# **OVERVIEW**

As the only university system with a primary mission to serve the North Texas region - the State's largest population center - the University of North Texas System is a critical partner in the future of Texas.

Texas public institutions of higher education play a key role in shaping the State's future by:

- Educating the populace with practical workforce skills and the ability to think creatively and imaginatively;
- · Stimulating economic development and providing expertise in many scientific, technical, social and civic endeavors;
- · Discovering new knowledge through fundamental and applied research;
- Enhancing the quality of life through creativity and discovery; and
- · Providing opportunities for continual personal growth and enrichment for Texas students and their families .

The University of North Texas System is dedicated to meeting these needs with excellence and integrity.

The UNT System awards more than 6,500 degrees each year, including the largest number of master 's and doctoral degrees in the region. More than 100,000 alumni live and work in the North Texas area.

Total enrollment for the UNT System is projected to increase to approximately 45,000 students by 2015.

The UNT System projects its campuses will play a significant role in meeting the needs of the State 's Closing the Gaps higher education plan . Specifically, we have projected UNT System institutions will contribute to meeting the goals of:

- Participation increasing total enrollment in higher education statewide.
- o UNT at Denton has experienced steady growth over the last nine years (growing from nearly 25,000 to more than 34,000 students) at a rate exceeding the THECB Participation and Success Forecast, 2003-2015. UNT at Denton expects to continue to grow, enrolling 39,211students (the official target submitted to the Coordinating Board) in 2015.
- o Enrollment at UNT Health Science Center at Fort Worth is also on target to meet or exceed targets set for Closing the Gaps. Since becoming a health science center in 1993, enrollment has grown steadily, since 2000, it has grown at a faster rate than any other health related institution in Texas.
- Success increasing the number of degrees, certificates and other quantifiable student successes from high quality programs (particularly in engineering and science).
  - o Since 2000, no other Texas university has increased its number of degrees awarded more than UNT, which awarded an additional 1,866 diplomas.
- o Last year, UNT Health Science Center had the largest graduating class in its history. In addition, the Graduate School is recognized as a Role Model Institution by the National Institutes of Health and National Science Foundation in mentoring underrepresented minorities in the biomedical sciences.
- Excellence increasing the quality of programs or services at Texas colleges and universities.
- o Seven of UNT at Denton's schools and colleges are nationally recognized by US News and World Report, and 10 of its programs are ranked among the nation's best. According to the 2008 US News and World Report rankings, UNT at Denton has the number one Counselor Education Program in Texas and the number one Master's Program in Public Administration City Management and Urban Policy in Texas. UNT was named among the top 50 colleges and universities in the United States based on the number of degrees conferred to minority students by Diverse: Issues in Higher Education Magazine.
- o For the seventh year in a row, U.S. News and World Report has ranked the University of North Texas Health Science Center 's Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine (TCOM) among the top 50 medical schools in the United States. TCOM placed 43rd on the list in Primary Care. The UNT Center for Human Identification is also nationally recognized in forensic and clinical genetics. In 2007, Hispanic Business magazine ranked TCOM as on of the "Top 20 Medical Schools for Hispanics" for a second year. In addition, TCOM recently earned the Texas Academy of Family Physicians ' "Medical School Award of Achievement" for the 12th consecutive year, and received top academic awards from the American Osteopathic Foundation for Educator of the Year, Emerging Leader, Best Researcher, and Outstanding Resident of the Year.
- Research increasing the amount of federal funding supporting research at Texas institutions (particularly in engineering and science).
- o UNT faculty pursue both basic and applied research. This year, young faculty were honored by winning some of the most prestigious national awards for research by new investigators, two NSF CAREER awards, and an Air Force Young Investigator award. UNT has achieved success through partnerships with the federal government, business and industry, and through efforts coordinated by its new Office of Research and Technology Transfer. Recent efforts include enhancing UNT 's science and technology facilities, including Discovery Park which houses corporate applied research tenants and a suite of nano characterization instruments unmatched in Texas and unique to the country.
- o UNT Health Science Center continues to experience growth in research expenditures, with a 40% increase for the period 2004-07. This growth rate is second in Texas only to M.D. Anderson, and above the average of 24% for Texas Health-Related Institutions. For the same period student growth has continued as well, with enrollment increasing 14.2%, including 37% for African-American students, and 41% for Hispanics.

