Coast Guard Cutters "Mission Complete" in Arabian Gulf

ARABIAN GULF – Coast Guard cutters Boutwell, a 378-foot high endurance cutter homeported in Alameda, Calif., and Walnut, a 225-foot buoy tender homeported in Honolulu, began heading home today after completing their missions in support of Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom.

Both cutters conducted a wide range of missions while serving in the Gulf, including maritime force protection, coastal and terminal security, and maritime interception and marine environmental response. The cutters also assisted in the post-Saddam economic recovery of Iraq by securing vital oil infrastructure and improving the safety of the navigational approach to its only international seaport.

"Without question, the skill and dedication of the crews of Walnut and Boutwell were instrumental to the overall success of our naval forces and underscored the

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importance of the Navy-Coast Guard team," said Vice Adm. Tim Keating, the commander of U.S. Naval Forces Central Command. "The can-do spirit demonstrated by the Coast Guard forces in Operation Iraqi Freedom has solidified their service's character as a maritime, multi-mission, military service and continued its proud history of service to the country in time of conflict."

The Coast Guard's role in Operation Iraqi Freedom represents its largest overseas deployment in support of military operations since the Vietnam War. Cutter Boutwell departed Alameda on Jan. 3 and began operations in the Arabian Gulf on Feb. 14. At one point in the deployment, from Feb. 14 until April 25, the cutter spent 70 days at sea without a port call.

Prior to the start of Operation Iraqi Freedom, Boutwell's crew conducted maritime interception boardings to enforce U.N. sanctions against Iraq. At the outbreak of hostilities and throughout Operation Iraqi Freedom, they operated in the strategically critical and politically sensitive Khawr Abd Allah and Shaat Al Arab Waterways, providing force protection to the massive coalition fleet, securing the Iraqi oil terminals, and preventing the movement of weapons, personnel or equipment by Saddam Hussein's regime or other guerilla or terrorist forces.

The Walnut was originally deployed to the North Arabian Gulf with an oil spill recovery system in the event the regime of Saddam Hussein committed any acts of environmental terrorism. When those threats did not materialize the cutter conducted maritime interdiction operations enforcing U.N. Security Council resolutions, participated in the search for two downed United Kingdom helicopters, and patrolled and provided assistance to captured Iraqi offshore oil terminals being secured by Coast Guard port security personnel.

When the coalition's efforts shifted to humanitarian assistance and economic recovery, the Walnut was ideally suited to provide a valuable service through her aids to navigation capability. The cutter's crew completely replaced 30 buoys and repaired an additional five along the 41-mile Khawr Abd Allah Waterway. This 20-day mission vastly improved the navigational safety of the waterway for humanitarian aid, commercial, and military vessels sailing to the port and was a critical step to economic recovery for the people of Iraq.

Coast Guard Port Security Units from San Pedro, Calif., Port Clinton, Ohio, and Tacoma, Wash., along with four East Coast-based 110-foot patrol boats, remain in the region to provide maritime security in the Northern Arabian Gulf.

The Commandant's Retiree Council met in Washington DC on 7 - 11 April 2003. Our Chairman, RADM Gordon Piche (USCG, Ret.) and Co-Chair MCPOCG Vince Patton (USCG, Ret.) were in attendance along with representatives from various Regional Councils, and experts from DoD, Tricare, and other pertinent guests. The following is a synopsis of discussions and results of a very productive week:

Coast Guard Move to Department of Homeland Security.

The Coast Guard was really "Semper Paratus" when it became apparent that legislation establishing a Department of Homeland Security (DHS) would be enacted. As a result of its advance planning, the Coast Guard moved in tact with all its missions retained. The Commandant is the only DHS agency head reporting directly to Secretary Ridge. Coast Guard members are filling key roles in DHS and the Coast Guard has become the model of "best

practices" for many DHS administrative and support functions. The Commandant told us that over the next two years the Coast Guard will grow by 4,000 people and its budget will increase by 10% per year. The Commandant did say that the Coast Guard will have to be "flexible and responsive" to Secretary Ridge's m a n t r a o f " O n e t e a m , o n e f i g h t ! "

TRICARE and TRICARE for Life. Various briefers provided information showing that TRICARE and TRICARE for Life have matured well over the past year. Earlier problems of untimely claim processing have essentially disappeared. TRICARE for Life beneficiaries have also begun to recognize that they no longer need supplemental medical insurance. There is still some problem with getting eligible beneficiaries to sign up for the required Medicare Part B when they turn 65. The biggest TRICARE issue that surfaced was getting doctors in some areas to accept the TRICARE/Medicare payment rates. There is a wealth of information about TRICARE and TRICARE for Life on the TRICARE WEB site at www.tricare.osd.mil. Individuals with specific TRICARE claim problems may also contact their Coast Guard Health Benefits Advisor at 800-942-2422. In his briefing to us, the Navy's Surgeon General calculated the cost for a family to obtain commercial medical coverage equivalent to TRICARE at more than \$14,000 per year.

