

**Opening Remarks by Alan Guttmacher, M.D.,  
Deputy Director of the National Human Genome Research Institute  
National Institutes of Health**

Thank you, Francis.

Working so closely with him over the past nine years has been rewarding for the remarkable scientific progress we have helped facilitate and also a great personal pleasure.
