Background:

On April 16th, the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) convened a Rulemaking Advisory Committee to review the Oregon Administrative Rule modifications needed to implement Senate Bill (SB) 101. SB 101, regulating recreational ATV and dirtbike safety on public lands, was signed into law in the summer of 2007. Highlights include:

- In January 2009, ATV and dirtbike operators under the age of 16 will be required to pass new training requirements. These requirements will phase-in for all ages by 2014.
- Each child under age 16 must meet rider fit guidelines when operating an ATV. Rider Fit describes how a child must be able to reach and employ pedals, handlebars, brakes, etc., when operating an ATV vehicle. To develop the Rider Fit language for the rule, staff conducted a national literature review to identify language used by other states, 4-H, and from manufacturer's recommendations. Our rules are written to be understandable by riders and parents, easy enough for law enforcement officials to assess without measuring apparatus, and enforceable in a court of law.
- Each child operating an ATV or dirtbike must be supervised by an adult who is able to provide immediate assistance and direction.
- Each rider under age 18 must fasten the helmet chin strap when operating or riding on an ATV.
- OPRD is now authorized to pay for law enforcement activities related to the operation of ATVs and dirtbikes through the traditional ATV Grant Allocation process or directly through use of an intergovernmental contract.

Public hearings were held July 10th in Florence, July 14th in Bend, July 15th in Baker City, July 23rd in Salem, and July 24th in Medford. Public comments are summarized in the attachment. None of the public input requested specific changes to the proposed rules. As such, we are submitting the proposed rules for adoption as drafted.

23 24 25	(1) ORS 390.585 authorizes the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department to adopt rules and establish procedures to be used when OPRD allocates ATV Account Fund money to public and privately owned land managers, ATV clubs and organizations.
26 27 28 29	OAR 736-004-0045 through 736-004-00xx are adopted pursuant to ORS 390.580, 390,585, and 390.590 which direct the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department to issue Class I and Class III Operating Permits to persons who satisfy the statutory requriements to ride on public property.
30 31 32 33 34 35 36	OAR 736-004-0075 through 736-004-00xx are adopted pursuant to ORS 390.570 and 390.575 which direct the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department to issue or provide for issuance of Class I and Class III ATV operator permits to any person who has taken a Class I or Class III OPRD approved ATV safety education course and has been found qualified to operate a Class I or Class III all-terrain vehicle. 41 **Definitions**

- 42 For purposes of this division, the following definitions shall apply:
- 43 (1) "Acquisition" means the gaining of real property rights for public use by donation or
- 44 purchase, including but not limited to, fee title or easements.
- 45 (2) "Approved Course Provider" is any individual or organization who instructs or provides46 an OPRD approved Class I or Class III ATV safety course.
- 47 (3) "ATV" or All-Terrain Vehicles means (a) Class I ATV, as defined in ORS 801.190: a
- 48 motorized, off-highway recreational vehicle 50 inches or less in width with a dry weight of
- 49 800 pounds or less that travels on three or more low pressure tires, has a saddle or seat for the

50 operator and is designed for or capable of cross-country travel on or immediately over land,

- 51 water, sand, snow, ice, marsh, swampland or other natural terrain.
- (b) Class II ATV, as defined in ORS 801.193: any motor vehicle that:
- 54 (A) Weighs more than a Class I all-terrain vehicle;

- 56 (B) Is designed for or capable of cross-country travel on or immediately over land, water,
- 57 sand, snow, ice, marsh, swampland or other natural terrain; and

 approved course provider and concludes with an examination.
- 85 (12) ATV Safety Education" means those grant projects that include but are not limited to
- training programs, media with information for the public, safe riding practices,
- 87 environmental ethics, or any combination thereof.
- (13) "All-Terrain Vehicle Safety Education Card" is the ATV Operator's Permit required by
 ORS 390.570 and 390.575.
- 90 (14) "Commission" means the Oregon Parks and Recreation Commission.
- 91 (15) "Conversion" means any real property acquisition or development that is later wholly or
- 92 in part converted to another use other than its intended and stated use as described in the
- 93 grant application and the grant agreement.
- 94 (16) "Correspondence Course and Self Test" means either a Class I or a Class III ATV safety
- 95 course and examination provided by the OPRD that is taken at home without a proctor. This
- 96 correspondence course and self test will satisfy minimum standard of ATV safety education
- 97 competency only for those individuals who have qualified for hardship status.
- 98 (17) "Dealer" means any person or business duly certified under ORS 822.020 and 822.040
 99 to sell Class I or Class III ATVs.
- (18) "Development" means the planning, design, construction, and improvement of ATVrecreational facilities, trails, and riding areas.
- 102 (19) "Director" means the director of the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department.
- 103 (20) "Dry weight" means the unloaded weight, absent of all fluids, passengers and any
- 104 materials such as ice, snow, or mud.

