Description: Sibshops is a program geared toward the siblings of children with special needs. The program acknowledges the fact that a sibling spends more time with a brother or sister who has special needs than anyone, except perhaps a parent. They also believe that being the brother or sister of a person with special needs is for some a good thing, others a not-so-good thing, and for many, somewhere in-between.

Sibshops provide regular, monthly, activity sessions for the brothers and sisters who have much to offer one another. Sibshops, offer participants an opportunity to explore their feelings about being the brother or sister of a sibling with special needs. This is accomplished through regular recreational and activity sessions such as: unique new games, arts and crafts, social opportunities, lunch, and discussion groups.

The activity sessions provided by Sibshops strive to create an atmosphere that recognizes the unique contributions made by siblings, and the unique problems with which they must deal. Sibshops are held once a month during the school year and hosted at Children's Hospital and Regional Medical Center. Sibshops serve children ages 6-13 years old (divided into two groups, 6-9 and 10-13 years of age.) Each Sibshop usually lasts three hours, and takes place one Saturday per month. Parent meetings are offered twice a year to support their involvement in the program.

Description: This is a partnership project between the Cities of Des Moines, Burien, SeaTac, Tukwila and the unincorporated areas of South King County.

Two different programs are offered. The Young Adult Social Program offers a variety of recreational trips for young adults' ages 13-25 years. It is a program in which young adults can be with friends, do arts and crafts projects, play games, sports, etc. Dinner, snacks and beverages are provided. Themes such as dances, barbeques, etc., have been incorporated into the socials that are held on a rotating basis at each of the different community centers. This is an inclusive program, which includes both disabled and non-disabled teens in social settings. There is a \$2 drop-in fee.

Description: The Seattle Center Academy is a two-week summer arts education program that provides art experiences to middle-school students (7th and 8th graders.) This sweeping program offers an impressive array of classes and activities for 275 students during the two-week session. To ensure a successful experience for all participants, the Academy also provides bus transportation, supplies and ongoing communication with the families. The program provides scholarships for approximately 20 students with developmental disabilities each year.

Participants spend five hours per day in a series of classes that include: sculpture, ceramics, dance, music, theater, cartooning, photography, and more. The Academy's program list seems endless. Classes are conducted by professionals and students from art organizations throughout the area.

Within this framework, there is a segment of the Seattle Center Academy program called Reach For It! This segment recruits and supports kids with developmental disabilities. Participants receive special attention according to their needs and are integrated into general classes and activities. To support them, the academy provides mentors to assist them in going to and from classes, as well as during classes and other activities. There is a one to one student to mentor ratio. When necessary, the academy creates adaptive classes that provide special accommodations. But even with these special considerations, the program almost always maintains some level of integration and inclusion.

Description: Outdoors for All offers five sessions of week-long inclusive recreation day camps for King County residents with developmental disabilities. Day camps are scheduled to take place during school breaks, including: winter break (December) midwinter break (February), spring breaks (two different weeks in April) and summer (June through August.) The day camps are offered, and transportation is provided, to at least three of the following new community locations — Rainier Valley, Central Seattle/Yesler Terrace, Skyway and Lake City. Camps are offered Monday through Friday with half-day and full-day options for participants. Camp activities may include adaptive cycling, hiking, rock climbing, water skiing, canoeing, snowshoeing, excursions to local parks and other programs depending upon the season and weather parameters.

Outdoors for All's Custom Events are designed to specifically serve children and adults with and without developmental disabilities. They include such activities as: adaptive cycling, in-line skating, snowshoeing, rock climbing, camping, water skiing, inner-tubing and paddling at various locations in King County. These Custom Events are offered, and transportation is provided, to at least three of the following new community locations — Rainier Valley, Central Seattle/Yesler Terrace, Skyway and Lake City. All instruction, equipment and support is provided by trained Outdoors for All staff and volunteers. For either of these programs you can request information about a scholarship for your child with a developmental disability.

Description: The Wallingford Boys and Girls Club conducts a special needs program. This provides specialized support to youth with developmental disabilities to help them fully participate in Boys and Girls Club programming. This program provides drop-in respite after school. Learning room and daily activities are provided. The program helps youth develop independent living skills, have fun, and build self-esteem.

The Boys and Girls Club serves children 5 to 18 years old. The organization provides a staff member that meets children who have a developmental disability as they arrive at the drop-in program. This staff member then makes sure that the children receive the necessary assistance to participate in the day's activities. The Club's list of classes and activities is extensive. The Wallingford Boys and Girls Club attempt to insure that inclusion occurs in all of its events and activities. This program operates year round.

A summer camp is also offered called: Camp Blast. This program is for children and teens with high functioning special needs. The nine week camp runs from 9:00 a.m. -1:00 p.m. daily. In the afternoon, many campers join the Club's regular drop-in program from 1:00 – 6:00 p.m. The program emphasizes exercise, education and expression. Every day a field trip is offered, examples might include: the local fire department, Seattle Storm basketball games, Woodland Park Zoo, Experience Music Project, Bite of Seattle, Wild Waves, swimming and mini-golf.

