
For the 9 years from 1997 to 2005, workplace homicides totaled 5,912. In 40 percent of these homicides, the perpetrators were robbers. Another 15 percent resulted from violence between work associates.

When the victims were men, the assailant was a robber in about two-fifths of the cases. Among fatally assaulted women, the assailant was more likely to be a relative or personal acquaintance than in the case of fatally assaulted men. Nevertheless, a robber was the assailant in nearly one-third of homicides committed against women.