Veterans Administration Healthcare. The VA currently has a list of 165,000 veterans waiting for their first appointment at a VA healthcare facility. Because the demand far exceeds VA's current capacity, the agency is considering placing veterans in one of eight categories based on disability and financial need. Most retirees without service-connected disabilities would be in Category 8, which would be the lowest priority for treatment. If this occurs, those retirees who are not already enrolled with VA will have difficulty getting treatment at many VA medical facilities.

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Coast Guard Recruiting. The Commandant told us that retention and recruiting are currently the best they have ever been. As a result, the Coast Guard has adopted a SMART program for recruiting individuals to produce the specific skills and workforce diversity that it needs. The goal is for the Coast Guard to be reflective of the diversity of our country as a whole. Communicating the Coast Guard Message. The Commandant recently published his *Coast Guard Engagement Plan* with a comprehensive strategy for building external relationships and partnerships to communicate and build support for the missions and values of the Coast Guard. Responsibility for engaging government, media and community leaders rests mainly with district and local commanders. The plan recognizes that Reservists, Auxiliarists and Retirees often have unique opportunities to engage local leaders and creates a mechanism for them to work through district and local commanders to do so. Coast Guard Exchange System. The Coast Guard Exchange System has 84 locations and sales of \$125,000,000 per year. It generates more than \$2,500,000 per year for the Coast Guard's morale, welfare and recreation programs. Retirees who don't live near an exchange can place orders through the North Coast Exchange Special Orders Department in Cleveland at 800-242-9157 or access the AAFES catalogue on line at www.cg-exchange.com. Retirees must provide their SSN and DOB when logging on to verify eligibility through DEERS records. All profits from sales to CG members from the AAFES catalogue are returned to the Coast Guard.

Social Security Offset of the Survivor Benefit Plan. Enactment of legislation to eliminate the SBP reduction from 55% to 35% when annuitants reach age 62 is one of the two top 2003 priorities for each of the retiree organizations in the Military Coalition. However, they acknowledge that the cost of eliminating the offset in the current budget climate will make it a difficult sell to both the Congress and the Administration.

Concurrent Receipt of Retired and Disability Payments. A compromise provision in the 2003 Defense Authorization Act eliminated the prohibition against concurrent receipt of retired and disability pay for veterans disabled as a result of combat. To be eligible, disabled veterans must have served 20 years on active duty and either hold a Purple Heart medal with a 10% or higher rating or have a 60% or higher rating for a combat or hazardous duty related disability. While the provision became effective on June 3, 2003, DoD is still writing definitions including what constitutes a "combat related disability." Headquarters estimates that less than 200 Coast Guard retirees will actually be eligible. More details and application procedures appear in pages 5 and 6. The Military Coalition's other top 2003 priority is to eliminate the prohibition for all veterans with rated disabilities. Again, the cost will be a major roadblock.

Retirees Joining the Coast Guard Auxiliary. The Coast Guard Auxiliary has changed and grown dramatically since 9/11. It has prepared and is executing an *Auxiliary Maritime Homeland Security Strategic Plan* with a major focus on providing more boat patrols and augmenting Coast Guard units. The Auxiliary is actively recruiting up to 500 retirees to serve in specific roles consistent with their active duty experience. Retirees won't have to start at Auxiliary boot camp. The Ninth District's "North Coast Retiree Council" has already begun an aggressive program partnering with Auxiliary flotillas. Hopefully this initiative will carry on in other parts of the country.

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Personnel Service Center. (PSC), formerly named HRSIC. During a telephone conference, the CO, XO and *Evening Colors* editor at PSC reaffirmed their commitment to providing the best service to the 38,131 Coast Guard / NOAA retirees and annuitants made up of 20,449 enlisted, 5,691 officers, 4,458 warrant officers, 4,457 annuitants and 4,261 officer and enlisted Reservists. PSC already modified its WEB home page at www.uscg.mil/hq/hrsic at our request to make information for retirees more readily accessible. They will be adding more local/regional retiree features and information to *Evening Colors* and they encourage retirees to read the color version of *Evening Colors* on their WEB site.

