Foster + Partners is an international studio for architecture, planning and design led by its founder and Chairman, Lord Foster together with Chief Executive, Mouzhan Majidi, three Senior Executives: Spencer de Grey and David Nelson as Heads of Design and Graham Phillips as Chief Operating Officer, Matthew Streets as Chief Financial Officer and two Executive Directors, Grant Brooker and Nigel Dancey. The practice's work ranges in scale from the largest construction project on the planet, Beijing International airport to its smallest commission, a range of door furniture. The scope of its work includes masterplans for cities, the design of buildings, interior and product design, graphics and exhibitions. These can be found throughout the world, from Britain, Europe and Scandinavia to the United States, Hong Kong, Japan, China, Malaysia, Saudi Arabia and Australia.

The studio has established an international reputation with buildings such as Swiss Re's London Headquarters, Millau Viaduct in France, the new German Parliament in the Reichstag, Berlin, The Great Court for the British Museum, Headquarters for HSBC in Hong Kong and London, Commerzbank Headquarters in Frankfurt, the Metro Bilbao, the Carré d'Art Nîmes and Research Centres for Stanford University, California. There is also a strong interest in city planning and the infrastructure of communication.

Established as Foster Associates in 1967 the practice, now known as Foster + Partners, has project offices world wide with its main studio in London. The practice has worked in 63 countries and currently has projects across 41 countries. Since its inception it has received 440 awards and citations for excellence and has won more than 70 national and international competitions.
