REFLECTIONS ON LEADERSHIP AND SERVICE

LBJ: A TIME CAPSULE

John M. McGinty was a White House Fellow in 1967-1968. Mr. McGinty, an architect who lives in Houston, Texas, wrote this reflection on his class's interactions with President Johnson shortly after his fellowship year ended and submitted it in response to last month's newsletter.

There were three occasions when the Class of 1967-68 went as a group to the White House to see the President. The first was on the night of our selection. We felt like Dorothy in Oz. Both winners and losers, with our spouses, were invited. The Marine Band played, drinks were served on silver trays, the entire Cabinet was there, and I danced with the president's daughter Linda Bird. (Chuck Robb, later her husband as well as Virginia governor and Senator, was there too, but he was just a Marine guard, and, as yet, unknown.) Soon after midnight, the President announced that he was going to bed, but we were welcome to stay. His house was our house! Stay we did, until about 3 A.M. or so. There has not been a White House Fellows occasion since that even rivaled it. Texans do know how to throw a party!

The final time we visited was in August, 1968, at the end of our year. President and Mrs. Johnson invited us to the living quarters where, in the sitting room adjoining the Truman Balcony, they graciously visited and reminisced with us about the past year, much like old friends who had been on a journey together. They too were soon to leave, and we had been through a lot together.

The most significant visit, however, occurred sometime around mid-year, during the Tet Offensive. The President invited us to come as a group, ostensibly to ask questions as we had done with so many other administration officials. We were seated at a conference table in the Fish Room, which is now the Roosevelt Room. Just the Fellows were present, along with program director Tom Carr and associate director Steve Strickland. The President entered alone, and was later joined by a Japanese photographer named Okimoto, if I recall correctly. No other aides were present.

The President began the "discussion" by saying that he wanted to tell us what was on his mind. And so began a 45-minute soliloquy on the course of the war in Viet Nam. It was deliberate and impassioned,

filled with details of logistics, military tactics, and depressing statistics. He named names, friends and foes alike. He drew targeting maps for air strikes on white napkins. His frustration and rage were evident. I recall him pounding the table and exclaiming through clenched teeth, "You can't kill bicycles with B-52's!" More napkins were filled with diagrams of the Ho Chi Minh Trail and Hanoi harbor and bombed-out railroads that were being repaired overnight. That war was dooming his vision of a Great Society, and he hated it.

No questions were asked. As we were leaving, one of the other fellows commented that we should have picked up those napkins for history.

IN MEMORIAM



JACK VALENTI (1921-2007)

Jack Valenti died from complications of a stroke at his Washington, DC, home on April 26. Over 1,000 friends and family attended his funeral mass at the Cathedral of St. Matthew on May 1.

To say that Jack Valenti was the greatest champion of The White House Fellows program is no exaggeration.

From its creation in 1964 to our last reunion in 2006, The White House Fellowships had no more loyal and devoted friend.

Jack met with every class of White House Fellows, both when he was inside the LBJ White House and in all his years as president of The Motion Picture Association of America.

He hosted our classes at the Washington MPAA offices in a building now named in his honor.

He screened first run movies with us, arranged receptions with food and guests from Hollywood and Washington.

He had a love for the Fellows that transcended politics. It did not matter that we were liberals or conservatives, Democrats or Republicans.

On at least two occasions, Jack used his network of friends in the Congress and in the White House to keep the small WHF federal appropriation from being eliminated.

He and his wife Mary Margaret always welcomed us with enthusiasm when we returned to Washington. As many fellows like John DeLuca (65-66) can confirm, Jack was a powerful ambassador of our program to many different communities of interest.

Jack's articulate voice has been stilled, but his spirit will live in the hearts of all of us who shared a part of our own journeys with him.


