What will the National Science Foundation do with my complaint?

Once a complaint is filed, NSF, OEOP will review it to determine whether it has urisdiction to investigate the issues you have raised. NSF generally will investigate your allegations and attempt to resolve violations it has found or refer the complaint to the Department of Education via a memorandum of agreement to investigate it's Title VI complaints. If negotiations to correct a violation are unsuccessful, enforcement proceedings may be instituted.

What is the National Science Foundation's Role?

The NSF, under Title 45, Code of Federal egulations, Part 611, is responsible for mplementing and enforcing Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and related statutes for its federally assisted programs.

What if the recipient etaliates against me for filing complaint?

You should be aware that a recipient is prohibited from retaliating against you or any person because he or she opposed an unlawful policy or practice, or made charges, testified, or participated in any complaint action under Title VI. If you believe that you have been retaliated against, you should immediately contact the:

"Simple justice requires that public funds, to which all taxpayers of all races contribute, not be spent in any fashion which encourages, entrenches, subsidizes, or results in racial discrimination."

(President John F. Kennedy, in his message calling for the enactment of Title VI, 1963).

What is Title VI?

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 is the Federal law that protects individuals from discrimination on the basis of their race, color, or national origin in programs that receive Federal financial assistance.

What programs are covered by Title VI?

Approximately 30 Federal agencies provide federal financial assistance in the form of funds, training, technical and other assistance to State and local governments, and nonprofit and private organizations. These recipients of Federal assistance, in turn, operate programs and deliver benefits and services to individuals (known as "beneficiaries") to achieve the goals of the Federal legislation that authorizes the programs.

Federally assisted programs address such broad and diverse areas as:

- Elementary, secondary, and higher education
- Employment and job training
- Transfer of equipment
- Services or benefits in the form of personal property

What discrimination is prohibited by Title VI?

There are many forms of illegal discrimination based on race, color, or national origin that can limit the opportunity of minorities to gain equal access to services and programs. Among other things, in operating a federally assisted program, a recipient cannot, on the basis of race, color, or national origin, either directly or through contractual means:

- Deny program services, aids, or benefits;
- Provide a different service, aid, or benefit, or provide them in a manner different than they are provided to others; or
- Segregate or separately treat individuals in any matter related to the receipt of any service, aid, or benefit.

How can I file a discrimination complaint?

Since NSF provides federal financial assistance, it is responsible for investigating complaints of discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin in the use of its funds. If you believe that you or others protected by Title VI have been discriminated against, under a program or activity funded by NSF, you may file a complaint within 180 days of the date of the alleged discrimination. It should include:

- Your name, address, and telephone number. Your complaint must be signed.
 If you are filing on behalf of another person, include your name, address, telephone number, and your relation to that person (e.g., friend, attorney, parent, etc.)
- The name and address of the agency, institution, or department you believe discriminated against you.
- How, why, and when you believe you were discriminated against. Include as much background information as possible about the alleged acts of discrimination. Include names of individuals whom you allege discriminated against you, if you know them.
- The names of any persons, if known, that the investigating agency could contact for additional information to support or clarify your allegations.
