### FROM THE DIRECTOR

### THE NEW CLASS IS PERFORMING WELL

The 2003-2004 Class kicked off the year with a vigorous and fun orientation and retreat. The Class bonds formed quickly as we went through the various ropes course exercises at Airlie House. We added some new exercises to the retreat that challenged the Fellows and increased the camaraderie within the class. The Fellows are off to a great start this year both as a class and as individuals.

Again this year, the Fellows' placements are strong. Their projects have been quite substantive and the Fellows are interacting on a regular basis with high level officials. I am continuing to meet with the Principals early in the year to ensure that the Fellows have a first rate placement. Already, they have been involved in developing new policies, including the "HealthierUS" initiative, homeless veteran's issues, men's health programs, and international currency. The Fellows also have traveled as part of their placements – including trips to Baghdad, Afghanistan, Uzbekistan, Paris, and to Cancun for the World Trade Organization Meeting. The Principals continue to be pleased with the work of their Fellows and are complimentary of the White House Fellows Program.

The Education Program has been as busy as ever. The Fellows already have been to New York and Quantico, and have met with Cabinet Secretaries, authors, corporate executives, the media, and many others. In November, the Fellows participated in the first "Results Seminar," that we designed to provide insight on how the White House and agencies interact to achieve results. We used the "No Child Left

# FELLOWS COMPLETE FIRST DOMESTIC POLICY STUDY TRIP

he 2003-2004 Class of White House Fellows "took a bite out of the Big Apple," traveling to New York from November 3 – 6, 2003. The Class examined the challenges that the Nation faces in an increasingly global world with a trip theme of "Window to the World – Leading at Home and Abroad."

The trip kicked-off with a meeting with Robert Rubin, CitiGroup's Executive Committee Chairman and former Treasury Secretary. The Fellows discussed the U.S. and global economies, corporate governance, and government regulation issues. During a meeting with HBO executives – Stephen J. Scheffer and Richard Plepler – the class learned about corporate mergers and acquisitions, the influence of technology on business, and the importance of risk-taking and innovation.

The Fellows had the opportunity to examine the inner-workings of the United Nations during meetings with Deputy Secretary-General Louise Frechette and Ambassador James B. Cunningham. The class also learned how the United Nations is addressing humanitarian affairs and emergency relief issues.

The award was presented as part of the White House Fellows 2003 Annual Meeting held in Washington, D.C. on October 23-25, 2003. The award recognizes Tim's steadfast commitment to public service and the White House Fellows Program. His dedication can be summed up in his vision, continuing renewal, and commitment to developing America's young leaders.

In accepting the award, Senator Wirth said, "I am grateful for this award. I have been lucky and blessed with many mentors -- and John Gardner was the first among them. I am deeply indebted to my year as a Fellow. The year reinforced latent instincts, brought them to the surface, and strongly shaped the next 35 years of my life."

Tim has dedicated himself to attacking some of the world's most intractable problems. To those battles, he brings unflagging energy, creativity, and a passion for

In addition to the alumni "Recruit 2" campaign, we have nearly doubled our database of outreach contacts and have increased significantly the number of information sessions. We also challenged the most recent classes to surpass the alumni "Recruit 2" target and instead "Recruit 4" high quality candidates – and they appear to be meeting the challenge!

The WHF Alumni, Commissioners, and Regional Panelists all have been extremely supportive of our recruiting efforts – holding information sessions, speaking about the program, preparing articles and op-eds, sending email messages, and working one-on-one with applicants. We thank you for your support!

We were pleased to learn that Senator Chuck Hagel distributed a press release encouraging Nebraskans to apply for the Fellows program. We plan to use this press release as a model to encourage other elected officials to distribute similar press releases to their constituents.

Already, we are seeing results. For the month of November, the www.white-house.gov/fellows Web traffic was 25% higher than last year. We are hopeful that the quantity of quality applications will increase again this year.

## PRODUCTION OF NEW PROMOTIONAL DVD UNDERWAY

As most of you know, we are in the process of developing a new promotional DVD that will highlight the rich 40 year history of the White House Fellows Program. It will be used to support recruiting and fundraising efforts, as well as to raise awareness of the program. The DVD will include interviews with program alumni, former and current principals, speakers, commissioners, and others. The film also will include a range of historical footage, photographs, and action shots of the current class of Fellows on policy study trips and in their agency placements.

The DVD will be a useful tool for alumni to use for recruiting and at information sessions. It also will be available on the program Web site and widely distributed in the program brochure. We also plan to include the program application on the DVD to make it easy for recruits to apply, as the application can be downloaded from the DVD.

I want to thank Steve Poizner ('01-02) again for providing half of the funding for the DVD. It is a great contribution to the program and I know I speak for all the alumni in thanking Steve for his generosity. The White House Fellows Foundation has made the generous offer to provide the remaining funds. The program office thanks the Foundation for helping to make this new DVD possible.



# FELLOW/SCORNER

rom November 9-14, 2003, I accompanied Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman on a visit to Uzbekistan, Afghanistan, and Iraq along with a delegation of U.S. Department of Agriculture officials, journalists, and other members of the private sector. The trip allowed the group to evaluate developments in these countries, and how to leverage the Department of Agriculture's resources to contribute to



national development and reconstruction. It was an extraordinary experience, and left a profound impression on me.

What is clear in Afghanistan and Iraq is that significant gains are being made, but more remains to be done. It is apparent that agriculture is central to the development and reconstruction efforts in all three countries.

