Watch for the Festival Show on PBS this Fall



Excerpts from Sunday's stage performance will again be shown on selected Public Broadcasting System (PBS) stations next month. Under the terms of a partnership between VA and PBS station WITF in Harrisburg, Pa., they will condense the stage show into a 60-minute television presentation, which will then be closed captioned. It will be distributed through the National Educational Telecommunications Association

to PBS stations nationwide who have expressed an interest in airing the show. The target date for the broadcast on those PBS affiliates is the week of Veterans Day 2007, although some stations may choose to show it at a later time.

Unfortunately, because the show must be edited to fit the 60-minute format for airing, not all acts can be featured. Also, some may be shortened to fit the broadcast requirements. While it is up to each local PBS station to select programming, a number have already expressed an interest or committed to airing this year's show. Check your local PBS program schedule for more information.

St. Louis Music & Art

Turn on any radio or take a stroll on Blueberry Hill and you'll quickly be able to see the influence of the arts and musical culture of St. Louis.

In fact, you can literally stroll down the St. Louis Walk of Fame, on the sidewalks of University City Loop, centrally located in the St. Louis area, to see the stars from our city. The Walk of Fame is a non-profit organization founded in 1988 to provide a showcase for the cultural heritage of St. Louis and to advance the knowledge, awareness and appreciation of great St. Louisans and their accomplishments.

The Walk of Fame itself consists of sets of brass stars and bronze plaques honoring individuals from the St. Louis area who made major national contributions to our cultural heritage. Each star features the artist's name, and an accompanying plaque contains a brief biography.

From the early days of rhythm and blues to today's rap scene, St. Louisans have had an ear for legendary tunes. Local legends who changed the course of modern American music include Scott Joplin, Chuck Berry, Johnnie Johnson and Tina Turner. Those keeping that

spirit alive today include Henry Townsend, Bennie Smith and Dave Black.

The St. Louis musical heritage is strong, and ever evolving, witnessed from recent artists such as Nelly, Michael McDonald, Robynn Ragland, Chingy and Stir.




The map for St. Louis' Walk of Fame

program. Also tonight, the 2007 host site director will ceremoniously pass the baton to next year's host site staff from Loma Linda, Calif.



Becking the Butterflies



Whether you're performing a violin solo, dancing with a partner, making your theatrical debut or showing your winning piece of art, stage fright can be a very real challenge for many artists and performers. No matter if you are alone on stage or sharing it with dozens of others; or whether you are explaining your art to a limited few back home or to hundreds of guests at a formal art exhibit, stage fright really can be reduced or even eliminated.



It's natural to get a little nervous about performing or standing in front of others, but if you've got a really bad case of stage fright, you might want to take a look at the following tips to prevent you from being too nervous.

- » Accept that stage fright is a natural reaction to performing or standing in front of an audience.
- » Decide ahead of time what you might do if something goes wrong.
- » Imagine the absolute worst thing that could happen to you if things went terribly wrong. Now, estimate the chances of that really happening. It's really low.
- » Make sure you know your lines well if you are performing; practice how you will explain your artwork.
- » Eat lightly and avoid foods that are known to upset your system.
- » Realize that stage fright is generally about the anticipation that builds up before the performance, and once you get out on stage, the nervousness typically goes away.
- » A simple exercise before getting on stage or going out to meet the audience is to make a visual run-through of yourself in whatever role you're performing. Incorporating this with slow, deep breathing can help you.
- » Relax, have fun, and enjoy the exhibit and the show!