# MISSION and COMPONENTS

The UNT System Administration is the central administrative office for the component institutions of the UNT System . While pursuing its distinctive mission of

enhancing the well-being of the North Texas region, the UNT System performs a set of functions similar to those carried out by its counterparts in Texas:

- Providing executive leadership;
- · Supervising on behalf of its Board of Regents the compliance of its components with federal, state and local laws, and Board policies;
- Ensuring cost savings and efficiencies by consolidating those functions which are best performed as a central service on behalf of the individual institutions so as to permit campus leaders to concentrate on carrying out their respective missions these functions include but are not limited to legal services, governmental relations at all levels, auditing and other financial functions, real estate acquisition, management and facilities planning and construction activities;
- · Representing its campuses before the Legislature and state and federal officials;
- Coordinating relationships with the region 's communities and organizations, as well as the other university systems; and
- · Securing, preserving and enhancing assets held in trust for the benefit of more than a single institution.

The three components of the UNT System include:

# **UNT** at Denton

Founded in 1890, UNT at Denton is the flagship university of the UNT System. With more than 34,000 students enrolled in 99 bachelor's, 104 master's and 49 doctoral degree programs, it is the state's fourth largest university, and the largest, most comprehensive university in the Dallas - Fort Worth region. UNT at Denton is a student-centered public research university.

Going into her third year as President, Dr. Gretchen M. Bataille has led a thorough review of all UNT Strategic Plans and has actively redeployed the university 's resources in support of its goals for academic excellence, continued student growth and success, and an expanded research and scientific agenda.

# UNT Health Science Center at Fort Worth

Established in 1970, the University of North Texas Health Science Center is composed of the Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine, the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences, the School of Public Health and the School of Health Professions. The center's Institutes for Discovery conduct leading-edge research on select health issues, including Aging and Alzheimer's, Primary Care, Musculoskeletal Medicine, Cancer and Blood Disorders, and Human Identification.

Dr. Scott Ransom is serving in his third year as the fifth president of the University of North Texas Health Science Center. He has brought a rigorous objective process of setting goals and measuring performance to every component of UNTHSC. The results of these efforts can be viewed in the 2007 Annual Report (http://www.hsc.unt.edu/news/documents/AnnualReport2007 2008.pdf).

The System acquired an additional 16 acres adjacent to the HSC campus in April 2005 and has now completed a master plan for the combined campus (available at http://www.hsc.unt.edu/masterplan/). The first building on the new property will start construction in Fall 2008. When completed, it will cover 118,000 square feet featuring spacious new auditoriums and lecture halls to serve our growing student population.

# UNT Dallas Campus (also known as the UNT System Center)

Established in 1999 to enhance access to public higher education in Dallas and Ellis counties, the UNT Dallas Campus offers junior-, senior- and graduate-level courses leading to bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees. Classes began in 2000 and, in January 2007, students moved into the first building on a 260 acre permanent campus.

Enrollment has grown each year, and in the fall of 2007 reached an enrollment of 1,874 students (814 FTE) in 197 course sections. Enrollment is on a trajectory to exceed the required 1,000 FTE students by fall of 2008 or 2009 (Enrollment History Chart; http://www.unt.edu/unt-dallas/enrollment.pdf). Once this threshold is accomplished, UNT Dallas Campus will evolve into UNT at Dallas, becoming the first public university in the city of Dallas.

The UNT System Board of Regents has authorized UNT Dallas Campus administrators and faculty to take all necessary steps to support the transition of the Dallas Campus to an independent institution for the fail 2010 academic semester. UNT at Dallas will offer bachelor's, master's, and selected doctoral and professional programs, complementing the degrees offered in the region with a focused mission to address urban workforce needs and encourage greater high school graduation and college attendance in an area underserved by higher education in the past.

