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### Program Objectives

#### Fiscal Year 2003 Objectives

##### Community Health:

- ! Increase the proportion of border communities that have a health improvement plan through the Healthy Border-Healthy *Gente 2010* agenda.

##### Colonias:

- ! Increase the proportion of colonia residents that have adequate drinking water and sanitation facilities by providing EDAP assessments, environmental health education, and by implementing intervention models such as self-help (water and/or wastewater construction projects).

##### Bi-national Coordination:

- ! Increase the number of active bi-national health councils along the Texas-Mexico border.
- ! Develop bi-national communications by connecting the four Mexican states that border Texas through a 1-800 telephone system, electronic mail and Internet access.
- ! Develop bi-national state-to-state work plans to address regional public health issues.

#### **ES #1: Monitor the health status individuals in the community to identify community health problems.**

OBH monitors the health status of residents of the Texas-Mexico border by preparing community health profiles (data collection and analysis) as part of the Healthy Border-Healthy *Gente 2010* initiative. (both)

#### **ES #2: Diagnose and investigate community health problems and community health hazards.**

In coordination with the TDH General Sanitation Division, OBH staff determines the risks to public health by conducting environmental assessments in accordance to Environmentally Distressed Areas Program (EDAP) guidelines. OBH also investigates use of unsafe products and nuisance complaints, as required. (regional offices)

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### **ES #3: Inform, educate, and empower the community with respect to health issues.**

Community health education on water/wastewater issues provided by OBH staff as well as *promotoras* (Community Health Workers - CHWs). Other health education projects are based on special and current issues (e.g., community education campaign addressing inappropriate application of methyl parathion, a restricted use pesticide and a safe drinking water project in Hidalgo County). (regional offices)

### **ES #4: Mobilize community partnerships in identifying and solving community health problems.**

OBH facilitates partnerships between entities at the international, state, and community level to address issues of the U.S.-Mexico border. OBH is working to develop Local Health Advisory Forums for setting local priorities, receiving funds, and implementing programs (both)

**ES #5: Developing policies and plans that support individual and community efforts to improve health.** The OBH central office focuses on inter-agency and legislative relations (i.e., Senate Subcommittee on Border Affairs and HHSC Interagency *Colonias* Initiative) to facilitate border health planning. OBH also works with Mexican public health officials, Sister-city Bi-national Health Councils, and local stakeholders to develop work plans to accomplish Healthy Border 2010 objectives. Particular emphasis is currently being placed on bi-national planning for bioterrorism preparedness. (both)
