

U.S. Department of Commerce Economics and Statistics Administration U.S. CENSUS BUREAU The census of governments provides the only source of periodic, comprehensive, and uniform information that identifies and describes all units of state and local government.

How often is the survey conducted?

The U.S. Census Bureau conducts a census of governments at 5-year intervals as required by law under Title 13, United States Code, Section 161.

What does the survey cover?

The 2002 Census of Governments, similar to those taken since 1957, covers three major subject fields: government organization, public employment, and government finances. Organization data include location, type, and characteristics of local governments. Finances and employment data are the same as in comparable annual surveys and include revenue, expenditure, debt, assets, employee counts, payroll, and benefits. The census covers all state and local governments in the U.S. (Local governments include counties, muncipalities, townships, special districts, and school districts).

What methods are used to collect the data?

There are three phases of state and local government data collection.

Phase 1 is precensus research to classify and identify all 87,525 local governments. It includes extensive legal research into government structure by state, as well as a mailout/mailback survey, and produces an updated list of all local governments and selected data.

Phase 2 covers all of the state and local governments, and expands the census year annual finance survey from about 14,000 to all 87,575 state and local governments. It uses in-house data compilations of source documents for many of the state and largest local governments, consolidated data submissions (usually electronic files) for about 55,000 local governments, Internet data collection capabilities, and a mailout/ mailback survey of the remaining governments.

Phase 3 covers all of the federal civilian, state and local governments and expands the census-year annual employment survey from about 10,000 to all 87,525 local governments. It relies on consolidated submissions from more than 30 state respondents, an Internet data collection capability, with the remainder obtained through a mailout/mailback survey.

Who uses the data?

These data are utilized by federal, state, and local legislators, policy makers, administrators, analysts, economists, and researchers to measure the changing characteristics of the public sector of the economy. Journalists report on, and teachers and their students learn about, their governments' activities using our data. Internally, the Census Bureau uses the data as a benchmark for all of our noncensus year samples.

There are two primary users among federal statistical agencies engaged in measuring the nation's economic and financial performance: the Bureau of Economic Analysis and the Federal Reserve Board. State and local governments use the data to develop programs and budgets, assess financial conditions, and perform comparative analyses.

Statistics on revenue, expenditure, debt, and financial assets of school systems, presented for the nation, for states, and for large school systems having 5,000 or more enrollment. Data describe financial activity in fiscal year 2002.

Fiscal year 2002 statistics on finances of special district governments, by states, and for selected large districts.

Statistics on revenue, expenditure, debt, and financial assets for municipal and township governments in fiscal year 2002. Report provides national summaries, population size-group information, state area data, and displays by individual selected municipal and township governments.

Vol. 4-5. Compendium of Government Finances

A comprehensive summary of revenue, expenditure, debt, and financial assets for all local and state governments in fiscal year 2002. Report provides national summaries, population size-group information, state area data, and displays of all governments aggregated by individual county areas.

Vol. 4-6. Employee-Retirement Systems of State and Local Governments

Memberships, receipts, expenditures, number of beneficiaries, and financial assets of state and local government employee retirement systems. Data are shown for the nation, for states and for large individual retirement systems.
