OAG performed desk audit reviews of some local programs using agreed upon procedures.
- OAG program staff monitored programs on site and provided technical assistance.



OTHER VICTIM ASSISTANCE GRANTS

One evening, a young woman was ordered to perform household chores by her abuser. When she did not respond fast enough, the abuser burned her face with an iron. She suffered first and second degree burns to half of her face. The victim fled her home. After enduring many years of physical and emotional abuse, she finally found safety at The Family Place, an emergency shelter. An advocate at the shelter helped the victim receive treatment from a local burn unit for her physical injuries, as well as crisis counseling, information and referrals. financial assistance for her medical treatments. and a safe place to live. Since her admission to the shelter, the victim has gained confidence and selfesteem. Her face is healing and she is now eager to seek housing and new employment away from her abuser.

THE PURPOSE

The purpose of the Other Victim Assistance Grant (OVAG) program is to support services that address the unmet needs of victims of violent crime.

GUIDELINES FOR SELECTION

The OVAG program rules and regulations are set forth in the Texas Administrative Code, Title I, Part 3, Chapter 60. The OAG awards OVAG funds through a competitive application process. Eligible applicants must be a governmental entity or maintain legal status as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. To be considered for funding, applicants must demonstrate within their grant proposals an ability and willingness to effectively provide direct victim services. Other vital services for which funding is allowed, in addition to direct victim services, include:

- · Victim services training
- Public Awareness regarding victim assistance
- · Emergency funds for victims
- Other support for victim services as determined by the OAG

Applications were carefully evaluated and scored in FY 2004 by a team of internal OAG staff. Scoring was based on information and documentation provided by the applicants, including a description of project activities, project objectives and outcomes, and proposed project budgets. Continued funding for FY 2005 was granted after a review of each program's prior year performance. The OAG evaluated the programmatic and financial performance of all grantees.

AWARDS

For FY 2005, the OAG awarded 203 grants totaling \$10,585,177. These grants went to a variety of non-profit organizations and local government entities committed to providing crime victim services throughout Texas.

SUMMARY OF REPORTS AND EFFECTIVENESS

OVAG-funded programs served 52,563 victims of crime. These victims received 38,251 hours of therapy and 40,435 advocacy services during FY 2005. Additionally, victims received assistance with applying for Crime Victims' Compensation in 11,182 instances and information about victims' rights and available community resources in 67,977 instances.

VICTIM COORDINATOR & LIAISON GRANTS

The family of a homicide victim traveled from Brownsville to Midland to meet with a counselor and the Crime Victim Liaison with the Midland Police Department. The family had not received details about the murder, so the Victim Services Office sensitively disclosed new and difficult information about the crime committed against their loved one. Lodging was provided in a nearby hotel so the family could rest and be accessible for information. The Crime Victim Liaison worked closely with the victim's wife to submit a CVC application and with a funeral home in Brownsville to initiate the process of having the husband's body transported back to Brownsville.

THE PURPOSE

The purpose of the Victim Coordinator and Liaison Grants (VCLG) is to support statutorily required Victim Coordinator/Liaison positions for local law enforcement agencies and prosecutor offices. The law enforcement liaisons and prosecutor coordinators funded by these grants provide direct services to victims of crime by assisting with crime victim compensation and other statutory rights.

GUIDELINES FOR SELECTION

The VCLG program rules and regulations are set forth in the Texas Administrative Code, Title I, Part 3, Chapter 60. The OAG awards VCLG funds through a competitive application process for the provision of direct services to victims of crime.

Applications were carefully evaluated and scored in FY 2004 by a team of internal OAG staff. Scoring was based on information and documentation provided by the applicants, including a description of project activities, project objectives and outcomes, and proposed project budgets. Continued funding for FY 2005 was granted after a review of each program's prior year performance. The OAG evaluated the prior year's programmatic and financial performance of all grantees.

AWARDS

For FY 2005, the OAG awarded 64 VCLG grants totaling \$2,341,280. These grants went to:

- 47 Prosecutor's Offices
- 11 Police Departments
- 6 Sheriff's Offices

SUMMARY OF REPORTS AND EFFECTIVENESS

VCLG funded programs served 24,077 victims of crime in FY 2005. These victims received 6,678 crisis intervention services and 16,321 advocacy services. Additionally victims received assistance with applying for Crime Victims' Compensation in 5,440 instances, help with completion of victim impact statements in 4,332 instances, and information about victims' rights and available community resources in 35,773 instances.

