ENROLLMENT POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

GENERAL REGISTRATION FACTS

Students are officially registered for courses only when they have complied with all of the procedures applying to registration, including full payment of tuition and fees, and validation of student I.D.

For students who register by mail, tuition and applicable fees are payable in full on the due date specified on the bill received from Student Accounts. For students who register on-site, tuition and applicable fees are payable at the time of registration.

Delaware State University regularly mails bills to students, but cannot assume responsibility for their receiving bills. If students do not receive bills on or before the beginning of the semester, it is the student's responsibility to contact the Office of Student Accounts at (302) 857-6240 to obtain information relative to their bill or go online at <http://www.desu.edu> to view their bill

EARLY REGISTRATION

All students returning to Delaware State University following the current semester of residence should pre-register during the period prescribed in the Academic Calendar. Returning students who do not pre-register prior to on-site registration will be assessed a \$30.00 failure to pre-register fee. An additional \$30.00 will be assessed if students register during the late registration period.

ON-SITE REGISTRATION

Each year one week prior to the start of classes for the fall and spring semesters, Delaware State University gives non-enrolled students an opportunity to register in person. During this three day period, new students who did not enroll during one of the Summer New Student Orientation sessions and returning students who did not register prior to this period are advised by their academic departments' designees and permitted to register. All billing issues must be handled during this period to avoid being deleted from courses on the registration purge date.

LATE REGISTRATION

Any student who did not pre-register or participate in on-site registration may register during the Late Registration Period. Late Registration starts August 29, 2005 and ends two weeks later. The late registration fee is an additional \$30.00.

DROP/ADD

To drop or add a course, students may obtain approval from their advisor or department chair and go online and adjust their schedule or obtain a DROP/ADD form from the Department Chair. The form is to be turned in to the Academic Department through the late registration period and to the Registrar's Office thereafter, bearing the required signatures. Students may drop or add courses as indicated on the Academic Calendar. A drop fee of \$10.00 per course will be assessed after late registration. Students who DROP courses which result in a credit on their student account must request a refund through the Office of Student Accounts. Students requesting to drop or add classes after the last day to drop or add courses must obtain the signature of their academic dean as well as their instructor and advisor/chair.

WEB REGISTRATION & DROP/ADD

It is required that all degree seeking students consult with an advisor prior to registering or making changes to their existing schedules. Students may have their academic departments continue to enter their registration and schedule changes (drop/adds) or they may register and make schedule adjustments on-line. To obtain your "alternate pin" for registering on-line, see your academic advisor after building your course schedule on the pre-printed Schedule Request Form on page 14 of this guide. OFFICIAL WITHDRAWAL (302) 857-7381

To officially withdraw from all courses, students must complete a Withdrawal Form in the Counseling Office. The office is located in the Education and Humanities Building, room 123.

COURSE CHANGES AFTER PUBLICATION

Every effort is made to have course information accurate at the time of publication, however, departments may need to make changes to their courses after publication. Students are advised to consult the department or our website at <http://www.desu.edu> for changes. The University reserves the right to cancel courses due to insufficient enrollment and other reasons.

In order to use any computer resources (including pcs, pc labs, printers, network connections and hard disk storage) on campus, you will need to have a valid DSU student computer account (login name and password). You may apply for an account in the Grossley Hall, Room 8. Hours are 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Allow five days to process your application.

NO SHOW POLICY

Students not attending any given class at least once during the first week of classes will result in their being deleted from the official class roster.

OVERLOAD FEE POLICY

For all course overloads, undergraduates will be assessed a fee equivalent to the cost-per-credit for each hour that exceeds 19 credit hours each semester.

Credit will not be granted for a course in which the student is not officially registered.

Returning students who need a replacements I.D. may obtain one for \$50 (Make payment at the Cashier's Office before reporting to be photographed). Only those students who have satisfied all financial obligations to the University may have their student I.D. validated. A validated I.D. card is required for entrance to the dining hall and to access library resources. Delaware teachers are required to have a validated I.D. card.

COURSE NUMBERING

Undergraduate course numbers are 000-499. Graduate course numbers are 500 and above.