# STRATEGIC THEMES & INITIATIVES

The UNT System is dedicated to excellence in its service to the State of Texas. With three campuses located along the critical Interstate 35 corridor and plans for expansion that will allow it to even better serve the critizens of Texas, the UNT System sees the following areas as opportunities in its endeavor to support the state's higher education needs.

# Transitional Funding for UNT Dallas

Transitional funding for the University of North Texas Dallas Campus is required in order to open the University of North Texas at Dallas as an independent, free-standing institution of the University of North Texas System in the Fall Semester 2010. Transitional funding will employ 43 additional full-time equivalent (FTE) faculty and 69 additional FTE staff to provide the infrastructure to open the university and to pursue accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS).

The timely opening of UNT Dallas is imperative to serve the growing population of citizens ages 15-18 in Dallas and the surrounding urban areas. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board estimates the number of college - age residents of North Texas will rise by 1,000,000 by 2015. The addition of these new faculty and staff will aid UNT Dallas as it becomes the first and only public university within the City of Dallas.

According to statistics from the Dallas Independent School District, the 12th largest school district in the nation, more than 158,000 students were enrolled in Dallas schools alone in the 2007-2008 academic year, with slightly more than 38,000 in high school. This creates a large pool of potential students from Dallas, a district the UNT Dallas Campus has already been working with directly to increase its high school graduation and college - going rates. In partnership with the UNT Dallas Campus and Cedar Valley College, starting in August 2008, the Dallas Independent School District will operate an Early College High School at Nolan Estes Plaza. As many as 4,000 students from DISD alone could be enrolled at UNT Dallas by 2010, and coupled with other regional demands, our university population should reflect target demographics for achieving the Participation Goal of Closing the Gaps, as defined by the Coordinating Board.

# Tuition Revenue Bond Authorization for Second Building

The University of North Texas Dallas Campus seeks \$18.5 million above the \$25 million currently authorized in Tuition Revenue Bonds to renew its original request to construct the second building necessary to accommodate student growth and faculty and administrative offices.

The \$25 million of Tuition Revenue Bond Authority previously approved would provide for 62,000 gross square feet of space; however, the additional \$18.5 million in authorization would allow construction of the 100,000 gross square feet originally requested to accommodate its current enrollment growth.

If funding is not released for the construction of a second building, so that it may be occupied by the Fall 2010 semester, the UNT Dallas Campus will face both an immediate and long term space deficit, with classroom and office space lagging far behind growth. Lack of classroom space would also jeopardize accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS), which has established minimum space requirements for the number of students projected at UNT Dallas and similar institutions.

Funding of a second building, which would contain laboratory space for science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) disciplines, will enhance program and degree offerings and expand the scope of the resulting workforce in Dallas and the remainder of Southern Dallas County. The introduction of life sciences will also better equip students coming to the university from local school districts and encourage more students to pursue careers in the STEM disciplines.

# UNT System College of Law

Located in downtown Dallas, the University of North Texas College of Law will provide a high - quality, affordable legal education in the largest metropolitan region in the U.S. without access to a public law school. Demand for legal education in the region is high; as evidenced by an increase of 65% in applications at the private SMU Dedman School of Law since 2001. Dallas County imports 30% of its attorneys from out-of-state law schools to meet regional demand.

The UNT College of Law will create greater access and opportunity for many qualified and diverse students to pursue a legal education closer to where they live. A public legal education will also reduce the average debt level of students who may otherwise forego a legal education or be forced to relocate.

The UNT College of Law will play a critical role in the revitalization of downtown Dallas by bringing hundreds of students, faculty and staff into the area. The new Main Street Garden Park will link the College of Law to the Universities Center at Dallas, creating a campus-like atmosphere.

# College of Law Tuition Revenue Bond

The City of Dallas has committed to donate land, the historic Old Municipal Building - valued at \$10 million - and up to \$16 million in renovation costs. TRB Authorization of \$40 million is sought to complete the estimated \$50+ million renovation costs to the Old Municipal Building and for temporary quarters in the Universities Center at Dallas. These facilities would house the UNT College of Law, a permanent law library and classroom space. With this City partnership, UNT System is able to bring significant matching funds to offset the cost to the State of a new professional program startup.

