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#### Abstract

Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP) 1996 Panel, Wave 8 Topical Module Microdata File [machine-readable data file] / conducted by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. -Washington: The Bureau [producer and distributor], 2001.


## Type of File:

Microdata; unit of observation is an individual.

## Universe Description:

The universe is the resident population of the United States, excluding persons living in institutions and military barracks.

## Subject-Matter Description:

The file contains data primarily from the topical module portion of the questionnaire. However, for purposes of matching persons to the core file, which was released separately, the beginning of the file contains identifying information as well as some basic demographic and social characteristics that are also contained in the core file. The identifying information includes sample unit, household address, and entry address identification. Demographic and social characteristics include age, sex, race (White; Black; American Indian, Eskimo, and Aleut; Asian or Pacific Islander), ethnic origin (34 categories including 9 Spanish origin categories), marital status, and education. Data in this topical module file include household relationships, work disability history, education and training history, marital history, fertility history, and migration history.

The sample consists of 4 rotation groups, each interviewed in a different month from August 1998 to November 1998. For each group the reference period for reporting labor force activity and income is the four calendar months preceding the interview month.

SIPP is a longitudinal survey where each sampled household and each descendent household is reinterviewed at 4 -month intervals for 12 interviews or "waves." This file contains the results of the eighth interview. Unique codes are included on each record to allow linking together the same persons from the preceding and subsequent waves.

## Geographic Coverage:

United States. Codes are included for 45 individual States and the District of Columbia, although the sample was not designed to produce State estimates. Areas in the SIPP sample in five States are identified in two groups for confidentiality reasons. The file identifies a subsample of metropolitan residents, along with codes for selected metropolitan statistical areas (MSA's) and consolidated metropolitan statistical areas (CMSA's).

## Technical Description:

File Structure: Rectangular. Each logical record for a sampled person includes information on the household and family of which the person was a part during each month of the reference period, as well as characteristics of the person.

File Size: 76,978 logical records; 2,040 character logical record length.
File Sort Sequence of Sample Units: Sampling unit identification number by entry address ID and person number within sampling unit.

## Geographic Coverage

State codes are shown except for five States which are identified in two groups. A subsample of metropolitan residents is identified along with codes for selected metropolitan statistical areas (MSA's) and consolidated metropolitan statistical areas (CMSA's). The sample was not designed to produce State or MSA/CMSA level estimates. State codes are primarily useful in relating a respondent's recipiency of benefits to thresholds which may vary from State to State. MSA/CMSA codes may be used in relating respondent characteristics with contextual variables.

## Identification Number System

The SIPP identification scheme is designed to uniquely identify individuals in each wave, provide a means of linking the same individuals over time, and group individuals into households and families over time.

The various components of the identification scheme are listed below:

The sample unit identification number was created by scrambling together the PSU, segment, and serial numbers used for Census Bureau administrative purposes. This identifier is constructed the same way on each wave regardless of moves, to enable matching from wave to wave.

The two-digit address ID code identifies each household associated with the same sample unit identification number. The first digit of the address ID code indicates the wave in which that address was first assigned for interview. The second digit sequentially numbers multiple households that have the same serial number. The address ID code is 11 for all sample addresses that are the same as in Wave 1. As SIPP sample persons move to new addresses, new address ID codes are assigned. Any new address to which sample unit members moved during Wave 4 is numbered in the 40 's.

The person ID is a five-digit number consisting of the two-digit entry address ID and a three-digit person num-ber. Person numbers 101, 102, etc., are assigned in Wave 1; 201, 202, etc., are assigned to persons added to the roster in Wave 2, and so forth. This five-digit number is not changed or updated, regardless of moves.

The sampling unit serial number and address ID code uniquely identifies each household in any given wave. The sampling unit serial number can link all households in subsequent waves back to the original Wave 1 household.

## Topcoding of Income Variables

To protect against the possibility that a user might recognize the identity of a SIPP respondent with very high income, income from every source is "topcoded" so that no individual income amounts above \$150,000 are revealed. While the data dictionary indicates a topcode of 50,000 for monthly income, this topcode will rarely be used. In most cases the monthly income is shown as an individual dollar amount of $\$ 12,500$, with $\$ 12,500$ actually representing " $\$ 12,500$ or more." (the $\$ 150,000$ annual income topcode is $\$ 12,500$ multiplied by 12 months). Individual monthly amounts above $\$ 12,500$ may occasionally be shown if the respondent's income varied considerably from month to month, as long as the average does not exceed $\$ 12,500$. For example, if a respondents' income from a single job were concentrated in only one of the four reference months, a figure as high as $\$ 50,000$ could be shown. (Income from interest or property have lower topcodes).

Summary income figures on the person, family, and household records are simple sums of the components shown on the file after topcoding, and are not independently topcoded. Thus, a person with high income from several sources (jobs, businesses, property) could have aggregate monthly income well over the topcode for each source. Families and households with a number of high income members could theoretically have aggregate income shown well over $\$ 150,000$, though well below the $\$ 1.5$ million shown as the highest allowable value in the data dictionary.

The user is cautioned against trying to make much use of the occasional monthly figures above $\$ 12,500$, except in calculating aggregates or observing patterns across the 4-month period for a single individual, family, or household. Those units with higher monthly amounts shown are a biased sample of high income units, more likely to include units with income from multiple sources than other units with equally high aggregate income which comes from a single source.

## HOW TO USE THE DATA DICTIONARY

The Data Dictionary describes the file contents and provides locations for each variable (record layout of the public-use computer tape file.) The first line ("D" Line) of each data item description gives the variable name, size of the data field, and the begin position of that field. The components include a short mnemonic or field name for use with software packages; field size; starting position; and a description of field contents with possible values.

The next few lines contain descriptive text and any applicable notes. Categorical value codes and labels are given where needed. Comment notes marked by an $\left({ }^{*}\right)$ are provided throughout for the rest of the dictionary components. Comments should be removed from the machine-readable version of the data dictionary before using it to help access the data file.

The first line of each data item description begins with the character "D" (left-justified, two characters). The " D " flag indicates lines in the data dictionary containing the name, size and begin position of each data item. The second line of each data item description begins with the character "T" (left-justified, two characters). The " T " flag indicates lines in the data dictionary containing the category code and short description of the variable. The line beginning with the character "U" describes the universe for that item. Lines containing categorical value codes and labels follow next and begin with the character " V ". The special character (.) denotes the start of the value labels. Two examples of data item descriptions follow:

# SOURCE AND ACCURACY STATEMENT <br> for the 1996 Public Use Files from the Survey of Income and Program Participation ${ }^{1}$ 

## SOURCE OF DATA

The data was collected in the 1996 Panel of the Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP). The SIPP universe is the noninstitutionalized resident population living in the United States. The population includes persons living in group quarters, such as dormitories, rooming houses, and religious group dwellings. Crew members of merchant vessels, Armed Forces personnel living in military barracks, and institutionalized persons, such as correctional facility inmates and nursing home residents, were not eligible to be in the survey. Also, United States citizens residing abroad were not eligible to be in the survey. Foreign visitors who work or attend school in this country and their families were eligible; all others were not eligible to be in the survey. With the exceptions noted above, persons who were at least 15 years of age at the time of the interview were eligible to be in the survey.

The 1996 Panel of the SIPP sample is located in 322 Primary Sampling Units (PSUs), each consisting of a county or a group of contiguous counties. Within these PSUs, living quarters (LQs) were systematically selected from lists of addresses prepared for the 1990 decennial census to form the bulk of the sample. To account for LQs built within each of the sample areas after the 1990 census, a sample containing clusters of four LQs was drawn of permits issued for construction of residential LQs up until shortly before the beginning of the panel.

In jurisdictions that don't issue building permits or have incomplete addresses, we systematically sampled expected clusters of four LQs which were listed by field personnel and then subsampled in the field. In addition, we selected sample LQs from a supplemental frame that included LQs identified as missed in the 1990 census.