Description: The support group will serve both Spanish speaking mothers of children with special needs and Spanish speaking mothers of typically developing children from the community. Through meetings twice each month the support group will promote the health and wellbeing of Spanish speaking women and their families by providing this

highly isolated population of women with a place to connect with each other, access important community resources, and work through the cultural and personal challenges of raising a family in the U.S. and of raising a child with special needs in the Spanish community.

The group is led by a native Spanish speaking mental health therapist. The Kindering Center believes that having a native speaker facilitating the group greatly increases the level of intimacy and candid discussion among participants. The group meets for two-hour sessions twice a month and be provided free-of-charge to participants. The support group is structured to serve up to 20 participants at each meeting. Each session includes free, onsite childcare provided by Spanish speaking childcare professionals. In the case that transportation difficulties arise, agency funds are available to help cover costs such as reimbursement for gas.

Description: The purposes of the Parent to Parent Power/Chinese Parent Information and Education Support Project (CPIESP) are to provide linguistically and culturally relevant services to Chinese children, youth, and adults with developmental disabilities and their families residing in King County. This project facilitates networking with Chinese parents who have similar interests, experiences, and/or challenges. This networking builds strength, knowledge, and fellowship among families who need additional assistance.

Parent to Parent Power was designed by a group of Chinese parents who have children with developmental disabilities. A total of four group meetings and one family community outing are offered throughout 2008. Each of the six meetings will last between three to four hours, and the two family outings are all day activities. Through the partnership and collaboration among the Tzu Chi Foundation and Parent to Parent Power, Chinese parents with children with developmental disabilities are offered opportunities to learn and access services with appropriate language and cultural supports. Description: This group is a parent driven group. They plan for two phases of the year: January through June and September through December. The support group provides a forum for psychosocial support and also for education on parenting concerns and community resources. They provide at least one opportunity for respite (Parents Night Out) during the year. Two aspects of the program that remain constant: one is the Email group that people may sign up for when their child starts at Sorenson Early Childhood Center and the other is the Friday afternoon Parent Support group. The Email group provides a way to share current and relevant information to families and the support group is a monthly open ended discussion group intended to provide community development and peer support.

This program also provides an evening program for education and information sharing. Childcare is always provided as a way to prevent barriers for attendance. Topics are selected based on interest and age appropriate needs, for example: toilet training, social skill development, parenting issues, transition to Kindergarten, child safety and abuse prevention.

Description: The Inclusion Sewing Circle provides support for immigrant and refugee mothers to meet twice a month on Saturdays from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. The purpose of the group is to provide inclusion activities for Cambodian and other families as well as to provide social and practical support to mothers and caretakers of children with

developmental disabilities. Mothers meet to learn to sew, improve sewing skills or just have access to a sewing machine. In this context, mothers talk, share experiences and meet friends, old and new. Parents with and without children with developmental disabilities share tips and approaches to parenting. Activities are organized for all of the children and snacks are provided. The Sewing Group serves as a source of information for participants. As issues are raised in the group, staff researches community information and presents resources on the relevant topic at the next meeting. Transportation to and from the group is provided or coordinated to ensure that transportation is not a barrier to participation.

Description: Refugee Women's Alliance (REWA) offers three support groups that meet quarterly to support families who speak Vietnamese, Somali, and Cambodian. Each support group serves 8-12 families. Parent support groups are facilitated by a family advocate and bring together parents and families to share experiences and provide peer support. Support groups are conducted in each group's native language and reduce feelings of isolation by fostering a sense of community for families facing similar challenges. This safe environment provides parents an outlet to express feelings of frustration, an opportunity for problem-solving, and a venue for celebrating their children's progress and accomplishments. After each support group, the Family Advocates follow up with families to learn and understand how the support groups are helping them, to make sure that the family is taking advantage of community participation opportunities, to identify needs and connect the family to services.

Description: The Northshore Senior Center Inclusion Developmental Disabilities Program provides social and recreational opportunities for individuals with developmental disabilities in community locations that are used by non-disabled individuals for the same or similar activities. Senior Center staff work individually with adults with developmental disabilities to help them identify their interests, gifts, and needs. Staff involves participants in the activities of their choice: art programs, physical activities, the Health Enhancement Program (HEP), clubs, outings, support groups, special events, meals, committees and volunteer opportunities. Most participants come to the Northshore Senior Center one to three times per week. They enjoy activities, visit with new friends, and offer volunteer assistance. Caregivers and families of participants are invited to participate in the center's Caregiver Support groups facilitated by a team of social workers and volunteers.

Description: The Adult Community Options Program is a community resource program geared toward the City of Shoreline's adults with special needs. Two days per week,

four hours each day, participants attend a variety of outings including local parks, art and history museums, the Zoo, the Aquarium and the Pacific Science Center. Additional activities include a variety of projects including art, music, gardening, cooking, balloon volleyball and bingo. Program participants are encouraged to participate in community service projects such as baking for the teen shelter, delivering craft projects to nursing homes, and on-site volunteering at Food Lifeline. Program staff, volunteers, and attendants, provide a ratio of 1:3, which provides the opportunity for interpersonal interaction between the staff and participants and between the participants and the public. Our goal is to strengthen community connections, build friendships and grow opportunities for both sides in learning from different types of people.
