
Four sources accounted for more than half of all nonfatal injuries and illnesses that resulted in days away from work in 2005: floor and ground surfaces, with 19.0 percent; worker motion or position, with 14.7 percent; containers, with 12.3 percent; and parts and materials, with 10.4 percent.

The category of floors and ground surfaces was the leading source of cases, with 19 percent. Of cases involving floors and ground surfaces, 29 percent occurred in trade, transportation, and utilities and 18 percent occurred in education and health services.

Worker motion or position accounted for 21 percent of injuries in the information industry and 18 percent in manufacturing and financial activities.