- 105 (22) "Emergency Medical Services" means medical services performed by certified
- 106 personnel and the necessary items to perform their duties.
- 107 (23) "Endorsement Code" means an identifying color or mark on the ATV Safety Education
- 108 Card that indicates whether the operator has successfully passed either the internet on-line
- 109 education program or a hands-on education program.
- 110 (24) "Equivalency Exam" means a comprehensive written examination created by the OPRD.
- 111 The equivalency exam is intended to provide either Class I or Class III operators who are at
- 112 least 16 years of age and have five or more years operating a Class I or Class III vehicles the
- 113 opportunity to meet the minimum standard of ATV safety education competency without
- 114 having to take an ATV safety education course.
- (25) "Grant Agreement" means the agreement between the OPRD and the project sponsordescribing the terms and conditions of the project and its associated grant of funds.
- (26) "Grant Application" means the form and its format as developed by the OPRD that theproject sponsor uses to request ATV grant funds.
- 119 (27) "Hands-on Training" means any OPRD approved course of instruction that is offered by
- 120 an OPRD approved course provider and that provides the rider training opportunities that
- 121 includes appropriate all-terrain vehicles and their use on different physical terrains.
- 122 (28) "Hardship Status" means a situation or condition that prevents an individual from
- 123 attending an approved safety course or taking an equivalency exam in person within a
- reasonable amount of time or within reasonably close proximity to the individual's place of
- residence. The situation or condition must also keep the individual from taking an approved
- 126 Internet course. A hardship situation may allow an individual to utilize a correspondence
- 127 course and self test provided by the OPRD to meet the minimum standard of safety education
- 128 competency. An individual must submit a written request for hardship status. The OPRD
- 129 Director or their designee has the authority to grant or deny hardship status.
- (29) "Internet Course" means an OPRD approved course of instruction that is offered throughthe internet.
- (30) "Law Enforcement Services" means law enforcement services performed by certifiedpersonnel and the necessary items to perform their duties.
- (31) "Minimum Standards of ATV Safety Education Competency" means a standard of
 proficiency established by the OPRD that determines whether an applicant for either a Class I
 or Class III ATV Safety Education Card has met or exceeded the requirements of an ATV
 safety course.
- 138 (32) "OHV" means Off-Highway Vehicle, also called ATV.
- (33) "Operations and Maintenance" means the preservation, rehabilitation, restoration,
 operation and upkeep of the facilities, riding areas, and equipment including the purchase of
 equipment necessary to perform these functions.

- 142 (34) "OPRD" means the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department.
- 143 (35) "Personal Property" means tangible property other than land: movable property
- 144 including but not limited to items such as an ATV, trail repair equipment, or other movable
- 145 property purchased through the ATV Grant Program.
- (36) "Planning" means the research, design, engineering, environmental, and site survey ofATV recreation areas, trails, or facilities.
- (37) "Project Authorization" means the grant agreement as signed by the Director or theirdesignee and the project sponsor that authorized the project.
- (38) "Project Sponsor" means the recipient of the grant funds and the responsible party forimplementation of the project.
- (39) "Public Lands" includes publically and privately owned land that is open to the generalpublic for the use of All-Terrain Vehicles.
- (40) "Real Property" means immovable property: land together with all the property on it thatcannot be moved, together with any attached rights.
- (41) "Rider Fit" means the minimum physical size requirements that a Class I ATV operator
 under the age of 16, must meet in relationship to the vehicle to be operated, as established by
 the OPRD and described in OAR 736-004-0115.
- 159 (42) "Saddle" means any device attached to the vehicle which is used for seating.
- 160 (43) "Successor" means a governmental entity that has agreed to accept the terms and
- 161 conditions of the project sponsor's responsibilities as contained in the project sponsor's Grant
- 162 Agreement and grant application should the project sponsor cease to exist; for example if a
- 163 club or non-profit organization should dissolve or disband. The successor shall agree to
- 164 operate the project continuously for the public benefit and recreational purposes identified in
- the grant agreement and grant application. If OPRD is a successor under OAR 736-004-
- 166 0025(1)(e), OPRD may operate, sell, or qualify another successor to the project.
- (44) "Sustainability" means using, developing, protecting, and managing the resource in a
 manner that enables people to meet current and future generation needs from the multiple

