"This year's hunt was unique because part of the hunt was held in Rocky Creek Park which had an over abundance of deer, where a reduction in population was really needed," said Gustafson.

On Saturday, the hunters, Corps staff and many other volunteers met at the lake office between 4:00 and 5:00 a.m. for breakfast before heading out to their hunting blinds. "Debra Rhodes, a local school teacher and summer ranger for the Corps, came to the office and cooked breakfast for everyone," said Gustafson.

After breakfast, the hunters headed out, only taking a break for lunch which was provided by the Somerville Lions Club.


Fort Worth kicks up its heel in Washington

Do you sing in the shower? No