SECTION/CRN NUMBERS

Main campus section #s are 00-39 for day classes and 90-95 for evening classes (e.g., classes offered at or after 4:00 p.m.). Courses with section numbers 79 (undergraduate) and 62 (graduate) indicate courses that are offered at the Georgetown site. Sections 86, 87 or 88 (undergraduate) and 62, 63 or 65 (graduate) indicate course offerings at the Wilmington sites.

NEW ROOM SELECTION POLICY

Effective Fall 2001, students cannot obtain a residence hall room assignment if they are not registered and have not made financial arrangements with the University, including filing the FAFSA, when applicable.

DELAWARE STATE UNIVERSITY REFUND POLICY

Credit Balances

Refunds for overpayments or credit balances that are a result of dropping a course will be processed thirty (30) days after the end of late registration, or within fourteen (14) days during the semester. Refunds cannot be issued from credit card payments. Credit balances will be transferred back to the credit card. All charges and payments must be stated on the account before a refund will be processed. After the refund is processed, students are liable for any additional charges that may result from reductions in financial aid awards and/or other adjustments to tuition and fees. All refunds will be processed through the Office of Student Accounts.

Students who drop courses must obtain a Drop Slip and return the completed form to the Office of Records & Registration. The effective date of the change in registration is the date the drop slip(s) is filed in this office.

Students who officially change their enrollment from full-time to part-time (less than 12 hours) by dropping a course or courses will be eligible for a refund in accordance with the schedule listed below.

Withdrawal/Refund Policy

Students who have registered for courses and no longer wish to attend the university must obtain a Withdrawal Form from the Office of Counseling, Room 123, Education & Humanities Building. The student I.D. card and mailbox key must be returned to the Office of Student Accounts when the withdrawal form is signed by the manager. If you received a Stafford Unsubsidized, Perkins, or Parent Plus loans, you must complete an exit interview before your withdrawal form can be signed. Log on to: amsonlineexit.tuitionpay.com to complete the process. Students who do not adhere to the withdrawal process will forfeit their rights to a refund. The completed form must be returned to the Counseling Office.

The effective date used in computing refunds is the date the Withdrawal Form is received in the Counseling Office. **STOP PAYMENT ON A CHECK, FAILURE TO PAY THE SEMESTER BILL OR FAILURE TO ATTEND CLASSES DOES NOT CONSTITUTE OFFICIAL WITHDRAWAL FROM THE UNIVERSITY.** Withdrawal refunds will be processed in accordance with the schedule below. **STUDENTS WHO DO NOT ADHERE TO THE DROP/WITHDRAWAL PROCESS WILL FORFEIT THEIR RIGHTS TO A REFUND.**

*Students accident and health insurance will be canceled retroactively and any claim filed will not be honored.

Rooms & Meals

Meal charges are refunded on a pro-rated weekly basis. Room charges are refunded on a pro-rated weekly basis not to exceed 50% of the total charges for the semester at any time a student withdraws from the University or from residence halls after classes begin. Advance room deposits are **non-refundable** except in cases where the University is unable to provide space or the student is academically ineligible. You may contact the Office of Student Accounts for the weekly rate(s) that will be calculated.

Title IV Recipients

The 1998 Reauthorization of the Higher Education Act requires Delaware State University to calculate the Return of Title IV Funds on all Federal Financial Aid recipients who withdraw (**OFFICIALLY OR UNOFFICIALLY**) from classes on or before the **60 percent** attendance point in the semester.

The federal formula requires a **return of Title IV Aid**, if the student received Federal Financial Assistance in the form of a **Pell Grant, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG), Federal Plus Loan, Perkins Loan, Federal Subsidized Stafford Loan or a Federal Unsubsidized Stafford Loan**, if a student withdraws on or before completing **60 percent** of the semester. The percentage of Title IV Aid to be returned is equal to the number of calendar days remaining in the semester divided by the number of calendar days in the semester. Scheduled breaks of more than four consecutive days are excluded.

If funds are to be returned after completing the return of Title IV Aid calculation, Delaware State University is required to return its portion of unearned Title IV Aid to the appropriate Federal Programs within 30 days from the date the student withdraws from classes. A hold will be placed on the account and all university services will be withheld if the account reflects a balance. DSU will return any funds required by the student.