# **UNT System Office Operations**

The UNT System receives less than half the state operating funding per student of other systems. This means that UNT System campuses have added pressure on student costs and tuition rates due to the disproportionate burden of conducting standard central System functions. UNT System performs the same necessary central functions as other university Systems, e.g. legal, audit, construction management services, etc., but receives the lowest appropriation per FTSE in the state. Inadequate System funding produces weakened oversight by the System, a reduction in standard central services, or an increase in student expense.

The State needs stronger Systems of higher education in order to carry out State policy priorities, support effective Boards of Regents, improve campus accountability, and maintain affordable higher education opportunity. In order for a System to carry out its mission as an agent of State policy, and best represent its Board of Regents, it cannot be completely financially dependent on its own campuses. Investing in a fair method of university System operations financing will ensure all Systems in Texas have the opportunity to fulfill these basic missions, seek increased efficiencies and pursue both accountability and transparency in operations.

The Universities Center at Dallas(UCD) has been providing undergraduate and graduate degree programs since 1994 at a convenient location in downtown Dallas. Enrollment steadily increased from 23 students in the summer of 1994 to the current enrollment of approximately 1,000 students each semester. The Universities Center at Dallas is a Multi-Institution Teaching Center (MITC), which offers courses sponsored primarily by: the University of North Texas and Texas A&M University, Commerce. Courses have also been offered by the University of Texas at Arlington, Texas Woman's University, University of Texas at Dallas, and the Dallas County Community College District. The member institutions cooperate in the offering of upper division undergraduate and graduate courses that may be applied to programs offered by the partner institutions. The UCD is an 88,000 square foot facility that will offer more than 50 courses in fall 2008.

The UNT System currently maintains Dallas offices for the Chancellor and other System officials at the UCD. The UCD is also home to UNT 's Texas Fashion Collection, Fashion on Main - an exhibition space to showcase items from its prestigious collection. And in September 2006, UNT economists Dr. Bernard Weinstein and Dr. Terry Clower opened the Dallas office of UNT 's Center for Economic Development and Research at the UCD.

# Federation of North Texas Area Universities

The Special Item Funding request for the Federation includes the appropriation made through the University of North Texas System in the 2010-2011 biennium.

Background checks: Criminal history checks are conducted for all incoming regular faculty and staff positions. We use a third party provider that offers a comprehensive criminal history check including nationwide and international jurisdictions. All checks are conducted in accordance with applicable Federal and state law and managed in a secure and confidential manner. (Texas Education Code 51.215 gives authority to run the checks; Texas Government Codes 411.085, 411.094, and 559.002 and the Fair Credit Reporting Act all provide guidance on requirements for process/procedures.)

Approach to 10% Reduction Exercise: UNT System applied the 10% reduction proportionally to each of the non-formula items that were included in the calculation of the 10% requirement.

# SUMMARY

The University of North Texas System will request funds to sustain the current high quality level of services provided to its students as well as funding in specific areas.

We look forward to the opportunity to earn additional support from the 81st Legislature. Within the resources available, the UNT System respectfully requests the following issues be addressed during this session:




# STRATEGY DESCRIPTION AND JUSTIFICATION:

FYs 2007 and 2008 expended amounts represent the debt service for the first building at the Dallas campus. FY2009 debt service is budgeted to increase by the anticipated debt service on \$25 million in authorized bonds for the second building. The issuance of these bonds is contingent upon reaching enrollment requirements within a defined period of time.

We anticipate that during the 81st Legislative Session, the legislature will allow for a review of the existing enrollment requirements for issuing these bonds. Our hope is legislative action will result in a revision of the requirements, providing us the opportunity to begin construction of critical classroom and administrative space to accommodate our growing campus.