SEXUAL ASSAULT PREVENTION & CRISIS SERVICES GRANTS

Sara was sexually assaulted at her school. She was fearful of the perpetrators because they had threatened her and her family, and told her not to report the assault. Despite the threats of retaliation, she did make the report. Though the sexual assault charge was not pursued due to a lack of evidence, the local rape crisis center stepped in to provide short-term individual counseling for Sara at her school. As the counseling progressed, Sara found personal strength through the support and encouragement of the counselor. From feeling overwhelmed. discredited and unheard to resuming control over her life. Sara credits the support of the local rape crisis center for making her recovery a reality.

THE PURPOSE

The purpose of the Sexual Assault Prevention and Crisis Services (SAPCS) grants is to support local and statewide programs that are addressing the problem of sexual assault through direct services, training, and education.

GUIDELINES FOR SELECTION

The SAPCS program rules and regulations are set forth in the Texas Administrative Code, Title I, Part 3, Chapter 62. Funds to local sexual assault programs are awarded via contract with the OAG. To be eligible to receive SAPCS funding, applicants must be a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization or governmental entity that offers the required basic services for at least nine months prior to receiving an award. These basic services include:

- 24-hour hotline
- · Crisis intervention
- · Accompaniment to medical facilities, law enforcement and prosecutor offices
- Public education
- · Professional training
- Volunteer training

Sexual assault programs in good standing are generally refunded each biennium. As funds are available, new programs meeting the above criteria are awarded contracts through a competitive application process. Historically, applications have been scored based on population and geographic area served, demonstrated need for services, and stability of the organization.

AWARDS

In FY 2005, the OAG awarded 81 contracts totaling \$10,318,615:

- 76 contracts were awarded to local sexual assault programs across the state to provide victim services, education and training to communities and professionals, and sexual assault prevention services.
- 1 contract with the Texas Association Against Sexual Assault (TAASA) provided training and technical assistance to local sexual assault programs and supported a statewide public awareness campaign.
- 4 contracts for sexual assault nurse examiners training services.

SUMMARY OF REPORTS AND EFFECTIVENESS

In FY 2005, local sexual assault centers reported providing services to 37,245 survivors in 235 counties. Of these survivors:

- 14.6% were male, 85.3% were female, and for 0.1% the sex was unknown.
- 57.1% were adults; 29.0% were children; and for 13.9% the age was unknown.

These programs also presented 17,631 education and training sessions to 880,637 community members, students, and professionals.

THE PURPOSE

The purpose of the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) program is to train and certify registered nurses to perform medical/forensic exams when a patient indicates he/she has been sexually assaulted. SANEs offer services to sexual assault patients regardless of age or gender. The Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners provide:

- · compassionate and sensitive medical/forensic exams
- timely collection of evidence
- · consistent care
- · referral for follow-up care and counseling

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROCESS

The Office of the Attorney General met with 11 communities in FY 2005 to assist with the development and initiation of Sexual Assault Response Teams (SART). The OAG provides ongoing technical assistance and support to SARTs and encourages cooperative working agreements and monthly meetings. The multidisciplinary groups collaborate to support SANE programs and, in turn, to enhance prosecution. Group members include district attorneys, law enforcement, medical professionals, direct service providers, and advocacy groups. Members of the SART work together to assess community needs and to develop protocols to address the medical, forensic, and legal components of services for sexual assault victims. To date, the OAG has worked with 46 communities to form SARTs.

SANE CERTIFICATION PROCESS

In FY 2005, the OAG provided training in 15 different locations for 145 nurses agreeing to conduct medical/forensic exams in 24 hospitals. To be eligible for SANE training, a registered nurse must be in good standing with the Texas Board of Nurse Examiners for a minimum of two years prior to course participation. The Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner training includes classroom, clinical and courtroom components. The classroom component covers information on current laws specific to sexual assault and evidence collection, symptomology of survivors, needs of special populations, and expert/fact witness preparation. Upon completion of the training requirements, a nurse may apply to the OAG for certification as a Certified Pediatric Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner, a Certified Adult Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner, or dual certification. Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners are originally certified for a period of two years. A SANE may apply for recertification at the end of this period. SANEs are required to provide documentation of continuing education and examinations.

SANEs are a tremendous benefit to their community, providing a valuable service for the prosecution of sexual assault cases and the assistance of sexual assault survivors. After the SANE training, nurses are prepared to deliver comprehensive care to sexual assault survivors, collect forensic evidence, and provide expert testimony in court.