STUDENTS WHO STOP ATTENDING ALL CLASSES WITHOUT OFFICIALLY WITHDRAWING WILL BE SUBJECT TO THE RETURN OF TITLE IV FUNDS AT THE END OF THE SEMESTER, BASED ON WITHDRAWAL DATES/LAST DOCUMENTED DATE OF ATTENDANCE AS DETERMINED BY DELAWARE STATE UNIVERSITY.

FINANCIAL AID

Procedures for Applying for Financial Aid

Candidates for admission to the University who wish to apply for financial aid should file for the **Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)**. To receive aid for the Fall Semester your FAFSA results must be received in the Financial Aid Office by April 18. To receive aid for the Spring Semester, FAFSA results must be received by October 1. The FAFSA form can be obtained from any high school guidance counselor's office, any public library or from Delaware State University's Office of Financial Aid. You may also file the FAFSA electronically on the Web at www.fafsa.ed.gov or <http://dsuweb.desu.edu>. Make sure you and/or your parents sign the signature page and mail to the Department of Education per instructions on the web. All financial aid applicants should submit their FAFSA to the central processor. Applications take 4-6 weeks to be processed. Financial Aid Awards will be offered to accepted students who qualify and have completed the financial aid process.

All scholarship candidates must file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and must meet all requirements to determine eligibility for financial aid before the scholarship is finalized. Full scholarship recipients must be aware that financial aid awards will alter the funding sources used to build a scholarship. Pell Grant, along with other sources of Financial Aid (i.e., supplemental educational opportunity grant, aid to needy students, etc.), may be included in the total amounts of the full scholarship.

International students who receive institutional scholarships must provide a letter of approval to receive a scholarship. The letter must include the students name, social security number/identification number, an approval statement and signature from the Director of Judicial Affairs and International Affairs. It is recommended that individuals notifying students of scholarship awards include this statement as a part of the notification.

Satisfactory Academic Progress

Students applying for continuation of Financial Aid must meet the University's satisfactory academic progress requirements as follows:

- a. Complete at least 24 hours by the end of an academic year, including summer school and
- b. Have at least a 1.70 cumulative GPA each academic year including summer, and by the end of the second academic year maintain a cumulative GPA of 2.0 until graduation.
- c. For undergraduates, the program of study must not exceed 182 attempted credit hours.
- d. Students who attend as part time must complete each term respectively by maintaining the attempted enrollment status.
- e. Returning/continuing students who do not meet the above standards must submit an appeal letter to the Financial Aid Office for consideration or reinstatement.

Types of Aid Available

Grants - Federal Pell Grants are for students enrolled in a degree program for at least six semester hours of credit. In some cases students may be eligible for Pell Grants for less than half-time attendance. This grant from the federal government does not have to be repaid.

Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants (FSEOG) - are only for students in a degree program on a full-time basis. This grant, administered by Delaware State University, does not have to be repaid.

Aid to Needy Students - The aid to needy students grant is available to Delaware residents who attend Delaware State University as a full time student and have an unmet need. The applicant must submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid results to the Financial Aid Office by October 1. This grant does not have to be repaid.

Jobs - Federal Work-Study (FWS) is a federal part-time employment program for full-time or part-time students.

Federal Perkins Loans - Funded by the federal government are available at 5% interest (for full-time students).

Federal Student Loan Program provides a new way for students to borrow money from Delaware State University to pay for their education. The three types of loans are:

Federal Stafford Loans - These are subsidized loans, which means that the federal government will pay the interest on the loan while the student is in school and during specified deferments, but the student must demonstrate financial need to receive the loan.

Federal Unsubsidized Stafford Loans - Students can get these unsubsidized loans regardless of need but will have to pay all interest charges.

Federal PLUS Loans - Parents of a dependent student can borrow a PLUS Loan to pay for the student's education.

Music Grants-in-Aid - are for undergraduates with exceptional musical ability. Apply to the Music Department (Band Director and/or Choral Director).