Our first stop was Uzbekistan. There, a group of Soviet-looking military officers and bouquet-toting girls met us on the tarmac, and I felt as if I'd been transported back in time. Indeed, the transition from a centrally planned economy to a market oriented one has been slow in Uzbekistan. Nevertheless, Uzbekistan has a relatively solid infrastructure and an educated public and appears ready to march ahead.

The flight from Uzbekistan to Kabul is less than two hours, but a world of differences separate these two neighboring

White House Fellow Tim Docking travels with his Principal, Agriculture Secretary Ann Veneman, on a threenation visit to Uzbekistan, Afghanistan, and Iraq. states: one, constrained and endowed by its history of peaceful totalitarian rule; the other, haunted by a history of religious fanaticism, violence, and state collapse.

Today, the social and physical building blocks in Uzbekistan are almost absent in Afghanistan. Persistent gaps in security, a slow return to the rule of law, and a crumbling infrastructure complicate the reconstruction effort.

Nevertheless, we encountered dozens of Afghanis, Americans, and coalition members who were committed to rebuilding the country and consolidating peace. One area where we saw progress was with Afghanistan's women. Secretary Veneman spent time with numerous women's groups. We observed the once ubiquitous burkas being slowly peeled away and the naissance of woman's cooperatives, health clinics, and mother/child feeding centers.

The final stop, Iraq, presented the delegation with a metaphorical bridge between Uzbekistan's stable authoritarianism and Afghanistan's violent chaos.

Iraq has attributes found in both societies: an educated population endowed with oil, water and 12 percent arable land, while at the same time it is saddled with a violent and corrupt past that in many ways froze the nation in time.

The delegation spent a day in Baghdad exchanging ideas with American and Iraqi authorities about the redevelopment of Iraq's long-neglected agricultural sector. The corkscrew landings in C-130s and Black Hawk helicopter rides were hair-raising. But, the strangest experience was spent in Saddam's marble pool house and on the grounds of his palace, now serving as the headquarters for the Coalition Provisional Authority.

On our final day in Iraq, we traveled to Mosul and Erbil to meet with farmers, agriculture ministry officials, and Americans aiding with the reconstruction. I was impressed in Iraq by the abundance of hard-working, committed locals, and their American and international counterparts.

In northern Iraq, I spoke with members of the 101st Airborne who had participated in the defeat of the Taliban before fighting their way from Kuwait up to Mosul. One Army Colonel summed up the challenges and progress that is being made in Iraq and Afghanistan when he described the dangerous process of rooting terrorists out of the urban areas. He then discussed with pride his role in organizing a soccer league for the children of Mosul.

The first day of the trip concluded with a White House Fellows Alumni Reception and Information Session hosted by **Khalid Azim** ('99-00) and **Gaynor McCown** ('93-94). The event was a huge success, with more than 100 attendees. Alumni had the chance to meet the new class, while potential recruits learned about the program and interacted with the current class and alumni.

Day Two of the policy trip began with a meeting with Hank McKinnell, Pfizer, Inc.'s Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer. Mr. McKinnell provided the Fellows with insight on collaboration between the private sector, non-governmental organizations, and government to solve problems.

The Fellows spent the remainder of the day at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point as the guests of Lieutenant General Bill Lennox ('86-87). The class attended briefings and simulations related to the military and academic training at West Point. They got a first-hand look at life at the Academy through discussions with the cadets during lunch at the mess and at a reception at the home of Lieutenant General and Mrs. Lennox. The Fellows had the added benefit of being accompanied throughout the day by Colonel

Maggie Belknap ('92-93) and Colonel Robert L. Gordon III ('92-93).

On Day Three, the class visited ABC News for a panel discussion with Jon Banner, Executive Producer World News Tonight, and Mark Halperin, ABC Political Director. The class had a dialogue regarding the media's perspective on working with the White House and the media's role in providing the American people with information. Next, the Fellows toured the New York Stock Exchange and gained a unique perspective on the workings of the exchange through conversations with traders on the floor.

At City Hall, the Fellows spent time with Mayor Michael Bloomberg. They had an in-depth discussion of the differences between leading in government versus the private sector, as well as the impact of media scrutiny on public officials and their ability to achieve results. The class then met with Roland Betts, Chairman and Founder of Chelsea Piers, L.P. Mr. Betts shared his insights with respect to the impact of September 11th, as well as the redevelopment of Lower Manhattan.

The final day of the policy study trip started with a visit to the *Wall Street Journal* with **Paul Gigot ('86-**

87) and White House Fellows Commissioner Bill McGurn. The class delved into a wide range of issues – the Fellowship experience, how the Wall Street Journal has adapted to meet the demands of its readers, and the upcoming Presidential election. In the offices of New York Attorney General Eliot Spitzer, the Fellows heard Mr. Spitzer's views on the importance of forming a strong team to achieve results, facilitate change, and best serve the people. Later in the day, Credit Suisse First Boston hosted the Fellows at a luncheon seminar with their leadership team to discuss corporate governance issues and the implications of economic fluctuations.

The Fellows concluded their trip with a visit to the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey with briefings by Edmond Schorno, Chief of Staff, and Ernesto Butcher, Chief Operating Officer. The Fellows discussed the Port Authority's role in and vision for protecting those who come through the port, particularly in a post-September 11th environment.

Following a successful first domestic policy study trip, the Fellows will travel to Southern California in January and to Oklahoma in July.