STATEWIDE AUTOMATED VICTIM NOTIFICATION SYSTEM

Texas VINE covers 87 percent of the state's population and 90 percent of the violent crime reported in Texas.

In Houston, the mother of a homicide victim tracks the trial dates of her daughter's accused killer. In Lubbock, a granddaughter checks the bond status of the suspect who victimized her grandfather. In Mission, a pregnant woman requests jail release notification for the two individuals charged with her assault. The Texas VINE system helps make this possible by giving crime victims 24-hour access to county jail and court information.

THE PURPOSE

The primary purpose of the Statewide Automated Victim Notification System (Texas VINE) is to establish and maintain a reliable and efficient system for notifying victims of crime about the status of their offender. The right to be notified of court proceedings upon request is a basic right afforded to victims by the Texas Constitution. The Texas Legislature allocated resources to the OAG to facilitate the implementation of a statewide automated victim notification system. In response, the OAG, through a competitive process, certified Appriss, Inc. to work directly with the Texas counties who seek to participate in the statewide program, Texas VINE.

THE SYSTEM

Texas VINE (Victim Information and Notification Everyday) provides victims and concerned members of the community with up-to-date information about offenders' county jail custody and court status, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year via a single statewide toll-free telephone number 1-877-TX4-VINE.

Information is transferred from participating county databases to the national VINE Communications Center every fifteen minutes. Users register with the Texas VINE service by calling 1-877-TX4-VINE/1-877-894-8463 or by logging on to www.VINElink.com. Registered users are then contacted by phone or email if there is a change in status. Users may also check on status at any time by phone or by linking with the website. Trained operators are available at all times. In FY 2005, Texas VINE received 1,210,613 incoming calls, made 53,086 confirmed notification calls, and registered 59,875 new victims for notification.

FISCAL SUPPORT

The program is completely funded through a legislative appropriation. In FY 2005, the OAG awarded 102 contracts totaling \$3,170.378. The OAG issues original and annual maintenance grant contracts to each participating county for the purpose of funding the program. At the end of FY 2005, 149 counties have elected to participate in this valuable program.

CONTRACT MANAGEMENT

To assure that the certified vendor and the county are functioning within the requirements of the program, the OAG regularly assesses them to verify compliance with standards and protocols. This includes a review and assessment of fiscal and programmatic requirements. Various methods ranging from a desk review to a formal on-site fiscal and program audit are selectively implemented depending on the OAG assessment of risk.



COURT APPOINTED SPECIAL ADVOCATES

In Houston, a CASA volunteer worked tirelessly to find placements for five brothers and sisters, ranging in age from 3 to 11. During that time, seven different case workers were involved in the process, but the CASA worker remained the one constant voice. ensuring the children were not forgotten and that their needs would be met. Today all five children have been permanently placed with relatives and continue to visit regularly with their CASA friend and champion.

THE PURPOSE

The purpose of the Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) grant is to develop and support local CASA programs throughout Texas. CASA programs recruit, train, and provide court-appointed volunteers to advocate for the best interest of abused and neglected children involved in the legal and welfare systems.

GUIDELINES FOR SELECTION

The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) is legislatively directed to contract with a statewide organization with expertise in the dynamics of child abuse and neglect as well as experience in operating volunteer advocate programs that provide training, technical assistance and evaluation services. The designated funds are awarded to Texas CASA, Inc., the statewide membership organization, which then contracts with local programs to provide direct victim services. The Texas Family Code, Chapter 264, Subchapter G, details the eligibility criteria for a local CASA program to receive funds from Texas CASA, Inc., as well as contract requirements. The local programs applying for funds must be a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization operating an advocate program that:

- Uses court appointed volunteers to provide for the needs of abused or neglected children;
- Provides services that encourage permanent placements for abused and neglected children;
- Has provided court-appointed advocacy services for at least two years;
- Provides court-appointed advocacy services to at least ten (10) children each month;
- · Has demonstrated local judicial support; and
- · Has demonstrated fiscal support from the community.

AWARDS

For Fiscal Year 2005, the OAG awarded one contract to Texas CASA, Inc., for \$3,152,145. Texas CASA, Inc., then awarded 59 contracts totaling \$2,639,900 to local CASA programs. The balance of the award was utilized by Texas CASA, Inc., for administrative costs to oversee and support the local CASA programs.

