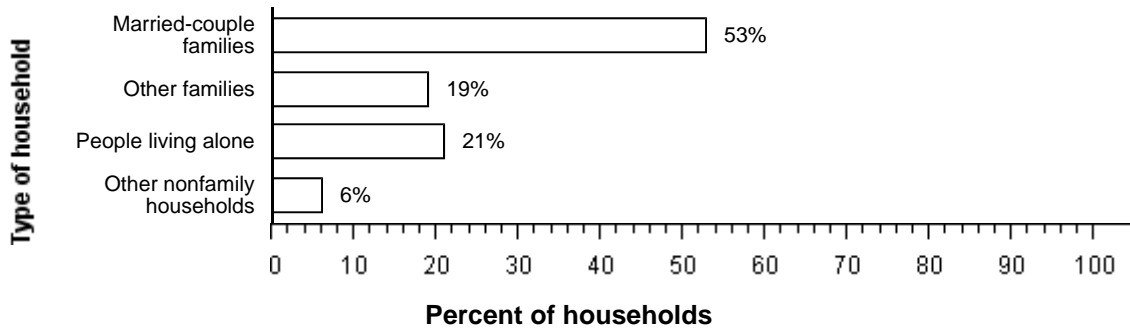
NOTE. HOUSEHOLDS AND FAMILIES: In 2006 there were 213,000 households in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress). The average household size was 3 people.

Families made up 73 percent of the households in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress). This figure includes both married-couple families (53 percent) and other families (19 percent). Nonfamily households made up 27 percent of all households in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress). Most of the nonfamily households were people living alone, but some were composed of people living in households in which no one was related to the householder.

The Types of Households in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress), Hawaii in 2006



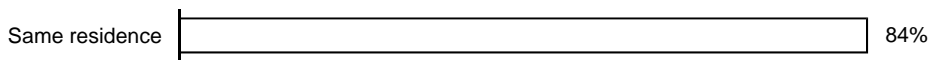

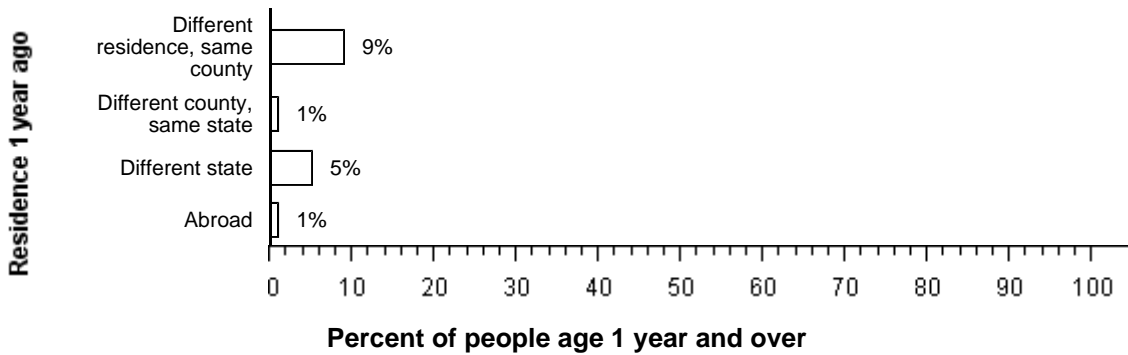
NATIVITY AND LANGUAGE: Eleven percent of the people living in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress) in 2006 were foreign born. Eighty-nine percent was native, including 57 percent who were born in Hawaii.

Among people at least five years old living in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress) in 2006, 18 percent spoke a language other than English at home. Of those speaking a language other than English at home, 11 percent spoke Spanish and 89 percent spoke some other language; 38 percent reported that they did not speak English "very well."

GEOGRAPHIC MOBILITY: In 2006, 84 percent of the people at least one year old living in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress) were living in the same residence one year earlier; 9 percent had moved during the past year from another residence in the same county, 1 percent from another county in the same state, 5 percent from another state, and 1 percent from abroad.

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Congressional District 2 (109th Congress), Hawaii in 2006