Scholarships - Delaware State Academic State Scholarships are scholarships available to incoming Freshman students who qualify. Students who live in New Castle, Kent, or Sussex Counties should consult with their high school guidance counselors about the Academic State Scholarships. Athletic Scholarships are available for every varsity sport. The University and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) control the number of scholarships, requirements, standards and awards.

FINANCIAL AID (Continued)

If Aid Exceeds Tuition and Fees

When grants and/or loans awarded for the semester through the Financial Aid Office cover more than tuition and fees, the DSU Student Accounts Office prepares a check after your registration has been processed. The funds are to be used for books, supplies, and other related expenses. Refer to the Refund Policy Section on page 6 or contact the Office of Student Accounts, (302) 857-6240.

Deadline Dates for Filing 2004-2005

DEADLINE DATE for receipt of Student Aid Report (SAR) in the Financial Aid Office April 18th for the fall term and October 1st for the spring term. If you have not filed and expect to use your financial aid award to pay your Fall 2005 charges, you must file and complete the application process by the above dates.

Students with Pennsylvania residency must file the FAFSA by February 28th of each year to apply for the Pennsylvania State Grant. Filing the FAFSA by this date ensures receipt of your application at PHEAA by May 1st for renewals and August 1st for new students.

Processing Federal Family Education Loan Applications

All new freshmen, undergraduate and graduate students who apply for a Federal Student Loan must have a 2005-2006 Student Aid Report (SAR) on file in the Financial Aid office.

Before Registration

1. Undergraduates must submit the results of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (Student Aid Report) by the deadline date April 18th for Fall Semester and October 1st for Spring Semester and submit all required documents (student and/or parent 2004 1040 tax forms and 2005-2006 verification worksheets) to the Financial Aid Office. Students who do not complete the application process before April 18th will need to make arrangements for personal payment of tuition and fees. (See the Office of Student Accounts section for details on the University's Deferred Payment Plan.)
2. Students awarded scholarships from outside sources must submit the check or scholarship notification letter to the Office of Student Accounts to be credited to their account.

Other Guidelines

1. The Financial Aid Office requires all Federal Perkins Loan borrowers and Stafford Loan borrowers to attend pre-loan counseling sessions. Call the Financial Aid Office (302-857-6250) for further information.
2. All financial aid recipients are subject to Delaware State University refund schedule in accordance with federal and state financial aid regulations (see Refund Schedule). This means that a proportionate share of the money must be returned to the Financial Aid Program(s), including the Federal Stafford Student Loan Program and the Federal PLUS Program, if a student withdraws or is dismissed during a refund period. Further information and applications are available in the Financial Aid Office, Administration Building, 1st floor.
3. Reaffirmation of loan eligibility includes establishing that the student has maintained satisfactory academic progress, has at least halftime enrollment status and has progressed to the next classification level for increased annual borrowing amounts. Students who do not progress to the next classification level must borrow at the prior year's level. For example, a student with 0-29 earned hours is classified as a freshman. A freshman may borrow \$2,625.00 per year but may not borrow at the next level (\$3500.00 per year) until he/she obtains sophomore status (completion of at least 30 earned credit hours).

Enrollment & Academic Policies

Students are officially registered for courses only when they have complied with all of the procedures applying to registration, including full payment of tuition and fees and validation of student I.D. Students not officially registered for courses will not be permitted to attend the courses and will not receive credit at the end of the semester.

For students who registered by mail or web, tuition and applicable fees are payable in full on or before August 10, 2005. For students who register on-site, all fees are payable at the time of registration. All fees must be paid in full according to the dates listed in the registration schedule or students will be purged from their courses.

Delaware State University regularly mails bills to students, but cannot assume responsibility for their

receiving the bills. If students do not receive bills on or before the beginning of each semester, it is the student's responsibility to contact the Office of Student Accounts or to go online to obtain information relative to the bill and to verify address information in the Records Office or on the Student Services website <http://www.desu.edu>.

Students who add or drop courses which result in a credit on their student account will receive a refund through the Office of Student Accounts.

Courses dropped after late registration ends will be assigned a final grade of "W" if the course is dropped on or before the last day to drop classes. Course drops approved after this date will be assigned a grade of "WA" (Administrative Drop). Please refer to the university catalog for more information.