SUMMARY OF REPORTS AND EFFECTIVENESS

For Fiscal Year 2005, local CASA programs provided services to 18,949 children in 196 counties. Two new local CASA programs were developed and six existing programs expanded their service areas to cover additional counties. As a result, 15 new counties were served. These services were provided by 4,636 CASA volunteers. Of the children served, 9,562 were male and 9,387 were female.

- 16,072 reports were provided to the courts on the progress and well-being of children in state care.
- 1,065 volunteers were trained at local CASA programs to provide advocacy services to children in state care.
- 5,378 people received in-service training at local programs.

AUDIT AND OVERSIGHT ACTIVITIES

To ensure accountability for these funds, the following audit and oversight activities were utilized:

- All programs submit Requests for Reimbursement that are reviewed monthly, and a desk audit is performed with each program during the first month of the grant cycle.
- Texas CASA, Inc., conducted 60 on-site quality assurance reviews in FY 2005. These reviews included assessments of the volunteer program, service provision and organizational stability of the local programs.

THE PURPOSE

The purpose of the Sexual Assault Services Program Grant is to provide program development, technical assistance, and training to local sexual assault programs. The grant also provides statewide training for local programs, law enforcement agencies and other victim services groups.

GUIDELINES FOR SELECTION

The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) is legislatively directed to contract with a statewide organization with expertise on the dynamics of sexual assault, developing informational materials and providing training for sexual assault programs and community professional groups. The designated funds are awarded to the Texas Association Against Sexual Assault (TAASA), a membership organization supporting sexual assault crisis intervention and prevention programs throughout the state.

AWARDS

For FY 2005, one grant totaling \$375,000 was awarded to TAASA for the Sexual Assault Services Program activities.

SUMMARY OF REPORTS AND EFFECTIVENESS

For Fiscal Year 2005, TAASA provided training and educational materials to the 76 sexual assault programs funded by the OAG and community professionals working with sexual assault survivors. Training for law enforcement was delivered to 740 participants representing 18 different law enforcement groups. TAASA also hosted a criminal justice conference attended by 300 professionals. TAASA distributed 14,892 fact sheets on a variety of topics concerning issues sexual assault programs must address. Other activities and educational materials provided by TAASA include:

- Created human trafficking and child sexual abuse webpage
- Created human trafficking fact sheets in English, Spanish and Vietnamese
- · Created a human trafficking resource guide
- Updated Spanish language website
- Translated Spiritual Issues brochure into Spanish
- Created cyber-crime fact sheet in English and Spanish
- Created video training components for interviewing adult and adolescent sexual assault survivors
- · Created a cultural competency certificate program for advocates

AUDIT AND OVERSIGHT ACTIVITIES

To ensure accountability for these funds, the following audit and oversight activities were utilized:

- OAG program staff monitored monthly invoices, financial status and program performance reports.
- OAG program staff approved the budget and any budget amendments, and reviewed training and educational materials prepared by TAASA.

ADDITIONAL ACTIVITIES

TAASA joined with the Texas Council on Family Violence to host a conference on human trafficking in May 2005. The conference was attended by 117 staff members from sexual assault and domestic violence programs.



CHILDREN'S ADVOCACY CENTERS OF TEXAS

Two sisters ages 7 and 10 came to the Guadalupe County Children's Advocacy Center because they had been sexually molested by their grandfather. Through the Center, the sisters and their mother are all receiving muchneeded counseling and help with coordination of the younger sister's resulting medical care. The multi-disciplinary team at the CAC, including law enforcement and prosecutors, assisted in securing a conviction to ensure the perpetrator will never again harm these or other children.

THE PURPOSE

The purpose of the Children's Advocacy Centers (CAC) grant program is to develop and support local child advocacy centers that offer a coordinated, multidisciplinary response to cases of suspected child physical and sexual abuse.

GUIDELINES FOR SELECTION

The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) is legislatively directed to contract with a statewide organization with expertise in the establishment and operation of children's advocacy center programs. The designated funds are awarded to Children's Advocacy Centers of Texas, Inc. (CACTX), a statewide membership association that then contracts with local programs to provide direct services. Texas Family Code, Chapter 264, Subchapter E, directs CACTX to contract with eligible centers to enhance services of the local CAC programs. The eligibility requirements for a local CAC program to receive funds from CACTX include:

- A signed memorandum of understanding with the local agencies that investigate or prosecute child abuse cases or deliver services to child abuse victims
- A multidisciplinary team that holds regularly scheduled case reviews
- · A method of statistical information gathering
- An in-house volunteer program
- Other rules pertaining to the management of contracts

AWARDS

For Fiscal Year 2005, the OAG awarded one contract to CACTX for \$3,999,003. CACTX then awarded 59 contracts totaling \$3,459,114 to local CAC programs. The balance of the award was utilized by CACTX for administrative costs to oversee and support the local CAC programs.