For the first interview of the panel, Wave 1, we obtained interviews from occupants of about 36,700 of the 49,200 designated living quarters. We found most of the remaining 12,500 living quarters in the panel to be vacant, demolished, converted to nonresidential use, or otherwise ineligible for the survey. However, we did not interview approximately 3,400 of the 12,500 living quarters in the panel because the occupants, (1) refused to be interviewed, (2) could not be found at home, (3) were temporarily absent, or (4) were otherwise unavailable. Thus, occupants of about 92 percent of all eligible living quarters participated in the first interview of the panel.

For subsequent interviews, only original sample persons (those in Wave 1 sample households and interviewed in Wave 1) and persons living with them were eligible to be interviewed. We followed original sample persons if they moved to a new address, unless the new address was more than 100 miles from a SIPP sample area. Then, we attempted telephone interviews.

Sample households within a given panel are divided into four random subsamples of nearly equal size. These subsamples are called rotation groups and one rotation group is interviewed each month. Each household in the sample was scheduled to be interviewed at 4 month intervals over a period of roughly 4 years beginning in April 1996. The reference period for the questions is the 4-month period preceding the interview month. In general, one cycle of four interviews covering the entire sample, using the same questionnaire, is called a wave.

The public use files include core and supplemental (topical module) data. Core questions are repeated at each interview over the life of the panel. Topical modules include questions which are asked only in certain waves. The 1996 Panel topical modules are given in Table 1.

Table 2 indicates the reference months and interview months for the collection of data from each rotation group for the 1996 Panel. For example, Wave 1 rotation group 1 of the 1996 Panel was interviewed in April 1996 and data for the reference months December 1995 through March 1996 were collected.

Estimation. We used several stages of weight adjustments in the estimation procedure to derive the SIPP cross-sectional person level weights. We gave each person a base weight ( $\boldsymbol{B W}$ ) equal to the inverse of probability of selection of a person's household. We applied two noninterview adjustment factors. One adjusted the weights of interviewed persons in interviewed households to account for households which were eligible for the sample but which field representatives could not interview at the first interview $\left(\boldsymbol{F}_{N I}\right)$. The second compensated for person noninterviews occurring in subsequent interviews ( $\boldsymbol{F}_{N 2}$ ). We used a Duplication Control Factor ( $\boldsymbol{D C F}$ ) which adjusts for subsampling done in the field when the number of sample units is much larger than expected. We applied a Mover's Weight ( $\boldsymbol{M} \boldsymbol{W}$ ), which adjusts for persons in the SIPP universe who move into sample households after Wave 1. The last weight applied is the Second Stage Adjustment Factor ( $\boldsymbol{F}_{2 S}$ ). This weight adjusts estimates to population controls and causes husbands' and wives' weights to be equal.

The final cross-sectional weight is $\boldsymbol{F} \boldsymbol{W}_{\boldsymbol{c}}{ }^{\mathbf{\prime}} \boldsymbol{B W} \mathbf{( ~} \boldsymbol{D C F} \mathbf{( ~} \boldsymbol{F}_{N 1} \mathbf{(} \boldsymbol{F}_{2 S}$ for Wave 1 and is
$\boldsymbol{F} \boldsymbol{W}_{\boldsymbol{c}}{ }^{\prime} \boldsymbol{I W} \boldsymbol{(} \boldsymbol{F}_{N 2} \mathbf{(} \boldsymbol{F}_{2 S}$ for Waves 2+, where $\boldsymbol{I} \boldsymbol{W}$ is either $\boldsymbol{B W} \boldsymbol{W} \boldsymbol{D C F}\left(\boldsymbol{F}_{\boldsymbol{N I}}\right.$ or $\boldsymbol{M W}$. James (1995) and Siegel (1995a) describe SIPP cross-sectional weighting in greater detail.

Researchers both inside and outside the Census Bureau conducted evaluations of SIPP weighting methodology and researched alternative methodologies. We are making several improvements to SIPP weighting methods beginning with this panel. They are described below.

- We dropped the first stage factor $\left(\boldsymbol{F}_{\mathbf{1 S}}\right)$ from cross-sectional weighting. This factor adjusted for differences between the Census count of population and an estimate of that count based on Census data for sample PSUs. James (1994) found that it did not reduce variance as was previously believed. Jabine, et al (1990) describe the first stage factor used in earlier panels.
- We are using additional variables in nonresponse adjustment. We added high/low poverty stratum code to the Wave 1 nonresponse adjustment, and we added household income, geographic division, and number of imputations for selected income and asset items to the nonresponse adjustment for Waves 2+. Research by Rizzo, et al (1994) and by Folsom and Witt (1994) pointed out the potential of the latter three variables in reducing nonresponse bias.
- We redefined nonresponse adjustment cells for Waves 2+ weighting. We formed the nonresponse cells by successively partitioning data from five panels by whichever variable most reduced the bias of the household income to poverty threshold ratio. We used data from a sixth panel to evaluate the results. We calculated the nonresponse bias of six variables at Waves two and seven for both the new cells and the original cells using initial weights and data from the most recent interview in the calculations. The new cells had lower bias for five of the six variables (Siegel, 1995b).

Research was conducted on a number of promising weighting improvements. Allen and Petroni (1994) reported on an adjustment for mover attrition. Folsom and Witt (1994) and Rizzo, et al (1994) studied alternative nonresponse adjustments using response propensity models. Each study computed weights using an alternative methodology. The researchers then compared estimates of various items to benchmarks. The benchmarks came from administrative records and survey data with less nonresponse than the SIPP. The comparisons did not provide strong evidence of lower bias using the alternative weighting methods.

## Additional Methodology

Use of Weights. Each household and each person within each household on each wave tape has four weights. These four weights are reference month specific and therefore can be used only to form reference month estimates. Reference month estimates can be averaged to form estimates of monthly averages over some period of time.

Example, using the proper weights, one can estimate the monthly average number of households in a specified income range over November and December 1996. To estimate monthly averages of a given measure (such as, total, mean) over a number of consecutive months, sum the monthly estimates and divide by the number of months.

To form an estimate for a particular month, use the reference month weight for the month of interest, summing over all persons or households with the characteristic of interest whose reference period includes the month of interest. Multiply the sum by a factor to account for the number of rotations contributing data for the month. This factor equals four divided by the number of rotations contributing data for the month. For example, December 1995 data is only available from rotation 1 for Wave 1 of the 1996 Panel (See Table 2), so a factor of $4 / 1$ must be applied.

When estimates for months with less than four rotations worth of data are constructed from a wave file, factors greater than 1 must be applied. However, when core data from consecutive waves are used together, data from all four rotations may be available, in which case the factors are equal to 1 .

These tapes contain no weight for characteristics that involve a persons's or household's status over two or more months (such as, number of households with a 50 percent increase in income between November and December 1995).

Producing Estimates for Census Regions and States. The total estimate for a region is the sum of the state estimates in that region. Using this sample, estimates for individual states are subject to very high variance and are not recommended. The state codes on the file are primarily of use in linking respondent characteristics with appropriate contextual variables (for example, state-specific welfare
criteria) and for tabulating data by user-defined groupings of states.
Producing Estimates for the Metropolitan Population. For Washington, DC and 14 other states, metropolitan or non-metropolitan residence is identified (variable $\mathbf{H}^{*}$-METRO). In 28 additional states, where the non-metropolitan population in the sample was small enough to present a disclosure risk, a fraction of the metropolitan sample was recoded to be indistinguishable from non-metropolitan cases $\left(\mathrm{H}^{*}-\mathrm{METRO}=2\right)$. In these states, therefore, the cases coded as metropolitan ( $\mathrm{H}^{*}-\mathrm{METRO}=1$ ) represent only a subsample of that population.