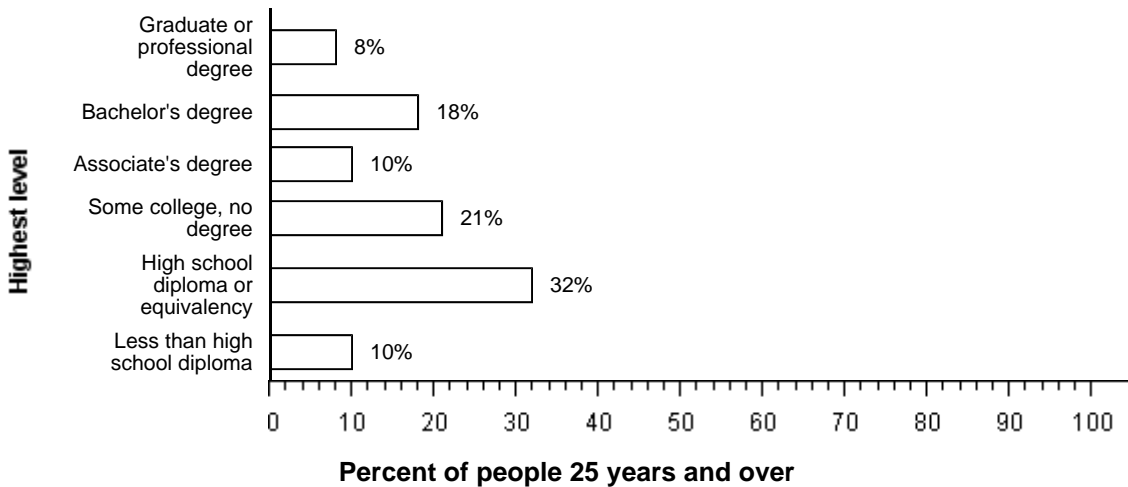

EDUCATION: In 2006, 90 percent of people 25 years and over had at least graduated from high school and 27 percent had a bachelor's degree or higher. Ten percent were dropouts; they were not enrolled in school and had not graduated from high school.

The total school enrollment in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress) was 162,000 in 2006. Nursery school and kindergarten enrollment was 18,000 and elementary or high school enrollment was 110,000 children. College or graduate school enrollment was 34,000.

The Educational Attainment of People in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress), Hawaii in 2006