UNDERGRADUATE ADMISSION PROCEDURES

Admission requirements must be met prior to registering for college level courses. Refer to the categories outlined below to determine which is appropriate for you, and follow the steps given:

Application Procedures

- A. **Degree Seeking Students:** In addition to making formal application for admission, the degree seeking student must have on file an official high school transcript (or GED scores, if applicable). The transfer applicant must also have on file an official transcript from each college or university attended. Transfer students must be in good standing (academic and disciplinary) at the last school of matriculation.
- B. **Non-Degree Seeking Student:** The special (and/or transient) student earning college credit, but not seeking a degree from Delaware State University, is not required to submit transcripts. For quick registration, use the "**Mail-In and On-Site Registration Form**" included in this booklet. International students may not use this form.
- C. **Delaware High School Juniors and Seniors Only:** The qualified applicant must have at least a 2.5 (C+) cumulative grade point average. In addition to applying for admission to this **Early Bird** program, the applicant must submit an "official" high school transcript along with letters of permission from the high school guidance counselor and a parent or guardian. There is a six (6) credit hour (normally two courses) limitation per registration period. **Any Delaware high school student in this category whose cumulative grade point average is 3.0 (B) or better automatically qualifies for 6 credit hours tuition-free classes.** The student will be responsible for payment of laboratory fees (if applicable), registration and technology fees, and the cost of books and supplies. The 2004-2005 registration and technology fees are \$40.00 and \$30.00, respectively (subject to change).

Notification of Rights under FERPA for Delaware State University Students

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords students certain rights with respect to their education records: They are:

(1) The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the University receives a request for access.

Students should submit to the registrar, dean, head of the academic department, or other appropriate official, written requests that identify the record(s) they wish to inspect. The University official will make arrangements for access and notify the student of the time and place where the records may be inspected. If the records are not maintained by the University official to whom the request was submitted, that official shall advise the student of the correct official to whom the request should be addressed.

(2) The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the student believes are inaccurate or misleading.

Students may ask the University to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading. They should write the University official responsible for the record, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading.

If the University decides not to amend the record as requested by the student, the University will notify the student of the decision and advise the student of his or her right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the student when notified of the right to a hearing.

(3) The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

One exception which permits disclosure without consent is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the University in an administrative, supervisory, academic or research, or support staff position (including law enforcement unit personnel and health staff); a person or company with whom the University has contracted (such as an attorney, auditor, or collection agent); a person serving on the Board of Trustees; or a student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks.

A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.

Upon request, the University discloses education records without consent to officials of another school in which a student seeks or intends to enroll.

(4) The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by Delaware State University to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA is:

Directory Information

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act permits the release of directory-type information to third parties outside the institution without written consent of the student provided the student has been given the opportunity to withhold such disclosure.

The University releases, upon inquiry to third parties outside the University, directory information without written consent of the student. Directory information includes name, address, telephone number, college, class, major, dates of attendance, and degree and honors and awards conferred. Students may withhold directory information by going to the Office of Records & Registration.

Note: While the withholding request may be made at any time, students wishing to have directory information withheld from the student directory should submit their requests no later than three weeks prior to the first day of fall semester classes.

***IMPORTANT!* • GRADUATION 2005**

1. Students who anticipate participating in the May graduation ceremony must submit the appropriate Application for Graduation to the Office of Records and Registration on or before October 15, 2004.
2. Students not meeting the deadline for filing may not have regalia and/or diplomas available for the graduation ceremony.
3. All degrees earned during the academic year are conferred at the annual graduation ceremony in May, e.g., degrees completed during the Summer 2004, Fall 2004 and Spring 2005 will be conferred at the May 2005 ceremony.
4. Students who complete all requirements during the Summer or Fall terms may obtain an official transcript from the Office of Records and Registration which will reflect the degree to be conferred and the actual date of completion of requirements, e.g., August 1st for summer graduates and December 18th for fall graduates.
5. One diploma will be issued for **each** degree earned.
6. Students may participate in the graduation ceremony ONLY if they enroll in and successfully complete all courses required to graduate prior to graduation.
7. Diplomas will not be issued to anyone who has not satisfied all academic requirements and met all financial obligations to the institution, including loans administered by the University.