In producing state estimates for a metropolitan characteristic, multiply the individual, family, or household weights by the metropolitan inflation factor for that state, presented in Table 3. (This inflation factor compensates for the subsampling of the metropolitan population and is 1.0 for the states with complete identification of the metropolitan population.)

The same procedure applies when creating estimates for particular identified MSA's or CMSA's-apply the factor appropriate to the state. For multi-state MSA's, use the factor appropriate to each state part. For example, to tabulate data for the Maine, ME-VT, apply the Vermont factor of 1.57953 to weights for residents of the Vermont part of the MSA; Maine residents require the same modification to the weight (i.e., their factors also equal 1.57953).

In producing regional or national estimates of the metropolitan population, it is also necessary to compensate for the fact that no metropolitan subsample is identified within two states (Mississippi and West Virginia). Thus, factors in the right-hand column of Table 3 should be used for regional and national estimates. The results of regional and national tabulations of the metropolitan population will be biased slightly. However, less than one-half of one percent of the metropolitan population is not represented.

Producing Estimates for the Non-Metropolitan Population. State, regional, and national estimates of the non-metropolitan population cannot be computed directly, except for Washington, DC and the 14 states where the factor for state tabulations in Table 3 is 1.0 . In all other states, the cases identified as not in the metropolitan subsample ( $\mathrm{METRO}=2$ ) are a mixture of non-metropolitan and metropolitan households. Only an indirect method of estimation is available: first compute an estimate for the total population, then subtract the estimates for the metropolitan population. The results of these tabulations will be slightly biased.

## ACCURACY OF ESTIMATES

SIPP estimates are based on a sample; they may differ somewhat from the figures that would have been obtained if a complete census had been taken using the same questionnaire, instructions, and enumerators. There are two types of errors possible in an estimate based on a sample survey: nonsampling and sampling. We are able to provide estimates of the magnitude of SIPP sampling error, but this is not true of nonsampling error. Found in the next sections are descriptions of sources of SIPP nonsampling error, followed by a discussion of sampling error, its estimation, and its effect in data analyses.

Nonsampling Error. Nonsampling errors can be attributed to many sources:
inability to obtain information about all cases in the sample
C definitional difficulties
C differences in the interpretation of questions
C inability or unwillingness on the part of the respondents to provide correct information
C inability to recall information, errors made in the following: collection such as in recording or coding the data, processing the data, estimating values for missing data
C biases resulting from the differing recall periods caused by the interviewing pattern used
C and undercoverage.

Quality control and edit procedures were used to reduce errors made by respondents, coders and interviewers. More detailed discussions of the existence and control of nonsampling errors in the SIPP can be found in the SIPP Quality Profile, 1998 SIPP Working Paper Number 230, issued May 1999.

Undercoverage in SIPP results from missed living quarters and missed persons within sample households. It is known that undercoverage varies with age, race, and sex. Generally, undercoverage is larger for males than for females and larger for Blacks than for non-Blacks. Ratio estimation to independent age-race-sex population controls partially corrects for the bias due to survey undercoverage. However, biases exist in the estimates to the extent that persons in missed households or missed persons in interviewed households have characteristics different from those of interviewed persons in the same age-race-sex group. Further, the independent population controls used have been adjusted for undercoverage in the Census.

A common measure of survey coverage is the coverage ratio, the estimated population before ratio adjustment divided by the independent population control. The Table below shows SIPP coverage ratios for age-sex-race groups for one month-April 1996 prior to the weighting adjustment. The SIPP coverage ratios exhibit some variability from month to month, but these are a typical set of coverage ratios. Other Census Bureau household surveys [like the Current Population Survey] experience similar coverage.

Comparability with Other Estimates. Caution should be exercised when comparing data from this with data from other SIPP products or with data from other surveys. The comparability problems are caused by such sources as the seasonal patterns for many characteristics, different nonsampling errors, and different concepts and procedures. Refer to the SIPP Quality Profile for known differences with data from other sources and further discussions.

Sampling Variability. Standard errors indicate the magnitude of the sampling error. They also partially measure the effect of some nonsampling errors in response and enumeration, but do not measure any systematic biases in the data. The standard errors for the most part measure the variations that occurred by chance because a sample rather than the entire population was surveyed.

## USES AND COMPUTATION OF STANDARD ERRORS

Confidence Intervals. The sample estimate and its standard error enable one to construct confidence intervals, ranges that would include the average result of all possible samples with a known probability. For example, if all possible samples were selected, each of these being surveyed under essentially the same conditions and using the same sample design, and if an estimate and its standard error were calculated from each sample, then:

1. Approximately 68 percent of the intervals from one standard error below the estimate to one standard error above the estimate would include the average result of all possible samples.
2. Approximately 90 percent of the intervals from 1.6 standard errors below the estimate to 1.6 standard errors above the estimate would include the average result of all possible samples.
3. Approximately 95 percent of the intervals from two standard errors below the estimate to two standard errors above the estimate would include the average result of all possible samples.

The average estimate derived from all possible samples is or is not contained in any particular computed interval. However, for a particular sample, one can say with a specified confidence that the average estimate derived from all possible samples is included in the confidence interval.

Hypothesis Testing. Standard errors may also be used for hypothesis testing, a procedure for distinguishing between population characteristics using sample estimates. The most common types of hypotheses tested are 1) the population characteristics are identical versus 2 ) they are different. Tests may be performed at various levels of significance, where a level of significance is the probability of concluding that the characteristics are different when, in fact, they are identical.

To perform the most common test, compute the difference $X_{A} \& X_{B}$, where $X_{A}$ and $X_{B}$ are sample estimates of the characteristics of interest. A later section explains how to derive an estimate of the standard error of the difference $X_{A} \& X_{B}$. Let that standard error be $S_{\text {DIFF }}$. If $X_{A} \& X_{B}$ is between -1.6 times $S_{\text {DIFF }}$ and +1.6 times $S_{\text {DIFF }}$, no conclusion about the characteristics is justified at the 10 percent significance level. If, on the other hand, $X_{A} \& X_{B}$ is smaller than -1.6 times $S_{\text {DIFF }}$ or larger than +1.6 times $S_{\text {DIFF }}$, the
observed difference is significant at the 10 percent level. In this event, it is commonly accepted practice to say that the characteristics are different. Of course, sometimes this conclusion will be wrong. When the characteristics are the same, there is a 10 percent chance of concluding that they are different.

Note that as more tests are performed, more erroneous significant differences will occur. For example, at the 10 percent significance level, if 100 independent hypothesis tests are performed in which there are no real differences, it is likely that about 10 erroneous differences will occur. Therefore, the significance of any single test should be interpreted cautiously.

Note Concerning Small Estimates and Small Differences. Because of the large standard errors involved, there is little chance that estimates will reveal useful information when computed on a base smaller than 200,000. Care must be taken in the interpretation of small differences since even a small amount of nonsampling error can cause a borderline difference to appear significant or not, thus distorting a seemingly valid hypothesis test.

Calculating Standard Errors for SIPP Estimates. There are three main ways we calculate the Standard Errors for SIPP Estimates. They are as follows:

C Replicate Weighting Methods,
C Generalized Variance parameters (denoted as $a$ and $b$ ),
C Simplified tables using the $a$ and $b$ parameters.
The most reliable method is the Replicate Weighting Method. SIPP uses the Replicate Weighting Method to produce Generalized Variance parameters. Using the Generalized Variance parameters, we create simplified tables.

Standard Error Parameters and Tables and Their Use. Most SIPP estimates have greater standard errors than those obtained through a simple random sample because PSUs are sampled and clusters of living quarters are sampled for the SIPP in the area and new construction frames. To derive standard errors that would be applicable to a wide variety of estimates and could be prepared at a moderate cost, a number of approximations were required. Estimates with similar standard error behavior were grouped together and two parameters (denoted $a$ and $b$ ) were developed to approximate the standard error behavior of each group of estimates. Because the actual standard error behavior was not identical for all estimates within a group, the standard errors computed from these parameters provide an indication of the order of magnitude of the standard error for any specific estimate. These $a$ and $b$ parameters vary by characteristic and by demographic subgroup to which the estimate applies. Table 4 provides base $a$ and $b$ parameters to be used for the 1996 Panel estimates. Table 10 provides parameters for calculating 1996 topical module variances.

