Wahiawa Man Found Guilty of Electronic Enticement of a Child

HONOLULU – Ray S. John, also known as "Steve Williams", also known as "damaski113", has been found guilty by a Honolulu jury of Electronic Enticement of a Child in the First Degree.

John, 29, used the Internet to solicit a law enforcement agent whom he believed to be a 13-year-old girl. In online "chats," John indicated that he wanted to engage in sexual conduct with the girl. He arranged to meet her at a laundromat in Manoa Marketplace on June 12, 2007 at 9:30 a.m. for the purpose of sex. He was arrested when he entered the laundromat to meet the "girl."

John faces a maximum sentence of ten years in prison and, under a new sentencing law passed in July 2006, a minimum sentence of five years probation with a one-year prison term as a condition of probation. He must also register as a sex offender.

Sentencing is set for May 14, 2008 at 11:00 a.m. before the Honorable Dexter D. Del Rosario. Bail remains at \$40,000 pending sentencing.

The investigation of John involved law enforcement agents of the Hawai`i Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force, including the Department of the Attorney General and the Honolulu Police Department.

This is the eighteenth conviction for Electronic Enticement of a Child since January 2004.
