CLAIMS 3 is a legacy case application tracking and processing system used for the adjudication of applications and petitions for immigration benefits and services except asylum and naturalization. CLAIMS 3 is the primary source of applicant/petitioner information that is used to perform background checks, conduct the examination (review of the information that is being provided by petitioners), and adjudication (decision process to grant or decline the petitioners application). The information within CLAIMS 3 is used to assist the examiner in verifying and corroborating applicant petitions through the use of business rules to ensure that the process is consistent with all applicable laws and regulations. CLAIMS 3 is a critical system to USCIS and is essential for case management. CLAIMS 3 resides in four service centers and the National Benefits Center and the Administrative Appeals Office Baltimore, Maryland, and channels information to over 90 district offices through the Integrated Case Management System (ICMS) Web Interface for the Family Based 485 Forms. CLAIMS 3 is used by approximately 5,000 USCIS Staff and is a source for accessing information for USCIS Performance Measurements and Production Numbers. Source of statistical information about the USCIS Mission and workload balancing, resource allocation, management evaluation, and information from CLAIMS 3 is assembled into the official administrative reports (G22) and the Performance Analysis System (PAS). Information from these reports are then submitted to Congress and other stakeholders. Deployed releases required to allow the system to support and process 9 digit A Numbers -Provided a table driven approach to adding Premium Processing to USCIS Benefits Applications. Improved data handling and repaired data integrity issues with some interfaces'- Completed extensive, detailed analysis to document and validate requirements of the CLAIMS 3 LAN system to create a baseline in preparation for technology improvements that will allow required security upgrades. Completed hardware refresh of all CLAIMS 3 LAN sites including server upgrades to Windows 2003 server and workstation upgrades to Windows XP. Implemented fee changes effective October 26, 2005. Implemented processes to provide LPR cards to aliens granted status as a result of EOIR processing. It is expected that CLAIMS 3 will remain in operation through FY12 at which time it would be phased out as newly developed case management systems come fully on line.