The factors provided in Table 5 when multiplied by the base parameters of Table 4 for a given subgroup and type of estimate give the $a$ and $b$ parameters for that subgroup and estimate type for the specified reference period. For example, the base $a$ and $b$ parameters for total number of households are -0.00002495 and 2,484, respectively. For Wave 1 the factor for March 1996 is 1 since 4 rotation months of data is available. So, the $a$ and $b$ parameters for total household income in March 1996 based on Wave 1 are
-0.00002495 and 2,484, respectively. Also for Wave 1, the factor for the first quarter of 1996 is 1.2222
since 9 rotation months of data are available (rotations 1 and 2 provide 3 rotations months each, while rotations 3 and 4 provide 2 and 1 rotation months, respectively). So the $a$ and $b$ parameters for total number of households in the first quarter of 1992 are -0.00003049 and 3,036 , respectively for Wave 1 .

The $a$ and $b$ parameters may be used to calculate the standard error for estimated numbers and percentages. Because the actual standard error behavior was not identical for all estimates within a group, the standard errors computed from these parameters provide an indication of the order of magnitude of the standard error for any specific estimate. Methods for using these parameter for computation of approximate standard errors are given in the following sections.

For those users who wish further simplification, we have also provided general standard errors in Tables 6 through 9 . Note that these standard errors only apply when data from all four rotations are used and must be adjusted by a factor from Table 4. The standard errors resulting from this simplified approach are less accurate. Methods for using these parameters and tables for computation of standard errors are given in the following sections.

The procedures described below apply only to reference month estimates or averages of reference month estimates. Refer to the section "Use of Weights" for a more detailed discussion of the construction of estimates.

Variance stratum codes and half sample codes are included on the tapes to enable the user to compute the variances directly and more accurately by methods such as balanced repeated replications (BRR). William G. Cochran provides a list of references discussing the application of this technique. (See Sampling Techniques, 3rd Ed., New York: John Wiley and Sons, 1977, p. 321.)

Standard Errors of Estimated Numbers. The approximate standard error, $s_{x}$, of an estimated number of persons, households, families, unrelated individuals and so forth, can be obtained in two ways. Both apply when data from all four rotations are used to make the estimate. However, only the second method should be used when less than four rotations of data are available for the estimate. Note that neither method should be applied to dollar values.

The standard error may be obtained by the use of the formula

where $f$ is the appropriate $f$ factor from Table 4, and $s$ is the standard error on the estimate obtained by interpolation from Table 6 or 7 . Alternatively, $s_{x}$ may be approximated by the formula

from which the standard errors in Tables 8 and 9 were calculated. Here $x$ is the size of the estimate and $a$ and $b$ are the parameters associated with the particular type of characteristic being estimated. Use of Formula 2 will provide more accurate results than the use of Formula 1.

## Illustration.

Suppose SIPP estimates for Wave 1 of the 1996 Panel show that there were 1,700,000 black households with monthly household income above $\$ 4,000$. The appropriate parameters and factor from Table 4 and the appropriate general standard error from Table 6 are

Using the standard error based on Formula 2, the approximate 90 -percent confidence interval as shown by the data is from $1,608,412$ to $1,791,588$. Therefore, a conclusion that the average estimate derived from all possible samples lies within a range computed in this way would be correct for roughly $90 \%$ of all samples.

Standard Error of a Mean. A mean is defined here to be the average quantity of some item (other than persons, families, or households) per person, family or household. For example, it could be the average monthly household income of females age 25 to 34 . The standard error of a mean can be approximated by Formula 3 below. Because of the approximations used in developing Formula 3, an estimate of the standard error of the mean obtained from this formula will generally underestimate the true standard error. The formula used to estimate the standard error of a mean $\bar{x}$ is

where $y$ is the size of the base, $s^{2}$ is the estimated population variance of the item and $b$ is the parameter associated with the particular type of item.

The population variance $s^{2}$ may be estimated by one of two methods. In both methods, we assume $x_{i}$ is the value of the item for unit "I." (Unit may be person, family, or household). To use the first method, the range of values for the item is divided into " $c$ " intervals. The upper and lower boundaries of interval $j$ are $Z_{j \& l}$ and $Z_{j}$, respectively. Each unit is placed into one of "c" groups such that $Z_{j \& l}<x_{i}<Z_{j}$.

The estimated population mean, $\bar{x}$, and variance, $s^{2}$, are given by the formulas:

The most representative value of the item in group $j$ is assumed to be $m_{j}$. If group "c" is open-ended, or there exists no upper interval boundary, then an approximate value for $m_{c}$ is

Suppose that based on Wave 1 data, the distribution of monthly cash income for persons age 25 to 34 during the month of January 1996 is given in Table 11.

Using Formula 4 and the mean monthly cash income of $\$ 2,527$ the approximate population variance, $s^{2}$, is

Standard error of an aggregate. An aggregate is defined to be the total quantity of an item summed over all the units in a group. The standard error of an aggregate can be approximated using Formula 6.

As with the estimate of the standard error of a mean, the estimate of the standard error of an aggregate will generally underestimate the true standard error. Let $y$ be the size of the base, $s^{2}$ be the estimated population variance of the item obtained using Formula 4 or Formula 5 and $b$ be the parameter associated with the particular type of item. The standard error of an aggregate is:

\begin{equation*}
s_{x}{ }^{\prime} \sqrt{(b)(y) s^{2}} \tag{6}
\end{equation*}
$$

Standard Errors of Estimated Percentages. The reliability of an estimated percentage, computed using sample data for both numerator and denominator, depends upon both the size of the percentage and the size of the total upon which the percentage is based. Estimated percentages are relatively more reliable than the corresponding estimates of the numerators of the percentages, particularly if the percentages are 50 percent or more, e.g., the percent of people employed is more reliable than the estimated number of people employed. When the numerator and denominator of the percentage have different parameters, use the parameter (and appropriate factor) of the numerator. If proportions are presented instead of percentages, note that the standard error of a proportion is equal to the standard error of the corresponding percentage divided by 100 .

There are two types of percentages commonly estimated. The first is the percentage of persons, families or households sharing a particular characteristic such as the percent of persons owning their own home. The second type is the percentage of money or some similar concept held by a particular group of persons or held in a particular form. Examples are the percent of total wealth held by persons with high income and the percent of total income received by persons on welfare.

For the percentage of persons, families, or households, the approximate standard error, $s_{(x, p)}$, of the estimated percentage $p$ can be obtained by the formula

$$
\begin{equation*}
s_{(x, p)} ' f s \tag{7}
\end{equation*}
$$

when data from all four rotations are used to estimate $p$.
In this formula, $f$ is the appropriate $f$ factor from Table 6 and $s$ is the standard error of the estimate from Table 10 or 11.

Alternatively, it may be approximated by the formula

$$
\begin{equation*}
s_{(x, p)}, \sqrt{\frac{b}{x}(p)(100 \& p)} \tag{8}
\end{equation*}
$$

from which the standard errors in Tables 10 and 11 were calculated. Here $x$ is the size of the subclass of social units which is the base of the percentage, $p$ is the percentage ( $0<p<100$ ), and $b$ is the parameter associated with the characteristic in the numerator. Use of this formula will give more accurate results than use of Formula 7 above and should be used when data from less than four rotations are used to estimate $p$.