179 Apportionment of Monies

- 180 (1) Monies in the All-Terrain Vehicle Account shall be used for the following purposes:
- 181 (a) Planning, promotion and implementation of a statewide ATV program including, but not
- 182 limited to, acquisition, development and maintenance of ATV recreation areas;
- 183 (b) Education and safety training for ATV trainers and operators;
- 184 (c) Law enforcement and emergency services;

200 Grant Application Eligibility and Requirements

- 201 (1) Eligibility for funding assistance:
- (a) Public agencies: Federal land managers, state agencies, and local governments that havethe responsibility for, or are capable of, providing a service to ATV users;
- 204 (b) Private land owners or managers: Private land owners or managers who offer public OHV
- 205 recreation opportunities and will provide open public ATV recreation for a minimum

- 206 prescribed period of daily or seasonal time and who will maintain the opportunity for a
- 207 prescribed period of time as determined by OPRD;
- 208 (c) Clubs and non-profit organizations: ATV clubs and non-profit organizations registered 209 with the State of Oregon for a minimum of three consecutive years;
- 210 (A) Clubs and non-profit organizations shall have in place, prior to receipt of any funding, a
- 211 written agreement with a successor in which the successor agrees to operate the facility as
- 212 described in the grant agreement and the grant application should the club or non-profit
- 213 organization cease to exist, for example, due to disbanding or dissolution; or
- 214 (B) OPRD shall be listed on the title as successor to the property:
- 215 (i) OPRD may sell the property and shall deposit the net revenue from the sale into the ATV 216 Account Fund;
- 217 (ii) OPRD may operate the project; or
- 218 (iii) OPRD may qualify and assign another successor to the project.
- 219 (2) ATV Projects or components not eligible for funding:
- 220 (a) Overtime is generally not eligible for funding except for an identified emergency 221 situation;
- 222 (b) Overhead items such as office or building rent, insurance, depreciation and other fixed 223 costs associated with the normal everyday operation of a business, agency or group;
- (c) ATV projects that have no way to measure completion or specific intent are not eligible; 224
- (d) Portions of projects completed prior to an ATV agreement or after the expiration of an 225 226 ATV agreement.;
- 227 (e) ATV projects that do not meet the goals of the ATV Grant Program or are not in the best 228 interest of ATV recreation;
- 229 (f) Vehicle or other personal property usage unrelated to the scope of the ATV project.
- (3) Requirements for Match: 230
- (a) The minimum match required for eligible ATV projects is 20 percent of the total project 231 232 cost except for land acquisitions;
- 233 (b) For land acquisitions and when unusual circumstances exist, public agencies may request
- 234 a partial or full waiver of the 20 percent match requirement. Consideration for the waiver will
- 235 be based upon the following criteria:

- (A) The public agency is able to demonstrate due diligence was exercised in obtaining other
- 237 funds and that the following limitations, among others, are present:
- 238 (i) Budget authority does not exist;
- (ii) Budget appropriations cannot be obtained in a reasonable time yet public support doesexist; and
- (iii) No saleable assets such as conservation easements exist from which to generate the fullcash match requirement.
- (B) The public agency is able to demonstrate their ability to operate and maintain the projectproperty for ATV recreational purposes:
- 245 (i) By having budgeted funds in place; or
- 246 (ii) Having identified other resources such as volunteers or contracted services.
- 247 (C) The public agency is able to demonstrate that time is of the essence:
- (i) The seller of the real property has placed time limits in which the public agency can affecta purchase, such as the expiration of an Option to Purchase or a First Right of Refusal; or
- (ii) The public agency can identify the possible loss of other existing matching funds such asgrants from other entities that may have an expiration date.
- (D) If a waiver to the required partial or full match is approved, the public agency shall be
- 253 limited in all future grant requests to receiving ATV grant funds in an amount of 50 percent
- or less of the total costs for any development projects located on the acquired property.
- (c) Match may include, but is not limited to, cash funds, labor, either force account orvolunteer, materials, and equipment;
- 257 (d) Grants from other sources may be used as match provided the sponsor can certify the
- funds will be available within 120 days from the beginning date of the ATV projectagreement;
- 260 (e) Eligible volunteer labor will require a log that includes the volunteer's name, date
- volunteer performed work, location volunteer performed work, the hours worked, and the
- hourly rate of compensation used for their contribution of labor.
- 263 (4) Conversions:

(a) It is the intent of the ATV Grant Program that all real property acquisitions or easements
shall be retained and used for the project's intended and stated use as described in both the
grant application and the grant agreement;

- 267 (b) The director has authority to disapprove conversion requests, reject proposed
- 268 substitutions, or both;
- (c) The project sponsor shall submit requests for conversions to the OPRD in writing. The
 OPRD may consider the request if the following prerequisites are met:
- (A) All practical alternatives to a conversion have been evaluated and rejected on a soundbasis;
- 273 (B) The project sponsor has established the fair market value of the property to be converted
- and the property proposed for substitution is of at least equal fair market value as established
- by a state approved appraisal (prepared in accordance with uniform Federal appraisal
- standards) excluding the value of structures or facilities that will not directly enhance its
- 277 ATV recreation utility;
- 278 (C) The project sponsor proposes a replacement property that is of reasonably equivalent 279 usefulness and location as that being converted.
- 280 (d) If the project sponsor is unable to provide replacement property within 24 months of
- 281 either the approved request for conversion or after the fact of conversion, the project sponsor
- shall pay the OPRD a current amount equal to the OPRD's original percentage of
- contribution to the project. As an example, if the OPRD provided an original grant of 80
- 284 percent for the project's acquisition costs, the project sponsor will be required to reimburse
- the OPRD 80 percent of the real property's value at the time of conversion or discovery of
- 286 conversion, whichever is later;
- 287 (e) In the case of development, rehabilitation, and equipment purchases, the project sponsor
- shall operate the improvements or equipment for its established useful life. Guidelines
- established by the IRS will be used by the project sponsor to define useful life per each item.
- 290 If the facility is closed, service is terminated and the facility or equipment has not reached its
- useful life, it will be made available to other agencies or organizations. If a facility is closed,
- service is terminated, or land is closed, or the facility or equipment has not reached its useful
- life, a percentage of the allocated funds will be returned to the OPRD equal to the percentage
- of useful life remaining in the funded facility or equipment.

- 301 (1) Applications:
- 302 (a) A current ATV grant application is required for consideration of ATV funding;

- 303 (b) Information regarding application deadlines and public meetings will be provided through
- 304 available media sources and on the OPRD ATV website;
- 305 (c) Applicants must submit applications by published deadlines;
- 306 (d) Applications will be reviewed by the OPRD and the ATV-AAC;
- 307 (e) The ATV-AAC will recommend ATV project funding to the commission.
- 308 (2) Agreements:
- 309 (a) To authorize an ATV project, OPRD requires a signed ATV Grant Agreement;
- 310 (b) A project sponsor may not begin work on an ATV project without a Notice to Proceed.
- 311 (c) OPRD, upon written request by the project sponsor, may approve, in writing, that some
- 312 match may be considered and allowed prior to commencement of the project.

350 (1) An ATV operating permit shall be in the form of a decal valid for a 2-year period from

- the date of issue to be placed on the vehicle as determined in OAR 736-004-0065. All ATVoperating permits shall contain:
- 353 (a) The distinctive number or characters assigned by OPRD to the vehicle;
- 354 (b) The word "Oregon"; and
- 355 (c) The expiration date on the decal.
- (2) The application for an ATV off-road operating permit shall be in a form as prescribed byOPRD and shall include:
- 358 (a) The name and address of the owner of the ATV; and
- (b) The make and body style of the ATV for which application is made.
- 360 (3) To replace a permit that is lost, destroyed, mutilated or needs to be replaced for any361 reason, the owner must:
- 362 (a) Apply for a new permit in the same manner as for the original permit; and
- 363 (b) Pay the fee for a replacement ATV Operating Permit.