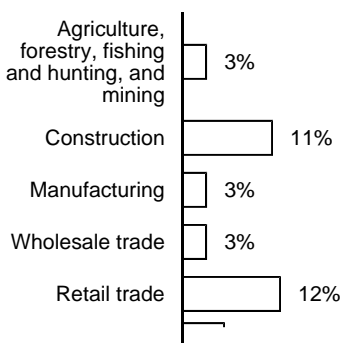


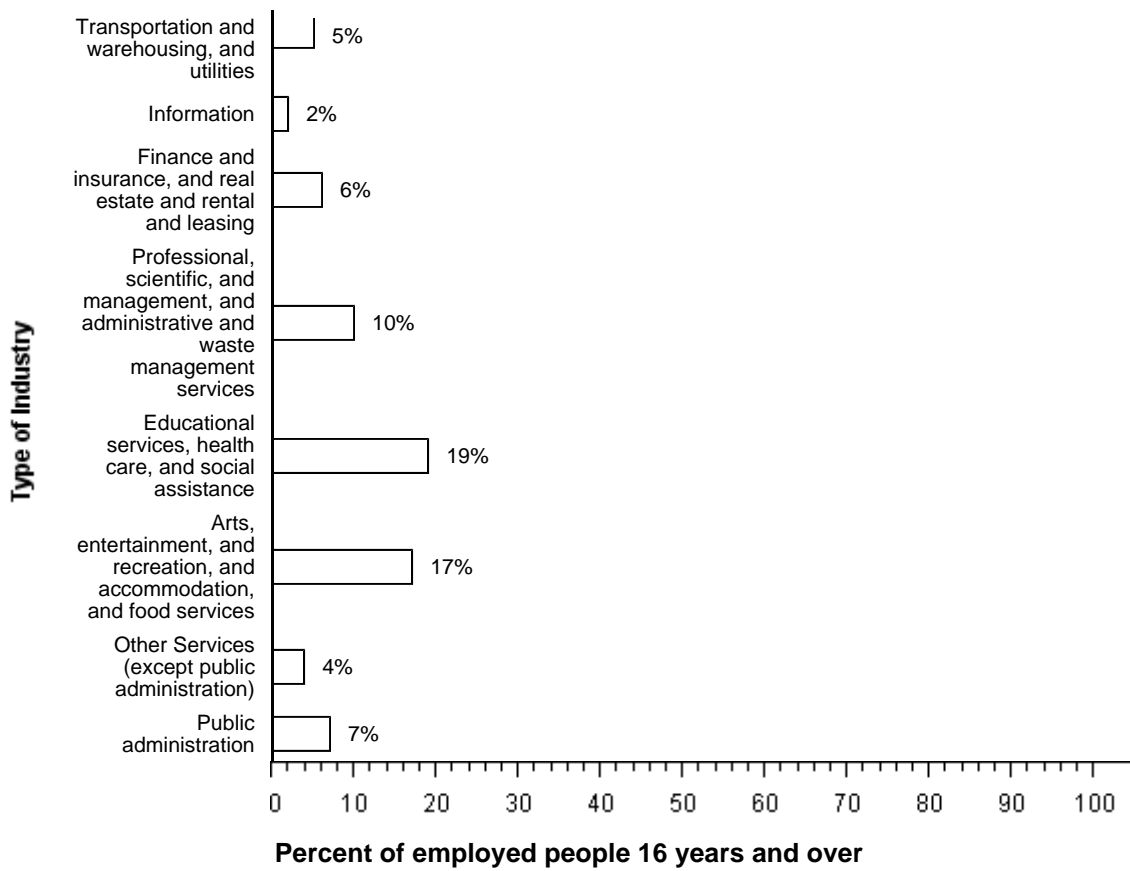

DISABILITY: In Congressional District 2 (109th Congress), among people at least five years old in 2006, 14 percent reported a disability. The likelihood of having a disability varied by age - from 6 percent of people 5 to 15 years old, to 11 percent of people 16 to 64 years old, and to 40 percent of those 65 and older.

INDUSTRIES: In 2006, for the employed population 16 years and older, the leading industries in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress) were Educational services, and health care, and social assistance, 19 percent, and Arts, entertainment, and recreation, and accommodation, and food services, 17 percent.

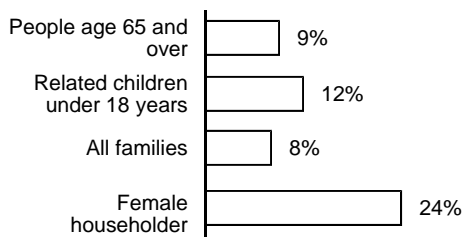
OCCUPATIONS AND TYPE OF EMPLOYER: Among the most common occupations were: Management, professional, and related occupations, 30 percent; Sales and office occupations, 26 percent; Service occupations, 22 percent; Construction, extraction, maintenance and repair occupations, 13 percent; and Production, transportation, and material moving occupations, 8 percent. Seventy-two percent of the people employed were Private wage and salary workers; 18 percent was Federal, state, or local government workers; and 9 percent was Self-employed in own not incorporated business workers.

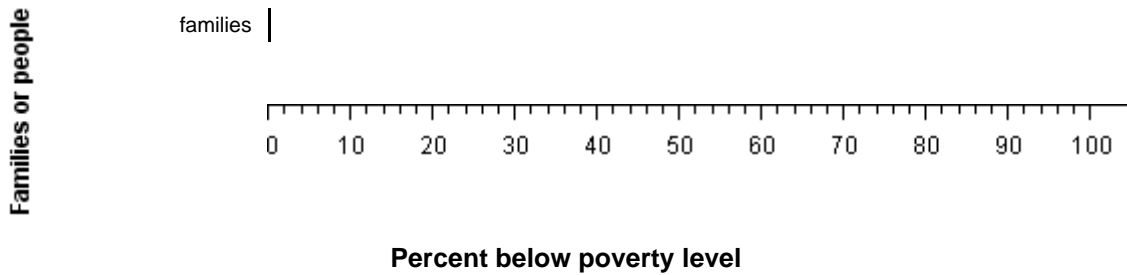
TRAVEL TO WORK: Seventy percent of Congressional District 2 (109th Congress) workers drove to work alone in 2006, 16 percent carpooled, 2 percent took public transportation, and 7 percent used other means. The remaining 5 percent worked at home. Among those who commuted to work, it took them on average 25.1 minutes to get to work.

INCOME: The median income of households in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress) was \$61,177. Eighty-two percent of the households received earnings and 22 percent received retirement income other than Social Security. Twenty-nine percent of the households received Social Security. The average income from Social Security was \$14,458. These income sources are not mutually exclusive; that is, some households received income from more than one source.

POVERTY AND PARTICIPATION IN GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS: In 2006, 10 percent of people were in poverty. Twelve percent of related children under 18 were below the poverty level, compared with 9 percent of people 65 years old and over. Eight percent of all families and 24 percent of families with a female householder and no husband present had incomes below the poverty level.

Poverty Rates in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress), Hawaii in 2006