Concurrent Receipt for Disabled Veterans **Combat Related Special Compensation**

Combat-Related Special Compensation (CRSC) was authorized by the FY 2003 National Defense Authorization Act (P.L. 107-314, sec. 636) for certain retirees with combat or operations-related disabilities. The details about how the program will be administered have only recently become available.

Eligible Retirees: Must have 20 or more years of active duty service in the Uniformed Services (retired reservists are not eligible unless they have accumulated 7,200 points, equivalent of 20 years for pay, or more). Retirees with less than 20 years active service are not eligible for CRSC. Retirees are not eligible if they have waived military retired pay to credit military service toward their civil service retirement, or for any other reason, other than to receive Department of Veterans Affairs (DVA) disability compensation. DoD expects approximately 35,000 retirees to qualify for the new compensation. (The Coast Guard expects only a minute fraction of this number – perhaps greater than 100 – to qualify under either Purple Heart or Combat-Related criteria.)

Qualifying Disabilities: A combat-related disability associated with the award of a Purple Heart decoration, regardless of the DVA disability rating (10-100 percent). Or, any disability (or combination of disabilities*) with an assigned medical diagnosis code from the DVA Schedule for Rating Disabilities (VASRD) that results in a DVA rating of 60-100% that was incurred either:

- As a direct result of armed conflict (e.g., in a combat setting but not qualifying for a Purple Heart – like breaking a leg by jumping for cover when hearing the warning “Incoming!”)
- While engaged in exceptionally hazardous service (e.g., in the performance of flight, diving, or parachute duties; or other extraordinary operational settings);
- In the performance of duty under conditions simulating war (exercises, field training, combat training);
- Through an instrumentality of war (combat vehicles, weapons, Agent Orange, etc.)

(*Note – only disabilities from the preceding four classifications can be used to meet the 60% or higher combat-related threshold. Disabilities that are not combat-related cannot be combined with combat-related disabilities to meet the 60% criteria.)

For Coast Guard CRSC applicants, the Coast Guard Personnel Command (CGPC-adm-1) will

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determine which disabilities qualify under the above criteria and notify applicants of their decision. CRSC will not be paid for disabilities that are not combat or hazardous duty operations related. Applicants who qualify for CRSC will have their applications forwarded to the Retiree & Annuitant Services Division of the Personnel Service Center (PSC (RAS)) for computation of the actual CRSC payment, which will be included in their monthly Retired Pay, along with any back payments that may be applicable.

Certain disabilities will be presumed to be combat-related when the DVA disability rating form indicates that the DVA rating for the disability is based on one of these presumptions: disabilities rated by the DVA on the basis of exposure to radiation, mustard gas or lewisite, Agent Orange, and those associated with Persian Gulf service. Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) must be evaluated by the member's Service to determine if it is combat-related. Other chronic disabilities that are incurred over time (arthritis; heart, respiratory, or circulatory disabilities; and the like) will typically not be eligible for CRSC.

Application Processing: Eligible retirees must apply for CRSC using the approved application form DD-2860 in accordance with the instructions published on the form. Processing times have not been established, but it is anticipated that there will be a large number of initial applications submitted and the process may take months due to the backlog of records requests at DVA and other records archives. However, payments will be retroactive to June 1, 2003, for those determined to have qualifying disabilities that existed as of that date. Disabled retirees who have qualified for and are in receipt of Special Compensation for Severely Disabled Retirees (SCFSDR) may not receive CRSC unless they waive SCFSDR. (If an applicant is qualified for both SCFSDR and CRSC, PSC (RAS) will pay them the higher of the two entitlements once the retiree has executed a waiver of the lesser.)

TRICARE Complying With Stricter Rules on Healthcare Information

WASHINGTON, April 25, 2003 – TRICARE, like all other healthcare providers nationwide, is working under stricter rules when it comes to protecting patients' rights and the privacy of their health information.

And like its civilian counterparts, the TRICARE Management Activity implemented the privacy portion of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act by the April 14 compliance deadline.

