Instructions for Reporting by Occupation

Report **part-time workers** in the job they perform.

Report **apprentices** in the job for which they are being trained.

Report employees in the following ways:

- Use the description of duties along with the job titles to determine where to place employees. Do not rely on job titles alone.
- Report employees in the occupations in which they are working, **not** necessarily in occupations for which they have been trained.
For example: An employee trained as an engineer, but working as a drafter, should be reported as a drafter.
- Report each employee only once in the occupation that requires the **highest** level of skill if the employee performs work in two or more occupations. If there is **no** measurable difference in skill requirements, report employees in the occupation in which they spend the **most** time.
- Professionals who directly supervise other workers in professional occupations should be classified in the same occupation as the workers they supervise. For example, an economist that supervises other economists is classified as an economist.

Instructions for Reporting Wage Information

For all employees:

- Please use the hourly and annual wage rate categories to report employees. If wages are not recorded by hour or year (bi-weekly, or monthly for example), convert them into an hourly wage rate.
- For part-time workers, please report the specific hourly wage rate, not an average.