## Illustration.

Suppose that, in the month of January 1996, 6.7 percent of the $16,812,000$ persons in nonfarm households with a mean monthly household cash income of $\$ 4,000$ to $\$ 4,999$, were black. Using Formula 8 and the $b$ parameter of 4,610 from Table 4 and a factor of 2 for the month of January 1996 from Table 5, the approximate standard error is

$$
\sqrt{\frac{4,610(2}{(16,812,000)}(6.7)(100 \delta 6.7)} \text { ' } 0.59 \text { percent. }
$$

Consequently, the 90 percent confidence interval as shown by these data is from 5.74 to 7.66 percent.
For percentages of money, a more complicated formula is required. A percentage of money will usually be estimated in one of two ways. It may be the ratio of two aggregates:

or it may be the ratio of two means with an adjustment for different bases:

$$
p_{I}^{\prime} \quad 100\left(\hat{p}_{A} \bar{X}_{A} / \bar{X}_{N}\right)
$$

where $x_{A}$ and $x_{N}$ are aggregate money figures, $\bar{x}_{A}$ and $\bar{x}_{N}$ are mean money figures, and $\hat{p_{A}}$ is the estimated number in group A divided by the estimated number in group $N$. In either case, we estimate the standard error as

$$
\begin{equation*}
s_{I}^{\prime} \sqrt{\left(\frac{\hat{p_{A}} \bar{x}_{A}}{\bar{x}_{N}}\right)^{2}\left[\left(\frac{s_{p}}{\hat{p_{A}}}\right)^{2} \%\left(\frac{s_{A}}{\bar{x}_{A}}\right)^{2} \%\left(\frac{s_{B}}{\bar{x}_{N}}\right)^{2}\right]}, \tag{9}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $s_{p}$ is the standard error of $\hat{p_{A}}, s_{A}$ is the standard error of $\bar{x}_{A}$ and $s_{B}$ is the standard error of $\bar{x}_{N}$ . To calculate $s_{p}$, use Formula 8. The standard errors of $\bar{x}_{N}$ and $\bar{x}_{A}$ may be calculated using Formula 3.

It should be noted that there is frequently some correlation between $\hat{p_{A}}, \bar{x}_{N}$ and $\bar{x}_{A}$. Depending on the magnitude and sign of the correlations, the standard error will be over or underestimated.

## Illustration.

Suppose that in January 1996, 9.8\% of the households own rental property, the mean value of rental property is $\$ 72,121$, the mean value of assets is $\$ 78,734$, and the corresponding standard errors are $0.31 \%, \$ 5799$, and $\$ 2867$. In total there are $86,790,000$ households. Then, the percent of all household assets held in rental property is

$$
\text { ' } 100\left((0.098) \frac{72121}{78734}\right) \quad, 9.0 \%
$$

Using Formula 9, the appropriate standard error is

$$
\begin{aligned}
s_{I} & =\sqrt{\left(\frac{(0.098)(72121)}{78734}\right)^{2}\left[\left(\frac{0.0031}{0.098}\right)^{2} \%\left(\frac{5799}{72121}\right)^{2} \%\left(\frac{2867}{78734}\right)^{2}\right]} \\
& =0.008 \\
& =0.8 \%
\end{aligned}
$$

Standard Error of a Difference. The standard error of a difference between two sample estimates is approximately equal to

$$
\begin{equation*}
s_{(x \delta y)}, \sqrt{s_{x}^{2} \% s_{y}^{2}} \tag{10}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $s_{x}$ and $s_{y}$ are the standard errors of the estimates $x$ and $y$. The estimates can be numbers, percents, ratios, etc. The above formula assumes that the correlation coefficient between the characteristics estimated by $x$ and $y$ is zero. If the correlation is really positive (negative), then this assumption will tend to cause overestimates (underestimates) of the true standard error.

## Illustration.

Suppose that SIPP estimates show the number of persons age 35-44 years with monthly cash income of $\$ 4,000$ to $\$ 4,999$ was $3,186,000$ in the month of January 1996 and the number of persons age 2534 years with monthly cash income of $\$ 4,000$ to $\$ 4,999$ in the same time period was $2,619,000$. Then, using parameters from Table 4 and Formula 2, the standard errors of these numbers are approximately 104,787 and 95,140 , respectively. The difference in sample estimates is 567,000 and using Formula 10, the approximate standard error of the difference is

$$
\sqrt{(104,787)^{2} \%(95,140)^{2}} \quad 141,534 .
$$

Suppose that it is desired to test at the 10 percent significance level whether the number of persons with monthly cash income of $\$ 4,000$ to $\$ 4,999$ was different for persons age 35-44 years than for persons age 25-34 years. To perform the test, compare the difference of 567,000 to the product $1.6\left(141,534{ }^{\prime} \quad 226,455\right.$. Since the difference is larger than 1.6 times the standard error of the difference, the data show that the two age groups are significantly different at the 10 percent significance level.

Standard Error of a Median. The median quantity of some item such as income for a given group of persons, families, or households is that quantity such that at least half the group have as much or more and at least half the group have as much or less. The sampling variability of an estimated median depends upon the form of the distribution of the item as well as the size of the group. To calculate standard errors on medians, the procedure described below may be used.

An approximate method for measuring the reliability of an estimated median is to determine a confidence interval about it. (See the section on sampling variability for a general discussion of confidence intervals.) The following procedure may be used to estimate the 68 -percent confidence limits and hence the standard error of a median based on sample data.

1. Determine, using either Formula 7 or Formula 8, the standard error of an estimate of 50 percent of the group.
2. Add to and subtract from 50 percent the standard error determined in step 1.
3. Using the distribution of the item within the group, calculate the quantity of the item such that the percent of the group with more of the item is equal to the smaller percentage found in step 2. This quantity will be the upper limit for the 68 -percent confidence interval. In a similar fashion, calculate the quantity of the item such that the percent of the group with more of the item is equal to the larger percentage found in step 2 . This quantity will be the lower limit for the 68percent confidence interval.
4. Divide the difference between the two quantities determined in step 3 by two to obtain the standard error of the median.

To perform step 3, it will be necessary to interpolate. Different methods of interpolation may be used. The most common are simple linear interpolation and Pareto interpolation. The appropriateness of the method depends on the form of the distribution around the median. If density is declining in the area, then we recommend Pareto interpolation. If density is fairly constant in the area, then we recommend linear interpolation. Note, however, that Pareto interpolation can never be used if the interval contains zero or negative measures of the item of interest. Interpolation is used as follows. The quantity of the item such that $p$ percent have more of the item is

$$
\begin{equation*}

if Pareto Interpolation is indicated and

$$

\end{array}\right]
$$

if linear interpolation is indicated, where

## Illustration.

To illustrate the calculations for the sampling error on a median, we return to Table 11. The median monthly income for this group is $\$ 2,158$. The size of the group is $39,851,000$.

1. Using Formula 8 , the standard error of 50 percent on a base of $39,851,000$ is about 0.5 percentage points.
2. Following step 2, the two percentages of interest are 49.5 and 50.5.
3. By examining Table 11, we see that the percentage 49.5 falls in the income interval from 2000 to 2499. (Since $55.5 \%$ receive more than $\$ 2,000$ per month, the dollar value corresponding to 49.5 must be between $\$ 2,000$ and $\$ 2,500$ ). Thus, $A_{1}{ }^{\prime} \$ 2,000, A_{2}{ }^{\prime} \$ 2,500, N_{1}{ }^{\prime} 22,106,000$, and $N_{2}{ }^{\prime}$ 16,307,000.