In January 2000, the Dallas Campus opened as a system center in a leased facility in southern Dallas. The UNT Dallas Campus operates to enhance educational access to over 910,000 people in southern Dallas and Ellis counties. Many of these citizens are underserved and under-represented in public university education. The Dallas Campus offers upper-level and graduate courses leading to bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees. For most of its students, the location of the Dallas Campus is critical as they are "place bound" because of one or more factors such as traffic congestion, insufficient public transportation, the nature of their jobs or home responsibilities. Money to attend an independent college is often not available. The number of the Dallas Campus' programs has grown to fifteen undergraduate and eight graduate degree, as well as nine certificate, programs. UNT's programs at the Dallas Campus, which local employers have identified as meeting current or future needs, include computer science, information science, criminal justice, teacher certification (including bilingual education), and business. As of May 2004, over 191 students in 8 classes have graduated from the University of North Texas by completing the majority of their course work at the UNT Dallas Campus. Dallas Campus enrollment continues to grow and should reach 1,000 students in full-time equivalents (FTEs) by the end of the 2007 biennium.

# EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS IMPACTING STRATEGY:

With large numbers of citizens under-represented in higher education, Dallas offers an excellent opportunity to help the state reach the goals in THECB plan, Closing the Gaps, of increasing the number of degrees earned by Texas citizens. The Dallas Campus will help the state reach this goal because its purpose extends beyond college degree completion to include reaching out and motivating more students to finish high school and earn a college degree. According to the Coordinating Board's latest Regional Plan for Higher Education, the Metroplex, Gulf Coast, and South Texas regions of the state, will account for almost 77 percent of Texas' enrollment growth from 2003 through 2015. Consequently, partnerships formed between the UNT Dallas Campus, area community colleges, and independent school districts in the Dallas/Fort Worth and North Texas region will be essential to increasing the high school graduation and college going rates in these areas. The creation of UNT Dallas will significantly enhance these efforts. Current plans are to seek approval from THECB to open UNT at Dallas for the 2010 Fall Semester.



### STRATEGY DESCRIPTION AND JUSTIFICATION:

The Federation of North Texas Area Universities is a consortium comprised of Texas A&M University at Commerce (TAMU-C), Texas Woman's University (TWU), and the University of North Texas (UNT).

The Federation was mandated in 1968 by a resolution of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board for the purpose of forming a cooperative arrangement among three north Texas institutions: TAMU-C, TWU, and UNT. The purpose of the Federation is to promote cost-effective responses to the expressed need for graduate education in the rapidly growing North Texas region while avoiding unnecessary duplication of faculty, course offerings, and degree programs. The Federation is governed through bylaws and procedures that are approved by the Coordinating Board. In 1988, the Coordinating Board conducted an assessment of all non-research special items. In its report to the Texas Legislature, the Coordinating Board concluded, "The Federation is the type of cooperative activity between universities that the Coordinating Board has sought to encourage. Special item funding is a cost-effective way to pay for such an effort."

## STRATEGY DESCRIPTION AND JUSTIFICATION:

The mission of the Universities Center at Dallas(UCD) calls for the UCD: (1) to be an auxiliary location for a number of institutions, designed to allow the institutions to deliver a part of their usual academic programs offered on their main campuses, at the UCD site in downtown Dallas; (2) to not be a free-standing college of university, nor to seek accreditation for course or programs separate from the accreditation provided for courses and programs on the participating institutions' main campuses; (3)to provide coordinated offerings among participating institutions to minimize duplication and also to work to combine offerings across institutional programs; and (4)to be subject to the educational decision making procedures of each of the participating institutions in matters concerning courses and educational programs provided by that institution.

The UCD has been providing programs since 1994. Since summer 1994, enrollment has steadily increased from 23 students to the current enrollment of approximately 1,000 students each semester. The UCD is a Multi-Institution Teaching Center (MITC), with courses sponsored primarily by: the University of North Texas and Texas A&M University, Commerce. Courses have also been offered by the University of Texas at Arlington, Texas Women's University, University of Texas at Dallas, and the Dallas County Community College District. The member institutions cooperate in offering upper division undergraduate and graduate courses. The UCD will offer more than 50 courses in fall 2008.