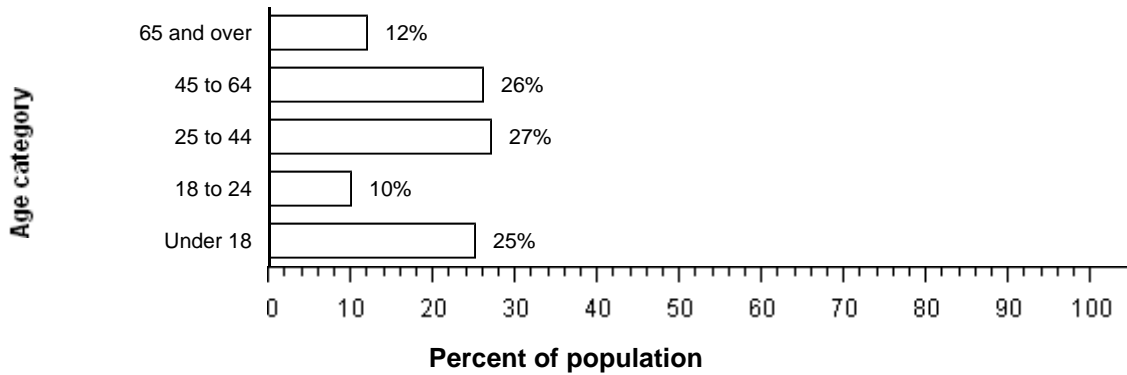

POPULATION OF Congressional District 2 (109th Congress): In 2006, Congressional District 2 (109th Congress) had a total population of 662,000 - 328,000 (50 percent) females and 334,000 (50 percent) males. The median age was 36 years. Twenty-five percent of the population was under 18 years and 12 percent was 65 years and older.

The Age Distribution of People in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress), Hawaii in 2006

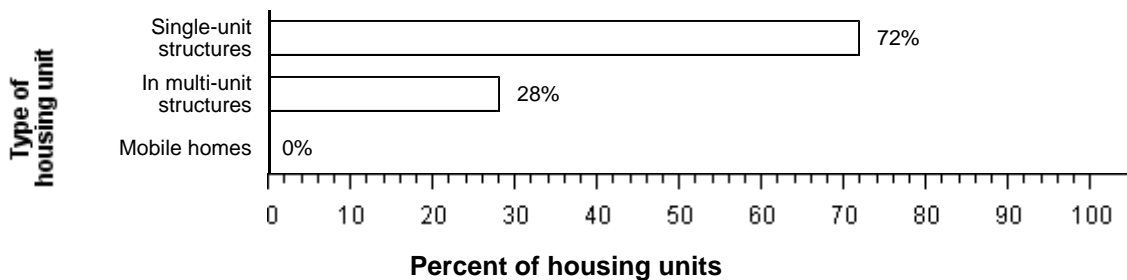

For people reporting one race alone, 43 percent was White; 2 percent was Black or African American; 1 percent was American Indian and Alaska Native; 37 percent was Asian; 15 percent was Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and 2 percent was Some other race. Twenty-five percent reported Two or more races. Ten percent of the people in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress) was Hispanic. Thirty percent of the people in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress) was White non-Hispanic. People of Hispanic origin may be of any race.

HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS: In 2006, Congressional District 2 (109th Congress) had a total of 256,000 housing units, 17 percent of which were vacant. Of the total housing units, 72 percent was in single-unit structures, 28 percent was in multi-unit structures, and less than 0.5 percent was mobile homes. Twenty-seven percent of the housing units were built since 1990.

The Types of Housing Units in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress), Hawaii in 2006

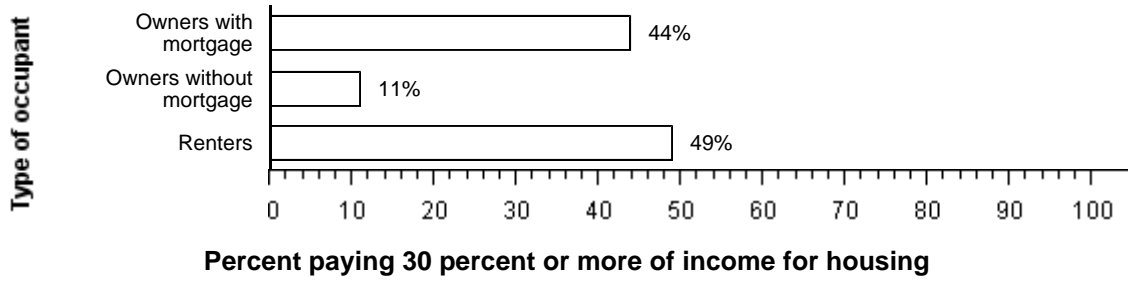

OCCUPIED HOUSING UNIT CHARACTERISTICS: In 2006, Congressional District 2 (109th Congress) had 213,000 occupied housing units - 134,000 (63 percent) owner occupied and 79,000 (37 percent) renter occupied. Five percent of the households did not have telephone service and 5 percent of the households did not have access to a car, truck, or van for private use. Multi Vehicle households were not rare. Forty percent had two vehicles and another 25 percent had three or more.

HOUSING COSTS: The median monthly housing costs for mortgaged owners was \$1,849, nonmortgaged owners \$357, and renters \$1,142. Forty-four percent of owners with mortgages, 11 percent of owners without mortgages, and 49 percent of renters in Congressional District 2 (109th Congress) spent 30 percent or more of household income on housing.