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"Privacy of health information is extremely important to beneficiaries and the TRICARE activity," said Navy Cmdr. Sam Jenkins, TRICARE's HIPAA privacy officer. "The message we're trying to convey is that we're committed to the protection of the privacy of health information. We'll do everything we can to maintain its confidentiality and security."

The act, which Congress passed in 1996 and became Public Law 104-191, was designed to "combat waste, fraud and abuse, improve portability of health insurance coverage, and simplify administration of healthcare," according to a TRICARE brochure issued in January.

The measure affects health plans such as TRICARE, companies that perform electronic billing on behalf of military treatment facilities, physicians, dental clinics, pharmacies and business associates such as managed-care support contractors.

Laws that were already on the books, such as the Privacy Act, have always protected patients' medical information, Jenkins noted. "But what HIPAA does is inform individuals of what their rights are and TRICARE's responsibilities to protect health information, which hasn't been done in the past.

"The Notice of Privacy Practices describes patients' rights under HIPAA clearly and has been provided to beneficiaries in plain language so they can easily understand these rights," Jenkins said. "The act also requires us to have a contact to help patients manage their health information and those rights."

Complying with the new rules meant assigning treatment facility HIPAA privacy officers to assist patients in managing their health information and training nearly 130,000 healthcare professionals and workers worldwide. Implementing HIPAA also includes incorporating policies and procedures at treatment facilities to protect information.

It also included identifying and training more than 500 military treatment facility privacy officers worldwide, developing marketing and training materials and mailing the Notice of Privacy Practices to TRICARE sponsor households.

TRICARE mailed more than 5 million notices to beneficiaries' homes between December 2002 and March 2003. The notices are also available at military treatment facilities.

"About 95 percent of the people who received the notice have understood it," Jenkins noted. But, he said, "we have received some further questions from people who don't understand why we've done that. We've screened and responded to those letters to help further explain the information." In addition, the privacy officers can "answer questions from beneficiaries."

Besides explaining the patients' rights under HIPAA and TRICARE's responsibilities, the notice tells beneficiaries how to file a complaint if they feel their health information has been inappropriately used. Jenkins said patients have the right to read their medical records, have a copy made, request amendments or request restrictions of usages and disclosures of their health information.

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"HIPAA makes us accountable to them for our management of their health information," he emphasized. However, he pointed out that TRICARE and military treatment facilities are allowed to use health information for treatment, payment and healthcare operation activities.

"But there are other uses and disclosures of information that we must document," he said. "Patients can request an accounting of disclosures so they'll know exactly how their health information was used. This gives the individual control over their health information. We're obliged by the rule to do that for them."

Patients have the right to request an accounting of disclosures for up to six years, Jenkins noted.

"If the patient thinks there is erroneous information in his or her record, they may make a request to the treatment facility where the records are held for review of the information," Jenkins said.

But under some circumstances, information could be withheld from patients if healthcare professionals determine that releasing it would be harmful to them. For example, Jenkins said, "if some patients know they have a catastrophic disease, it may adversely affect how their body reacts to treatment." He said the same thing applies to other patients who may react adversely if they find out their treatment is going to take a year as opposed to a month.

"These are good medical practice guidelines that allow us to withhold information from a patient where knowledge of the course of treatment or prognosis might cause them to think adversely," Jenkins said. Not only is the patient's privacy protected in treatment facilities, it's also protected in the patient's home. For instance, Jenkins said, a patient might not want to share information left on his or her home answering machine about a follow-up appointment notice. In such a case, the patient could request a confidential communication at an alternative location.

Jenkins said HIPAA privacy applies to individually identifiable health information -- paper, electronic or oral communications. This includes information that identifies the patient and relates to his or her past, present or future health condition.

But he noted that TRICARE and military treatment facilities are required to give health information about any individual to the Department of Health and Human Services for use in an investigation of a complaint.

"We're permitted to use and disclose health information for many reasons, such as to assist public health officials in doing disease surveillance in a community," he said. "We can also share military health information on active duty people to help commanders determine an active duty member's ability to perform a particular element of a mission, or to determine their fitness for duty.

"We can also use health information to inform appropriate authorities, law enforcement (officials) and others of victims of spousal or child abuse," Jenkins noted.

Patients who have complaints about their privacy being compromised should contact the military treatment facility privacy officers or the TRICARE privacy officer.

They can also go directly to the Department of Health and Human Services' Office of Civil Rights Web site and follow the complaint and inquiry process at <http://www.hhs.gov/ocr/hipaa/>.

