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Visit Muscatatuck National Wildlife Refuge and we'll give you the rest of our brochure! Muscatatuck is open sunrise to sunset, seven days a week, and it's nearly 8,000 acres are wonderful places to observe and learn about wildlife. The refuge is an especially fine place to find migratory birds, and over 279 species of birds have been seen here.

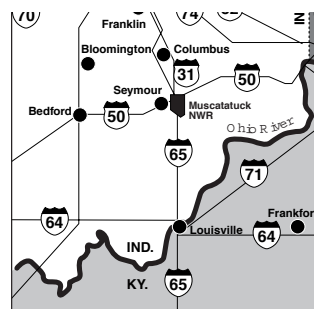
Visitor Services

Start your visit at the refuge visitor center with the self-operated 15 minute orientation program. Hike the accessible Chestnut Ridge interpretive trail by the visitor center, or stroll one of the other seven refuge hiking trails. Drive the four-mile self-guided auto tour route that passes some of the 1,500 acres of shallow marsh and water areas, or try your hand at year-round fishing in the public fishing areas. Spring and fall special events are held and, in December and January, special archery and muzzleloading deer hunts occur.

Getting There

The refuge main entrance is located three miles east of I-65 at Seymour, IN on U.S. Highway 50. A 1/2 mile asphalt road leads to the refuge office (on the left) and to the Visitor Center (off to the right).