SUMMARY OF REPORTS AND EFFECTIVENESS

For Fiscal Year 2005, local CAC programs provided full services in 144 counties and limited services to an additional 106 counties, 35 other states, and 6 other countries. The local CACs provided services to 28,234 children, an increase of 6.7% from last year. Of these, 33% were male and 67% were female.

- 25,803 forensic interviews were conducted.
- 22,679 child abuse cases were reviewed by multidisciplinary teams.
- 18,944 mental health services were provided for alleged child abuse victims and their families.

AUDIT AND OVERSIGHT ACTIVITIES

To ensure accountability for these funds, the following audit and oversight activities were utilized:

- OAG program staff reviewed and approved the budget and any budget amendments, and reviewed and analyzed the performance reports submitted by CACTX. These reports encompass all of the local programs funded through this contract.
- CACTX made 28 on-site quality assurance reviews in FY 2005. Technical assistance visits were made to six (6) additional programs.
- CACTX reviewed the statistical reports submitted by local programs every quarter and closely reviewed and approved requests for reimbursements from the local programs.



CRIME VICTIM CIVIL LEGAL SERVICES GRANTS

Sarah's mother was shot and killed by her abusive exhusband. After the abuser was arrested and ultimately convicted of murder, Sarah sought conservatorship of her two minor brothers, who were left without an appropriate legal guardian. In two separate court actions, Lone Star Legal Aid advocated on Sarah's behalf. As a result, the court named Sarah as sole managing conservator of her two minor brothers and the abuser was restrained from having any access to the boys.

THE PURPOSE

The Crime Victim Civil Legal Services Grants were authorized by the Legislature to increase the availability of free and affordable civil legal services for victims of crime, such as protective orders, housing, disability benefits and other legal assistance.

GUIDELINES FOR SELECTION

The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) entered into an interagency contract with the Texas Supreme Court to support the Crime Victim Civil Legal Services Grants. The Texas Supreme Court contracts with the Texas Equal Access to Justice Foundation (TEAJF) to handle the administrative management of these funds. The requirements for selecting recipient programs are set forth in the Order of the Court establishing TEAJF as the administrator of these funds. To be eligible to apply for these funds, a program must:

- Be a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization;
- Provide victim-related civil legal services to victims, immediate family members of victims or claimants:
- Provide services based on persons meeting certain income eligibility requirements;
- · Maintain open records;
- · Conduct open meetings; and
- Be in compliance with other policies adopted by the Court and Foundation.

TEAJF awards these funds to eligible local programs through a competitive grant application process. TEAJF staff carefully evaluates applicants on their history with TEAJF, including compliance and on-site evaluations, and makes program selection recommendations to the Board of Directors. The Board reviews these recommendations and considers such factors as ability to provide proposed services, underserved populations or areas of the state, and the potential for duplication of services. New applicants make oral presentations to the TEAJF Board of Directors on the organization and the services they propose to provide.

AWARDS

For Fiscal Year 2005, the OAG awarded one contract to the Supreme Court of Texas for \$2,500,000. The Texas Equal Access to Justice Foundation, which administers this program for the Court, then awarded 22 grants totaling \$2,412,500 for crime victim civil legal services in Texas. The balance of the award was utilized by TEAJF for administrative costs to oversee and support the local civil legal service programs. These programs include four grants that provide services statewide and nineteen grants that provide local services.

SUMMARY OF REPORTS AND EFFECTIVENESS

For Fiscal Year 2005, local and statewide programs served 17,968 victims of crime in 203 counties. These funds have continued to cultivate a collaborative environment for the growing network of Legal Aid providers and the victim service agencies. Programs continue to address the growing problem of human trafficking and the extremely diverse services necessary to assist these victims.

AUDIT AND OVERSIGHT ACTIVITIES

To ensure accountability for these funds, the following audit and oversight activities were utilized:

- OAG program staff reviewed financial and programmatic reports submitted on a quarterly basis by the Supreme Court of Texas. These reports encompass the financial expenditures and performance of all the local programs funded through this contract.
- Additionally, all grantees received one or more of the following by TEAJF staff: on-site program monitoring; review of quarterly fiscal and programmatic productivity reports; review of annual audit; and/or review of annual report of services and self assessment.