TRICARE Enhances Dental Benefits for Uniformed Services Retirees

Under a new five-year dental contract between the Department of Defense and the Delta Dental Plan of California, dental benefits for uniformed services retirees and family members enrolled in the TRICARE Retiree Dental Program (TRDP) have been enhanced. Beginning May 1, 2003, the mandatory enrollment period is reduced from 24 to 12 months. The annual maximum benefit per enrollee and lifetime maximum benefit for orthodontic care was increased from \$1000 to \$1200.

After the mandatory enrollment period ends, eligible enrollees which include uniformed services retirees and their family members; Medal of Honor recipients and their family members; and survivors and family members of deceased retirees or active duty sponsors who served on active duty for more than 30 consecutive days, may continue their enrollment in the TRDP on a month-to-month basis. During the mandatory 12-month enrollment period, TRDP enrollees are covered for basic restorative services, periodontics, endodontics, oral surgery and dental emergencies. After 12 months of continuous enrollment, TRDP enrollees are covered for cast crowns, cast restorations, full and partial dentures and orthodontics for adults and children.

As an incentive, sponsors and family members who enroll within 120 days of the sponsor's retirement from active duty receive an extra benefit. They and their family members are covered by the enhanced dental services starting the day they enroll. Sponsors and family members who wait and enroll after the 120 day period are not eligible for the enhanced dental services until they complete the mandatory 12 months of continuous TRDP enrollment.

The TRDP is a voluntary dental program with enrollee-paid premiums deducted automatically each month from the sponsor's retired military pay. If retired military pay is not available, sponsors and family members can arrange with Delta Dental to pay the monthly premiums either by mail or an electronic funds transfer.

Under the TRDP, there is a \$50 deductible per enrollee, with a \$150 yearly deductible per family. Premiums vary depending on where enrollees live and the number of family members they choose to enroll. During the enrollment period May 1, 2003, to April 30, 2004, enrollees pay approximately \$22 to \$37 a month for single coverage, \$42 to \$71 for two or \$71 to \$120 for a family of three or more.

Dental coverage is available throughout the United States, Canada, Puerto Rico, Guam, the U. S. Virgin Islands, America Samoa and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands. Enrollees may seek dental care from any licensed dentist or specialist within the TRDP coverage area. To minimize out-of-pocket expenses, enrollees are encouraged to seek dental care from more than 67,000 participating dental providers. The term "Nautical" is rooted in the Greek word "NAUT", meaning sailor.

S o n o f a G u n

1) In the early days, sailors were permitted to keep their "wives" on board ship. The term was used to refer to children born alongside the guns of the broadsides. In fact, the expression questioned the legitimacy of a person. The old definition of a man-o'-war was: *"Begotten in the galley and born under a gun. Every hair a rope yarn, every tooth a marline spike; every finger a fish hook and in his blood right good Stockholm tar."* A British officer commanding a brig off the Spanish coast in 1835 wrote in his diary. *"This day the surgeon informed me that a woman on board had been laboring in child for twelve hours, and if I could see my way to permit the firing of a broadside to leeward, nature would be assisted by the shock. I complied with the request and she was delivered of a fine male child."* Gunners Mate's to the rescue!



2) A male child conceived on a man-of-war's gun deck. There was a time in sailing history when wives, lovers, and ladies of pleasure were permitted on board to entertain the men while in port. In most cases, - especially during war, crewmen were not permitted to leave the ship for the very plausible fear that they would desert. Thus were visitors allowed. Since the only place a couple could find any privacy was between the massive cannons of the ship's armament, the term was applied to the child that resulted. Purists argue the term should be applied only to the male child that was actually born in these circumstances, since this sometimes occurred as well, but far less often. A further elaboration states that women experiencing difficulty during child birth were laid next to one of these cannons, which was then fired in the belief that the noise and shock would be enough to hasten the birth.

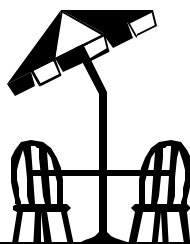

Former Academy Life Insurance Policyholders May Be Eligible for Payments

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20, 2003 -- The Academy Life Insurance Co. seeks immediate contact with an estimated 110,000 current and former service members who may be eligible to receive payments from a fund established as part of a settlement it reached with the Justice Department Dec. 19, 2002.