In this case, we decided to use Pareto interpolation. Therefore, the upper bound of a $68 \%$ confidence
interval for the median is

$$
\$ 2,000 \exp \left[\left(\operatorname{Ln}\left(\frac{(.495)(39,851,000)}{22,106,000}\right) / \operatorname{Ln}\left(\frac{16,307,000}{22,106,000}\right)\right) \operatorname{Ln}\left(\frac{2,500}{2,000}\right)\right] \cdot \$ 2174 .
$$

Also by examining Table 11 , we see that 50.5 falls in the same income interval. Thus, $A_{1}, A_{2}, N_{1}$, and $N_{2}$ are the same. We also use Pareto interpolation for this case. So the lower bound of a $68 \%$ confidence interval for the median is

$$
\$ 2,000 \exp \left[\left(\operatorname{Ln}\left(\frac{(.505)(39,851,000)}{22,106,000}\right) / \operatorname{Ln}\left(\frac{16,307,000}{22,106,000}\right)\right) \operatorname{Ln}\left(\frac{2,500}{2,000}\right)\right] \cdot \$ 2142 .
$$

Thus, the 68 -percent confidence interval on the estimated median is from $\$ 2142$ to $\$ 2174$. An approximate standard error is

$$
\frac{\$ 2174 \& \$ 2142}{2} \quad \$ 16 .
$$

Standard Errors of Ratios of Means and Medians. The standard error for a ratio of means or medians is approximated by:

$$
\begin{equation*}
s_{\left(\frac{x}{y}\right)}, \sqrt{\left(\frac{x}{y}\right)^{2}\left[\left(\frac{s_{y}}{y}\right)^{2} \%\left(\frac{s_{x}}{x}\right)^{2}\right]} \tag{13}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $x$ and $y$ are the means or medians, and $s_{x}$ and $s_{y}$ are their associated standard errors. Formula 13 assumes that the means are not correlated. If the correlation between the population means estimated by $x$ and $y$ are actually positive (negative), then this procedure will tend to produce overestimates (underestimates) of the true standard error for the ratio of means.

Standard Errors Using SAS or SPSS. Standard errors and their associated variance, calculated by SAS or SPSS statistical software package, do not accurately reflect the SIPP's complex sample design. Erroneous conclusions will result if these standard errors are used directly. We provide adjustment factors by characteristics that should be used to correctly compensate for likely underestimates. The factors called DEFF available in Table 4, must be applied to SAS or SPSS generated variances. The square root of DEFF can be directly applied to similarly generated standard errors. These factors approximate design effects which adjust statistical measures for sample designs more complex than simple random sample.

## SIPP DATA REVIEW

SIPP 1996 Wave 8: Adult Well BeingTopical Module

## INTRODUCTION

This report provides a review of the data quality of the wave 8 Adult Well Being topical module from the 1996 panel of the Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP). The questions cover several topical areas having to do with general living conditions. Similar questions were asked in previous SIPP surveys. The full module on "extended measures of well-being" was administered in the 1991 and 1992 panels, while a subset of "basic needs" questions were administered in the 1993 panel. The following shows the coverage areas for each of the panels.

To facilitate analysis and discussion below, the 1996 panel variables will be treated in two parts. The first consists of variables that have counter parts only in the 1991 and 1992 panels. For brevity, these will be called "living conditions" variables. Beware that this terminology is not used anywhere else but in this report. The second part, consisting of variables which also have counterparts in 1993, will be called by the same term used to describe the 1993 topical module -- "basic needs." Table 1 lists the variables in these two parts, divided into topical sections.

When they were asked, the questions on living conditions and basic needs remained identical across the first three panels (1991-1993) with the exception of food adequacy questions, which were revised slightly
in 1993. In the 1996 panel, questions sometimes differed from previous administrations of similar questions, in part due to the shift to a computer-based (CAPI) instrument.

The 1996 wave 8 topical module was administered during the fall (August through November) of 1998. Most questions referred to conditions existing at the time of interview. Questions on ability to meet expenses referenced the prior 12 months, questions on food adequacy reference the prior 4 months.

The purpose of this report is to examine the data in the context of sample attrition, item and module nonresponse, and to assess the overall reasonableness of the data. For comparison purposes, responses to other surveys are examined. Comparison is also made to responses to questions administered in Wave 6 of the 1991 panel, Wave 3 of the 1992 panel, and Wave 9 of the 1993 panel.

## SAMPLE ATTRITION

The 1996 Wave 8 Basic Needs data file is a rectangular file consisting of records for each individual in sample. The data were collected from only one respondent per household -- almost always the household reference person or his/her proxy. Therefore, the content of the topical module record is identical for each person in a household.

The number of households eligible for interviewing in Wave 8 was 35,018 . By this wave 2,265 households were not in sample, that is, they were a part of the original sample, but by this point in time had missed multiple interviews and were no longer interviewed. In addition, there were 3,214 cases which were eligible for interview, but could not be reached during Wave 8 . The interviewed sample, therefore, was 29,539 . Of these 27,300 , or about 93 percent, gave responses to the topical module, leaving 2,239 who provided no topical module information. ${ }^{1}$

Imputation was used to fill in information on non-respondents. Thus the final data file contains information on all 29,539 households in sample. Please note that imputations were not carried out on the 1991 to 1993 topical module files. Analyses of the data in those files are not strictly comparable to analyses of the 1996 panel files, except when steps are taken to account for different handling of missing data and non-response.

Table 2 shows the pattern of module nonresponse for several basic demographic factors. Tests for significant patterns of loss in the sample data from the prior wave are made using a chi-square test that has been adjusted for sample design. (The simple adjustment is to divide the calculated chi-square value by 3.) Using this method we find significant differences between respondents and nonrespondents by sex and education level. Males were less likely to be respondents. Nonresponding households were more often headed by people with exactly a high school education. Differences by age and race/ethnicity were not significant.

## ITEM AND MODULE NONRESPONSE

In addition to the loss of data caused by noninterviewed households and people, information is also lost because of item nonresponse.

## Part 1: Living conditions.

Table 3 shows nonresponse rates for each of the "living conditions" items in the module. For appropriate items, comparative nonresponse rates from the 1991 and 1992 panels are also given. The first thing to notice is that the overall response rate to the items in the module in the 1996 panel was lower than in 1991 and 1992. In the previous years, around 95 percent of eligible respondents provided valid answers to the initial questions in the module (questions on possession of consumer durables). In the 1996 panel the percentage providing answers to these questions was just over 91 percent. The largest part of the overall non-response for most questions was topical module non-response. Topical module non-response was also the largest part of the difference between 1996 and earlier years.

There are several potential reasons that topical module non-response was higher in the 1996 panel. First, the interview took place late in the panel, meaning that the cumulative effect of attrition had boosted the number of households that had ceased responding. Many of these households were still considered "in sample" while attempts to follow-up and recapture them for the survey were being conducted. Also, in order to minimize attrition, stricter rules on dropping households from sample were adopted in 1996.

This would increase the number of non-responding households in sample. Finally, part of the difference in topical module non-response may have to do with how topical module non-response was defined in each panel. In all panels, respondents with no answers to any topical module questions were considered topical module non-respondents, but decisions on how to handle "don't know" and "refusal" answers differed, and may affect these numbers. Since the partition of non-response between topical module nonresponse and item non-response varied from one panel to another, it is not wise to place too much weight on the comparison of item non-response for individual questions across surveys.

## Consumer durables

For the most part, item non-response levels for living conditions questions were fairly low, but somewhat higher than for comparable questions administered in the Extended Measures of Well Being topical modules in Wave 6 of the 1991 Panel and in Wave 3 of the 1992 Panel.

The lowest level of non-response among the "living conditions" variables was associated with the initial questions on consumer durables (washing machine, dryer, dishwasher, etc.). The item non-response to these questions ( $\mathrm{D}, \mathrm{R}$, or Blank) was in the range of 1 to 1.5 percent. This was around 0.5 percent higher than observed in 1991 and 1992.

## Housing conditions

The next few questions on housing quality (warmth, coolness, privacy, etc.), had lower levels of item non-response in the 1996 panel than earlier. One reason might be that a change in answer categories from a rating scale (1 to 10) in 1991 and 1992, to a set of four answers ("very satisfied", "somewhat satisfied", "somewhat dissatisfied", "very dissatisfied") in the 1996 panel. Questions in other sections of the topical module that made this switch in answer categories also had equal or lower item non-response rates in the 1996 panel.