# **DESCRIPTION / JUSTIFICATION:**

**FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT POSITIONS (FTE):** 

The timely opening of UNT Dallas is imperative to serve the growing population of citizens ages 15-18 in Dallas and the surrounding urban areas. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board estimates the number of college-age residents of North Texas will rise by 1,000,000 by 2015. The addition of these new faculty and staff will aid UNT Dallas as it becomes the first and only public university within the City of Dallas.

According to statistics from the Dallas Independent School District, the 12th largest school district in the nation, more than 158,000 students were enrolled in Dallas schools alone in the 2007-2008 academic year, with slightly more than 38,000 in high school. This creates a large pool of potential students from Dallas, a district the UNT Dallas Campus has already been working with directly to increase its high school graduation and college-going rates. As many as 4,000 students from DISD alone could be enrolled at UNT Dallas by 2010, and coupled with other regional demands, our university population should reflect target demographics for achieving the Participation Goal of "Closing the Gaps," as defined by the Coordinating Board.

Enrollment at the Dallas Camps has grown steadily each year for the past seven years, and we believe the goal of 1,000 FTE students will be achieved prior to the Fall 2009 Semester. For example, in the Fall 2007 Semester, the UNT Dallas Campus had 1,874 students in headcount (with 814 FTE) in 197 course sections.

Over 600 students have graduated from UNT as of May 2008 by completing the majority of their course work at the Dallas Campus. More than \$12 million has been donated to the Dallas Campus and the future UNT Dallas. However, in order to open UNT Dallas for the 2010 Fall Semester, to achieve SACS accreditation in a timely manner, and to provide a broad and secure foundation for future growth and development of the new University, the requested transitional funding of \$6.34 million must be secured.

#### **DESCRIPTION / JUSTIFICATION:**

The University of North Texas Dallas Campus requested a 100,000 square foot building in 2004 and now seeks \$18.5 million above the \$25 million currently authorized in Tuition Revenue Bonds in order to be able to construct the second academic building on campus with the necessary space to accommodate student growth, faculty office spaces, and administrative offices.

The \$25 million of Tuition Revenue Bond Authority previously approved would provide for 62,000 gross square feet of space; however the additional \$18.5 million in authorization would allow construction of the 100,000 gross square feet originally requested to accommodate its current enrollment growth.

If funding is not released for the construction of a second building, which is needed now and will be urgent by the Fall 2010 semester, the UNT Dallas Campus will face both an immediate and a long term space deficit, with classroom and office space lagging far behind growth. Lack of classroom space would also jeopardize accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS), which has established minimum space requirements for the number of students projected at UNT Dallas and similar institutions.

Funding of a second building, which would contain laboratory space for science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) disciplines, will enhance program and degree offerings and expand the scope of the resulting workforce in Dallas and the remainder of Southern Dallas County. The introduction of life sciences will also better equip students coming to the university from local school districts and encourage more students to pursue careers in the STEM disciplines.

#### **DESCRIPTION / JUSTIFICATION:**

The University of North Texas System, with significant support from the Dallas community, has moved forward with its plans for a College of Law in downtown Dallas and, contingent upon authorization, requests Exceptional Item Funding for startup costs. The City of Dallas has pledged the land, the building and significant renovation costs to convert the Old City Hall building into the UNT Dallas College of Law. The law school would anchor a UNT complex extending to two sides of a new City Park in the heart of a proposed major downtown redevelopment. The resources requested for FY 2010 will allow us to recruit and hire a Dean, Associate Dean of Admissions, Associate Dean of Academics, Law Librarian, and administrative and support staff as well as providing operating funds to support the facilities and the recruiting efforts. In the second year, salaries increase to \$2,523,548 as additional faculty and administrative staff are hired and final preparations for the first 75 students are completed including purchases for establishing a law library (\$1,000,000).

#### **EXTERNAL/INTERNAL FACTORS:**

The DFW region has a population of over 6.1 million, representing the largest, most educated population in Texas. Yet, DFW is the largest metropolitan region in the United States without a public law school. Texas has four public law schools but none in the DFW area. The needs of DFW demand an affordable opportunity for legal education. A public law school would increase opportunities for DFW baccalaureate graduates to attend a regional law school without costs associated with relocation or attendance at a private institution. Average Texas private law school tuition (\$26,046) is almost twice the average of Texas public law school tuition (\$14,493.) In 2005, the average student debt carried from private law school students was over \$78,000 (approximately \$27,000 more than for public law school graduates).