Col. Steve Strong, director of legal policy in the Office of the Undersecretary of Defense for Personnel and Readiness, said the insurance company will mail notices and payment applications to the last address it has for thousands of former policyholders it believes are eligible. Notices will be mailed by Feb. 24, he added.

Eligible persons have until June 24 to file, he said. After that deadline, applications won't be considered, Strong emphasized.

The payments of up to \$200 per policy are part of a \$160 million settlement reached after the Justice Department filed a civil complaint against Academy Life for defrauding service members from 1991 to 1998. The complaint alleged the insurers sold more than 92,000 policies of a particular life insurance plan to service members and their families between 1993 and 1998 and reaped more than \$200 million in premiums. Academy Life has not admitted to any improper act.

As part of the settlement the company will pay more than \$2.7 million to persons who purchased their policies from 1991 to 1998.

Academy Life also agreed in the settlement to never again sell another insurance policy in the United States or ask DoD for permission to conduct business on U.S. military installations. The Defense Department in 1998 barred the company from doing business on military installations for three years.

Strong said former policyholders must meet all the following conditions to be eligible for payment from the settlement fund:

- ⚡ The person was the last owner of a Genesis Series policy issued from Jan. 1, 1991, through Dec. 31, 1998.
- ⚡ The policy terminated prior to Sept. 30, 2002.
- ⚡ No death benefit was paid under the policy.
- ⚡ The person was living on Sept. 30, 2002.

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↓ The person accurately completes an application for payment and mails it to Academy Life by June 24.

↓ Academy Life verifies eligibility.

Possible Overpayment of Retirees

There have been a few recent instances on retiree accounts where retirees failed to report the unfortunate passing of his/her spouse. It is critical to report when the spouse predeceases the retiree and Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) costs were being deducted for spouse coverage. In one of these cases, the spouse had predeceased the retiree 20 years prior to the retiree himself passing, which PSC (RAS) only became aware of during final pay processing. Title 31, U.S. Code 3702 states "A claim against the Government presented under this section must contain the signature and address of the claimant or an authorized representative. The claim must be received by the official responsible under subsection (a) for settling the claim or by the agency that conducts the activity from which the claim arises within 6 years after the claim accrues..." Following enactment of the Public Law 107-314 (Bob Stump National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2003), for claims presented on or after December 2, 2002, waivers of the 6-year time limit can be made by the Secretary of Defense upon application by the secretary (Department of Homeland Security for U.S. Coast Guard) for amounts less than \$25,000. Any waivers submitted to Secretary of Department of Homeland Security would require clear documentation as to why the necessary information had not been reported in a timely fashion.

All retirees are reminded to inform PSC (RAS) as soon as possible following changes of marital status, death of a designated SBP beneficiary, or any other changes which could impact retired pay.

Directives Allow "Agent" To Shop For Commissary Patrons

Recent activities have brought to the forefront the issue of having someone shop for eligible commissary patrons. It doesn't just apply to children with a deployed parent, but to other authorized patrons who may have difficulty shopping on their own.

Known as the agent privilege, it's for any authorized commissary shopper who needs assistance shopping or who cannot shop on his or her own behalf because of disability, illness or infirmity. That privilege also extends to grandparents, guardians or caregivers of children of service members who may not be available due to deployment or remote assignment.

The agent does not have to be an authorized commissary shopper. The military member may request an agent pass for approval to allow the individual who is the primary caregiver for the children of deployed parents to enter the installation.

The installation commander authorizes agent privilege.

Non-military primary caregivers should contact the identification card section on the installation to determine what legal documents, i.e., power of attorney, may also be needed to establish proof of caregiver status. At the same time, the individual can also ask what documents are required to enter the installation.

Upon verification of caregiver status, the individual receives written authorization from the commander's representative designating him/her as an "agent" to accompany the children. Usually, the letter is for a 12-month period, but it can be extended in cases of continued hardship.

Authorized shoppers, who are elderly or disabled, and unfamiliar with the 'agent' privilege, should contact the identification card section on the installation to determine what proof is needed to have an agent shop in the commissary on their behalf.

