

President Bush announced key policy initiatives aimed to help America's small business sector at the dynamic two-day conference featuring cutting-edge information for women business owners. The

Department of Labor, Small Business Administration, and the Public Forum Institute sponsored the groundbreaking "Women Entrepreneurship in the 21st Century" conference where more than 1,200 women business owners attended in Washington, D.C. and scores of others joined by satellite.