## Crime

The questions on housing, crime and fear of crime all had item non-response rates of around 2.5 percent. Some of the crime-related questions had no counterparts in earlier surveys, but those that had slightly lower item non-response in the earlier panels.

## Neighborhood conditions

Questions on neighborhood conditions generally had good response rates, with the exception of the question on satisfaction with neighbors, where item non-response was 3.95 percent in the 1996 panel. It was also high in earlier panels. Some people may be reluctant to rate their neighbors, or may not know their neighbors.

## Community services

Community services questions had variable response rates. Almost 10 percent of respondents could not provide a rating of local public schools. This is somewhat puzzling, because in earlier panels, questions on schools didn't generate especially high non-response, and the questions were very similar.

The 1996 panel question was: "How satisfied are you with the local public schools in your neighborhood?"

The 1991-1992 question was: "On a scale of 1 to 10 , where 10 is the best and 1 is worst, how would you rate the following services or conditions in your neighborhood?
... Quality of education in local schools."
We have already seen that elsewhere, the 1 to 10 rating system produced poor results, so we would expect to have higher, not lower, nonresponse in the earlier panels. The only explanation that comes to mind is that failing to specify an interest in "quality of education" led more respondents to be unsure of their replies in the 1996 panel. Another possible explanation would be that the increasingly public debate on educational policy, which focuses on school quality as a policy concern, has led people to move away from automatically rating their schools positively.

Another question with very high non-response rates was EAPDIFF, "Would you or the other adults in the household prefer a different school for any child in this home?" This question was characterized by a high number of "blank" answers (although it did not have a high number of "don't know" or "refusal" responses).

## Part 2: Basic Needs.

Table 4 shows response rates for questions on basic needs. Here, contrast can be made with the 1993 topical module, as well as the 1991 and 1992 ones. The overall response rates for the first few questions in this section are close to what they were for the opening questions of the living conditions section. The 1993 wave 9 topical module stands out as having an especially low response rate -- in some cases less than 90 percent. This reinforces the idea that a large contributing factor in non-response is the age of the panel.

## Ability to meet basic needs

The questions on ability to meet needs generally had fairly high response rates, at least by comparison to previous panels. There was a bit lower non-response in 1991 and 1992, but generally higher nonresponse in 1993.

Due to the skip pattern in the CAPI instrument, the universe for the items EABEVCT (evicted) and EABCUT (utilities cut off) in the 1996 panel consisted of people who had affirmative answers to the prior questions EABRENT (didn't pay rent) or EABGAS (didn't pay gas or electric bill). In prior years, all respondents were asked the questions. However, in Table 4, only responses of those who answered "yes" to the previous questions are listed for 1991 to 1993, to facilitate comparison with the 1996 panel. Because topical module non-respondents could not have answered these previous questions, there was no topical module non-response shown for these questions in 1991 to 1993. However, due to item imputation, there were a few topical module non-respondents listed as having answered "yes" to previous questions in the 1996 panel.

Although nominal response rates were low for a few of the questions with limited universes (including EABEVCT, EABCUT and the questions on who helped), the small number of total responses to these questions makes it hard to make any judgement on their quality.

## Help when in need

The three questions on help when in need had lower overall response than many other questions, both in the 1996 panel and earlier. The 1996 panel response rate was generally higher than observed in the previous years' surveys.

## Food sufficiency and food security

The questions on food sufficiency produced non-response levels that were close to that observed with other questions in the module. The questions on months without food had high non-response, but there were relatively few individuals answering this question.

The questions on food security (EAFLAST through EAFDAY) are new with the topical module in the 1996 panel. They are a subset of the questions on food security asked in a supplement on this subject in the Current Population Survey. They seem to have performed at least as well as most other questions in the supplement, with overall response rates of 90 percent or higher.

## REASONABLENESS OF DATA: COMPARISON WITH PAST SIPP PANELS

Overall, the data collected in the 1996 panel wave 8 Adult Well-Being topical module appear to be well within the range that would be expected, based on the experience of previous panels of the SIPP. There are minor discrepancies here and there, due in large part to changes in question wording or skip patterns. Analysts who wish to make comparisons across waves should take note of the exact wording of questions in each panel. A discussion of similarities and differences in each section of the instrument is set out below.

## Part 1: Living conditions.

Table 5 shows the weighted percentage of households with various types of living conditions. Since the period from 1993 to 1998 was one of relative prosperity and economic growth in the United States, one would expect to find most living conditions improving, even if only moderately so.

## Consumer durables

There was very good agreement between the 1996 panel SIPP survey (collected in fall 1998) and previous years in the section on consumer durables. According to these results, there was an increase in the rate of ownership of dishwashers, televisions, VCR's, microwaves, air conditioners and computers. Ownership of other items remained stable, and none declined.

## Housing conditions

In the 1996 panel, the distribution of the number of rooms is very close to that observed in previous years, with a slight shift upward, as might be expected. The questions on specific housing problems generated a lower rate of cited problems in 1996 than earlier panels. Part of that can be explained by better conditions, but some may not. For example, the percentage with broken windows fell from over 7 percent to just around 4 percent. It is possible that question wording was responsible for this type of change -- the descriptions of specific problems, and the order in which they were read, were changed in 1996. It is also possible that better material conditions made small problems seem less worth mentioning.

The questions on satisfaction with various aspects of housing were changed from the 1991-1992 panel to the 1996 panel. In the earlier panels, respondents were asked to rate conditions on a scale of 1 to 10 , while in the 1996 panel they were asked a four-point satisfaction scale. To make comparisons, an ad-hoc scheme was used to recode the previous answers. Specifically, people who rated something a 9 or 10 were recoded as "very satisfied," people who rated something 6 to 8 were "somewhat satisfied," people who rated something 3 to 5 were "somewhat dissatisfied," and people who rated something 1 or 2 were "very dissatisfied." Direct comparisons of the 1996 and previous panels, therefore, is not possible. However, it is possible to examine whether a particular question generated high ratings relative to other questions in the same survey.

Of the questions on housing comfort, warmth and overall satisfaction got the highest ratings in all three panels. In 1991 and 1992, the next highest category was housing space, while in 1996 it was coolness of the home. This change may be due to the increased ownership of air conditioners, or, more likely, a change to the instrument that allowed those with no knowledge of the answer to explicitly say so.

The last question in the section is whether housing conditions are undesirable enough that the respondent would want to move. A lower percentage stated that they felt this badly in 1998 (1996 panel) than in 1991 and 1992. Part of the reason may be that respondents who responded they were "very satisfied" with their housing conditions were assumed in the 1996 panel not to want to move, while they were asked directly in the earlier panels.

## Crime

Answers to questions on crime produced highly variable results, when comparisons are made to answers in 1991 and 1992. Three of the 1996 panel questions did not have exact counterparts in earlier panels. Two of those that did went in opposite directions. People were more likely to say they stayed at home because of fear of crime in the 1996 panel than earlier. However they were less likely to say they carried something with them to protect themselves. Changes in the phrasing of these questions are probably responsible. In 1991-1992, the question on staying at home finished with the phrase "because you thought it would be unsafe to leave home," which was omitted from the 1996 question (although both referred to fear of crime as a motivation). In 1991-1992, the question on carrying something with you when you go out asked if you "ever" carry something with you, and this was, again, dropped from the 1996 panel question. Both these changes would, ex-ante, be expected to change responses in the observed direction.

The large decrease in fear of crime in home and neighborhood was not due to changes in question wording. The questions were nearly identical in all three panels. It is possible that with the widely publicized decreases in crime in the late 1990s, people genuinely felt safer. It may also be that respondents to the 1996 panel questionnaire handled the 4-point response categories differently, since they had already dealt with similar response scales on satisfaction with housing. Finally, it may also be that the shift from using "fairly" safe/unsafe to "somewhat" safe/unsafe in the 4-point scale in the 1996 panel resulted in changed responses.

