Did You Know That...

- *The U.S. Department of Defense is the second major source of revenues to the state. Second only to tourism.*
- *Hawaii is the second-ranking state in annual per capita federal defense expenditures -- \$3,566 per person.*
- *According to the 2000 U.S. Census, Hawaii topped all other states with the highest percentage of people ages 16 to 64 in the armed forces -- 4.95%.*
- *Every major defense contractor has local staffing in Hawaii, where defense procurement totals 1.9 billion annually.*
- *Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard is the largest industrial employer in Hawaii.*
- *During 2004 the Coast Guard conducted more than 300 search and rescue missions, saved 60 lives and \$7.4 million in property.*
- *Pacific Missile Range Facility on Kauai is the largest multi-environment military range in the world.*

Fiscal Year 2003

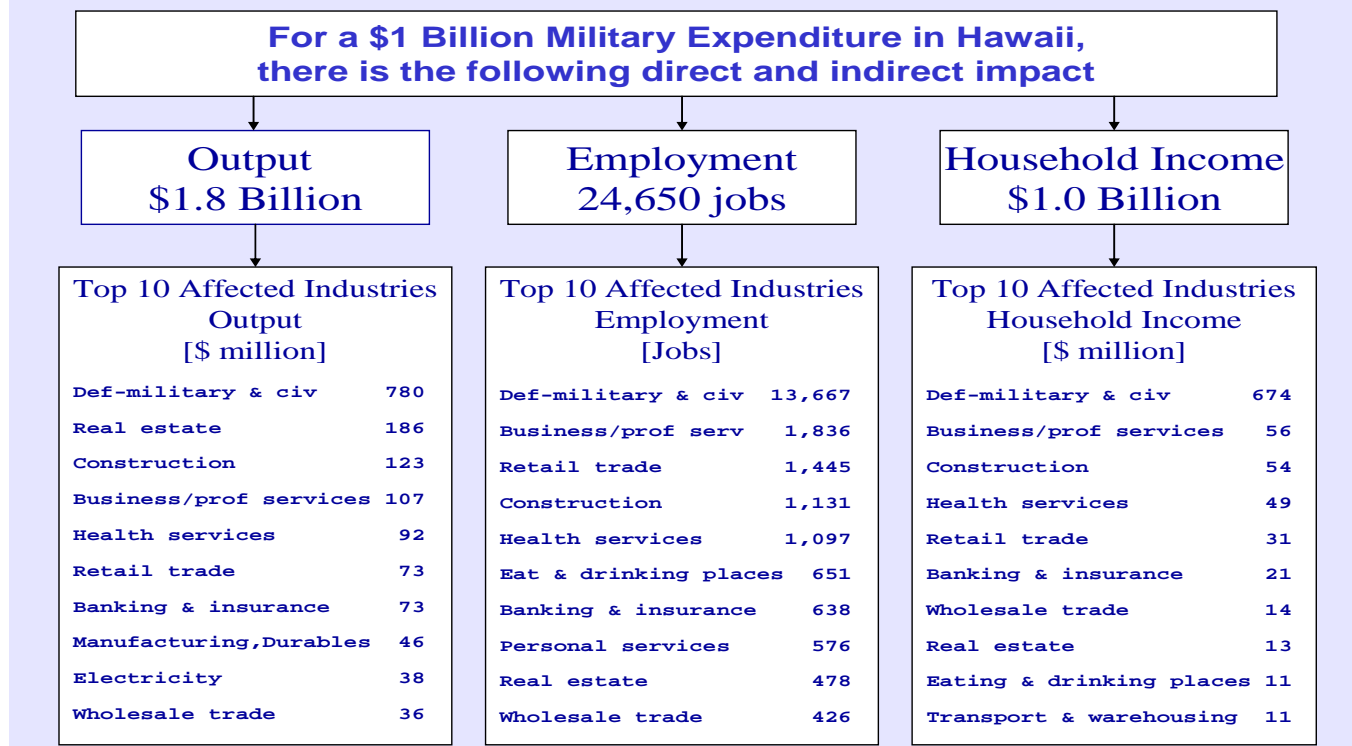
- Total defense expenditures in Hawaii were \$4.5 billion, an increase of 13.1% over FY 2002.
- ❖ Defense procurement contracts in Hawaii totaled \$1.9 billion, an increase of 26.2% over FY 2002.

Fiscal Years 2004-05

- Appropriations for FY 2005 defense projects total \$865 million, an increase of 12% over FY 2004.
- ❖ This includes a military construction program of \$368 million, an increase of 8.5% over FY 2004.
- \$5.5 million was provided to improve infrastructure for Hawaii's public schools with high enrollments of military children – more than \$25 million over the past 5 years.
- The federal education budget includes \$44 million in impact aid funding for Hawaii's public schools.

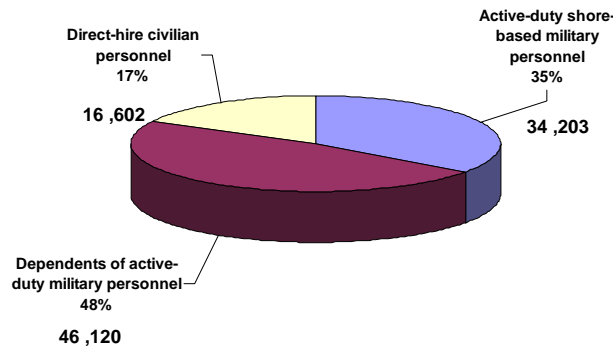
Future

- Ongoing programs to privatize construction, renovation and operation of military housing will contribute an estimated \$2.2 billion over the next 10 years.
