Transforming Medicaid

CMS plans to increase quality and lower costs of Medicaid

CMS will be funding state plans for transforming Medicaid to increase quality and lower costs by distributing \$150 million in "transformation grants" over 2007 and 2008. States will research and design ways to transform their Medicaid systems to increase the quality and efficiency of care.

Funds for the Medicaid "transformation grants" were authorized by the Deficit Reduction Act of 2005 and are aimed at state adoption of innovative systems to get more value out of the money they spend providing healthcare to their citizens who are low-income elderly, and children and people with disabilities.

Smoke-Free Ordinance Database Now Available

DSHS Database Provides Texas Information about Smoke-Free Ordinances

The release of a recent U.S. Surgeon General's report concluding that there is no risk-free level of exposure to secondhand smoke has spurred a continuing increase in questions about smoking ordinances across Texas. The report concludes that secondhand smoke causes lung cancer, heart disease, sudden infant death syndrome, low birth weight, asthma, bronchitis, and other serious illnesses and is responsible for tens of thousands of deaths each year in the United States.

On July 26, 2006, DSHS announced the availability of an online database containing information about smoking ordinances in Texas communities. The online database was developed by the University of Houston and funded by the DSHS. The Texas database, available at http://txshsord.coe.uh.edu/, contains the text of ordinances and can be used to compare policies, provide summaries, and compile customized reports.

Questions and Answers

Question: Does THSteps cover my son's physical needed to play high school basketball?

<u>Answer</u>: No, THSteps does not cover physicals for participation in sports activities. If the child is due for a regular THSteps medical check-up at the time the parent requests the sports physical, the provider should do a complete medical check-up, then provide the parent/caregiver with the necessary documentation. If the child is not due for a medical check-up, the request for a sport physical does not meet the requirements for an exception to periodicity.

<u>**Question:**</u> How is a parent's refusal of one or more components of the THSteps medical checkup handled?

<u>Answer:</u> When a parent refuses a specific component or components, the provider should document the refusal in the medical record. The provider should provide education/guidance as to the importance of a complete THSteps checkup, the purpose of the procedure, and the potential risks of refusing and document this in the medical record.

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