## Neighborhood conditions

The first few questions on neighborhood conditions ask straightforward questions about specific problems. The number reporting these problems seem to have dropped by 2 or 3 percentage points between 1992 and 1998. This does not seem to be due to differences in question wording, as the questions did not change.

The next two questions on satisfaction are again a comparison of two types of response scale. In the 1996 panel, respondents were equally likely to rate highly their neighborhood and their neighbors. In 19911992, neighbors were rated more highly.

## Community services

The first question in the community services section is a rating of schools. Households answering this question (ones with children $0-18$ ) were consistent across waves. The 54 percent rating themselves "very satisfied" was one of the lower positive responses of any satisfaction question in the 1996 panel. Likewise, the 31 percent rating schools 9 or 10 on a 10 point scale was one of the lower positive responses of any satisfaction question in the 1991 or 1992 panels. The 1996 panel follow-up questions on school attendance and attitudes were not asked in the earlier panels.

The questions on satisfaction with health services, police and fire services turned up similar patterns in 1998 (1996 panel) as in 1991-1992. Fire services were rated somewhat more highly than the other two. The last few questions in the section are not directly comparable because of changes in wording or skip patterns.

## Part 2: Basic Needs.

## Ability to meet basic needs

With the exception of rent, the ability to meet expenses followed a similar pattern across three panels. Problems with ability to pay bills was highest in the 1991 and 1992 panels, dropped in 1993 and rose again in the 1996 panel. The reason for the different pattern observed in the questions on paying rent is not obvious. The wording changes from earlier panels to the 1996 panel were minor, and would not be expected to affect the response to questions about rent any differently than other questions.

The follow up questions on getting help when experiencing difficulty meeting basic needs generated very similar results in the 1996 panel to the ones obtained earlier, despite some reworking of these questions for the CAPI setting. While earlier respondents were given a flashcard listing 18 possible sources of help,
the 1996 panel simplified things down to a short list of 5 sources. Nonetheless, the proportion choosing each type (when appropriately recoded) remains the same, as does the proportion saying they received no help at all.

## Help when in need

The three questions on help expected when in need generated similar responses in the 1996 panel as they did in 1991 and 1992, although they were more optimistic about receiving help than the 1993 responses. There was an especially high proportion who expected help from friends and from other groups, which were higher in 1998 (1996 panel) than any earlier year. This was mostly due to a real change in sentiments, as question wording was not changed.

## Food sufficiency and food security

The first question on food in the household is generally referred to as the question on "food sufficiency." In 1993 the question had been changed from its original formulation to a two-part question, first separating out "not enough" food and then asking those with enough if it was the kind they wanted to eat. This resulted in a higher proportion answering "sometimes not enough" than in previous surveys. With the return to the original four-choice question in the 1996 panel, the distribution of answers returned to that observed in 1991-1992, except for a shift from those choosing "enough but not the kind we want" to "enough and the kind we want." Question wording changes probably do not have an influence here.

For those who said they fell short of food, the month(s) this occurred was determined. The answers in the 1996 panel resembled those in previous panels, with slightly more naming the most recent month. The balance of the question on household food security were not present in previous panels.

## REASONABLENESS OF DATA: COMPARISON WITH OTHER DATA SOURCES

The comparison of weighted survey estimates to estimates derived from other sources acts as another check of the general quality of the data. There are no nationally representative surveys that ask all the questions administered in the Adult Well Being topical module. However, comparisons can be made for selected items. In the review of the 1993 Wave 9 data, comparisons were made to surveys of basic needs of special subsets of the U.S. population. That comparison will not be repeated here.

## American Housing Survey

Table 7 compares selected results from the 1996 SIPP Adult Well Being topical module (fielded in fall of 1998) to results of similar questions asked in the 1999 American Housing Survey (AHS; fielded in the fall of 1999).

The two surveys show almost identical results in terms of possession of consumer durables. The items on clothes washers and dryers show slightly higher levels of positive response in SIPP. This may be due to the wording in AHS, which adds "in this apartment" to the end of the question on these two items. The item on number of rooms generated very similar numbers despite the more detailed approach taken in AHS towards determining this number.

Similar results were also obtained in questions on problems with house or neighborhood. The largest discrepancies involved questions three topics. In the question on pests, SIPP included insects while the AHS asked only about rats and mice. In the question on plumbing, SIPP asked a single, general question while the AHS asked about specific problems. Street noise problems were determined by a single question in SIPP, but a two part question in AHS, first asking if there is street noise, second if it is a problem.

There was a little less agreement in the three attitudinal items compared in Table 7. The question on public schools differed mainly in that the SIPP question asked about public schools in this neighborhood, while the AHS asked about the schools that the children attend. The question on public transportation differs because SIPP includes in the "no" category all those who feel that public transportation is inadequate, while the AHS question includes only those who actually use public transportation and find it inadequate.

Given the differences in the way many of the questions were posed, the agreement between the SIPP Wave 8 data and the 1999 AHS is quite remarkable.

## Computer Use Supplement, Current Population Survey

Computer ownership was not determined in the American Housing Survey, but questions on this subject were asked in the supplement in Computer Use in several years of the Current Population Survey (CPS). Because computer ownership has been rapidly growing, it is useful to compare the data obtained at several points in time. Table 8 shows responses on computer ownership from 1992 to 2000. The data obtained from the SIPP seem to fit with the numbers produced from CPS quite well.

## Gallup Poll on Fear of Crime

Another subject where things have been changing is fear of crime. The SIPP question on whether there is a place nearby where you would be afraid to walk at night was adapted from the same question appearing periodically in the national Gallup poll. The results of both surveys are shown in Table 9. Here there is a substantial difference between the percentages found from the two sources. Given the many differences in data collection methods, it is hard to pinpoint a reason for this discrepancy.

## Basic Needs Questions in National Survey of American Families

Table 10 shows a comparison of responses on basic needs questions between SIPP and the National Survey of American Families (NSAF). NSAF data were collected in February through October of 1999 under the auspices of the Urban Institute. The survey included 42,000 households in 13 states, weighted to produce national estimates.

The general question on ability to meet basic needs in NSAF was: "During the last 12 months was there a time when you were not able to pay your mortgage, rent or utility bills?" The SIPP question, by contrast, refers to "essential expenses" such as "mortgage or rent payment, utility bills, or important medical care." Not surprisingly, the broader SIPP question generated higher levels of positive response, but not much higher.

The two food security questions asked both in SIPP and NSAF generated reasonably good agreement. The question about food not lasting had almost identical response patterns. The question on adults skipping meals generated fewer responses in SIPP, probably because the skip pattern ensured that households that had indicated no other food problems were not asked this question.

## Food Security Supplement of the Current Population Survey

Table 11 shows the response pattern to the 1996 panel of the SIPP (fall 1998) and the 1998 Current Population Survey supplement on food security. The agreement in percentage of households agreeing with these items is fairly good. The small discrepancies that do exist (questions 3 through 5) are probably not due to question wording or skip patterns, as these are essentially identical. The major difference between the two surveys is that the reference period in SIPP is the past 4 months, while the reference period in the CPS is the past 12 months. The rate of positive responses in SIPP don't seem to be uniformly smaller, as would be expected from this difference.

## SUMMARY

The basic needs data collected in the 8th Wave of the 1996 panel of SIPP appears to be reasonable. Unfortunately, some of the measurement areas in this module cannot easily be validated. Unlike factual data on earnings and employment which can be contrasted with other survey and administrative data sources, many of the questions in the Adult Well Being topical module ask a household respondent to report a general attitude or characterization of events that have taken place in the household. The overall level of nonresponse to these questions, comparison to the few pieces of outside data that could be brought to bear, and the consistency of responses across panels all provide confidence that these data are reliable and useful for many types of analyses.