#### **DESCRIPTION / JUSTIFICATION:**

The project will renovate the former Dallas City Hall at Elm and Harwood as the permanent home of the UNT College of Law. The law school will occupy the entire building and will have the potential to use the attached Municipal Annex building for expansion space in the future. The City Hall is a historic structure (circa 1912) located in downtown Dallas in the heart of an area planned for major redevelopment with a new city park and massive apartment/office conversion projects across the block.

The City of Dallas has offered the building for the permanent use of the State of Texas, if the law school becomes its occupant, and the City Council voted in July, 2008 to authorize expenditure of \$16 million in City funds for needed renovations to the exterior to repair the building's roof and windows and other support structures. The City will consider transfer of the land to the State in the future, in accordance with their bond provisions and other laws.

The UNT System will use a small portion of this TRB (perhaps \$2-3 million) for renovations of temporary classroom and faculty office space in the Universities Center of Dallas building, owned by the UNT System across the block from the future UNT College of Law. This will enable the UNT College of Law to begin operation in the fall of 2010, several years before the completion of the complex renovations of the historic former City Hall.

The UNT College of Law will initially build an enrollment of 500 students in the former City Hall and will expand to 750 students when space permits. The total project renovation cost of \$56 million includes the City's investment of \$16M, resulting in a Tuition Revenue Bond request of \$40 million. The City's donation of the site and structure is an additional local match of a value estimated at \$10 million, for a total local commitment of \$26 million.



#### **DESCRIPTION / JUSTIFICATION:**

The UNT System receives less than half the state operating funding per student of other systems. This means that UNT System campuses have added pressure on student costs and tuition rates due to the disproportionate burden of conducting standard central System functions. UNT System performs the same necessary central functions as other university Systems, e.g. legal, audit, construction management services, etc., but receives the lowest appropriation per FTSE in the state. Inadequate System funding produces weakened oversight by the System, a reduction in standard central services, or an increase in student expense.

The State needs stronger Systems of higher education in order to carry out State policy priorities, support effective Boards of Regents, improve campus accountability, and maintain affordable higher education opportunity. In order for a System to carry out its mission as an agent of State policy, and best represent its Board of Regents, it cannot be completely financially dependent on its own campuses. Investing in a fair method of university System operations financing will ensure all Systems in Texas have the opportunity to fulfill these basic missions, seek increased efficiencies and pursue both accountability and transparency in operations.

Provide funds for the operation of the UNT Dallas Campus. The mission of the Campus is to: (1) Increase the number of citizens in Dallas and the north Texas region who hold bachelor's and master's degrees, and (2) Implement programs and partnerships that will help to increase the high school graduation and college-going rates in these areas.

The following items highlight major mission activities:

- As of May 2008, over 600 students have graduated from UNT by completing the majority of their course work at the Dallas Campus.
- Secured a \$1.1 million gift from the Texas Instruments Foundation to establish a Bachelor of Arts in Mathematics (with teach certification) program. The program provides scholarships for 50 Texas Instruments Foundation Math Scholars to cover tuition and fees and to provide a book allowance of up to \$500 per semester.
- Signed a concurrent admissions agreement with the Dallas County Community College District to allow students to transfer more smoothly to the UNT Dallas Campus.
   Memorandums of Understanding have been signed with several community colleges to enhance student recruiting, student advising, and financial aid and scholarship opportunities.
- The establishment of an Early College High School in partnership with the Dallas Independent School District and Cedar Valley College to begin at the start of the 2008-2009 academic year and numerous outreach programs to encourage more youths to complete high school and attend college.