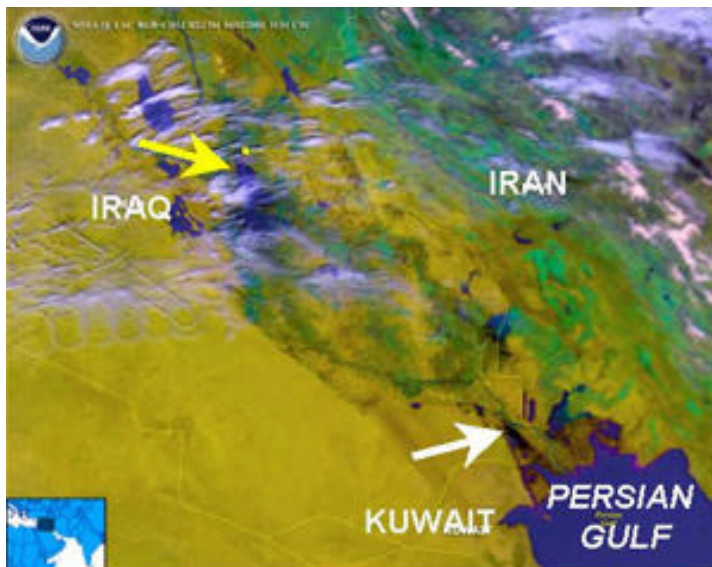
NOAA's Participation in the 2003 Gulf War and Reconstruction Efforts

NOAA is currently working with the U.S. Defense Department's Office of Reconstruction and Humanitarian Assistance and with the Department of State's Task Force on Environmental Security to prepare for the post-war reconstruction in Iraq (i.e., environmental issues — including science, technology and health issues that arise in the post-conflict period), should such work become necessary. Note that many of NOAA's capabilities will not necessarily be called upon in this instance given extant circumstances. Furthermore, NOAA's readiness to engage and/or participation in these significant undertakings is dependent on the availability of funding.

Current Involvement: NOAA has already contributed to the U.S. efforts in Iraq. NOAA's polar-orbiting satellites have already been called into service to support ongoing disaster monitoring and forecasting activities in Iraq, including pinpointing of "hot spots" identified as burning oil facilities, as well as dust and sand storms. Operational Significant Event Imagery program analysts in the Satellite Services Division review all available Polar and Geostationary satellite imagery, including AVHRR, Meteosat, and Moderate Resolution Imaging Spectroradiometer (MODIS) imagery for features of interest, including hot spots, smoke plumes, sand storms and contrails. Imagery containing features of interest is posted to the OSEI Web site and is forwarded to NESDIS management for evaluation. This NOAA-16 AVHRR image taken April 2, 2003, shows smoke blowing south from burning oil wells in Southeastern Iraq. Airplane contrails are also visible in Western Iraq. Likewise, NOAA HAZMAT personnel were stationed in Bahrain and at the Naval Oceanographic office in Mississippi assisting the U.S. Navy in the development of oil spill response strategies by providing operational spill trajectory support and training in preparation of another catastrophic release.



Future Involvement: The most likely areas of expertise that NOAA may be asked to provide would involve, wetland/marshland injury assessment and restoration, an assessment of the fisheries, and both coastal and inland water quality. Other areas may become apparent as the Office of Reconstruction and Humanitarian Assistance continues its work.

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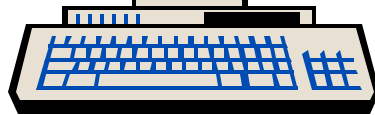

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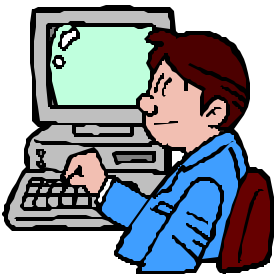


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Where are they Now???

Coast Guard Cutter Firebush Decommissions

May 2003

KODIAK, Alaska -- After 59 years of service, three wars, three homeports and more than a half-million nautical miles past the propeller the Coast Guard cutter Firebush retired from military service.

The Firebush was commissioned on July 20, 1942, primarily to conduct aids to navigation duties for the Coast Guard. It has been stationed in New London, Conn., Staten Island, N.Y., and Kodiak.

In addition to the regular duties of aids to navigation, breaking ice, security patrols and search and rescue the Firebush fought a fire at the foot of 35th Street in Brooklyn in Dec. 1956. It served under the Navy during World War II off the coast of Greenland and Iceland. The ship serviced aids to navigation and patrolled the coasts in an effort to prevent the establishment of Nazi weather stations and in 1968 it dumped confiscated weapons at sea.



The Firebush and its crew departed for San Pedro, Calif., where the ship will await the final paperwork before being sold to the Nigerian navy for tender work in the country's oil fields.