#### (3) (a) Major Accomplishments to Date:

- 1. Enrollment increased from 45 in fall 1999 to 204 the first semester the facility was open (2000) and to 1,874 in fall 2007. FTE has increased from 9 to 814 in the same time period. The number of courses increased from 43 in fall 2000 to 1977 in fall 2007.
- 2. In Fall 2008, 19 undergraduate, 11 graduate, and 8 certificate programs will be offered at the Campus. This is an increase from a total of 19 in spring 2000.
- 3. The City of Dallas donated 202 acres and Runyon Springs developers gave another 57 acres to UNT System for the campus. Five additional acres have been purchased bringing the physical plant to 264 acres.
- 4. The first building for UNT at Dallas is completed and has been occupied since January 2007. The UNT System Board of Regents approved the Academic Plan for UNT Dallas in May 2006 and a start date of 2010-2011 for opening UNT at Dallas.
- 5. Forty-five faculty lines in education, business and community services have been funded for the Dallas Campus.
- 6. An agreement has been reached with the Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART) to allow any student who attends the UNT Dallas Campus a free pass to ride on DART to the Campus.
- 7. Established a new scholarship program which awards any student in the Dallas County Community College District who has a "Rising Star Scholarship" a "Complete the Dream Scholarship" when the student transfers to the UNT Dallas Campus.

# B. Assessment of Fiscal Year 2006 - 2007 Efforts to Meet HUB Procurement Goals

#### Attainment:

The University of North Texas attained or exceeded 2 of 5\*, or 40%, of the applicable statewide HUB procurement goals in fiscal year 2006.

The University of North Texas attained or exceeded 3 of 5\*, or 60%, of the applicable statewide HUB procurement goals in fiscal year 2007.

#### Applicability:

The category of Heavy Construction is not applicable to the agency's operations because we do not have programs or projects related to this field.

#### **Factors Affecting Attainment:**

UNT makes many specialized purchases throughout the fiscal year of scientific equipment for various labs and research on campus. Professional services and other services often require specialized knowledge, skills and experience. Due to the specialization required, there are few, if any, HUB vendors in these fields. A lack of HUB vendors in the Denton area has also contributed to UNT's inability to attain some statewide HUB goals. However, the agency made significant progress from the previous reporting periods.

#### "Good-Faith" Efforts:

The UNT System, in coordination with UNT, conducted outreach with all 45 area Chambers of Commerce including the 4 Black, 4 Hispanic, 2 Native American, and 2 Asian Chambers. UNT also attended and participated in various events with related associations of these Chambers and with many of the Contractor/Bldg Associations in the DFW Area. In addition, UNT attends many Vendor Fairs and Economic Opportunity Forums each year. UNT and the UNT System host a Vendor Fair annually that includes representation from over 50 HUB Certified Vendors and is attended by over 250 employees.

Information is shared with campus departments in regards to HUB vendors and the goods/services they sell. Internal expenditure reports were created for UNT System depts.. that provide detailed data by university system account number, dept. or administrative reporting area related to purchases made to HUB Certified Vendors, Minority Vendors and Other Vendors for all HUB procurement categories recognized by the State. Information is also disseminated via e-mail, a HUB website and a monthly newsletter.

# Rank / Name Explanation of Impact to Programs and Revenue Collections

System Office Operations

The UNT System has requested exceptional item funding to provide an equitble appropriation to help UNT System cover a portion of it's operating costs now covered by the component insitutions. Retention of these funds will help us reach the more equitable level

UNT Systen Center at Dallas

A 10% reduction in the appropriation for the UNT Dailas Campus would significantly impede the ability of the campus to grow its enrollment and to meet the goal of opening UNT Dailas in the Fall Semester of 2010 Additionally, the Campus could not contribute to the goals of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board Plan, "Closing the Gaps." Additionally, a 10% reduction in funding would also mean that faculty and staff hiring would be frozen at current levels and the campus would not be able to meet anticipated rising costs for maintenance and operations of the physical plant. Most significantly, the 10% reduction would compromise the State of Texas' investment of \$34,770,335 in Special Item.

Federation of North Texas Area Universities

This reduction will impact the number of Federated projects we are able to fund in the 2010-11 biennium.

4 Universities Center at Dallas

A 10% reduction would impact our ability to provide a full-range of student services during peek student use periods. Those services include general use computer labs which are open between 3 P M and 10 P M daily We would have to curtail the hours of operation for these labs.
