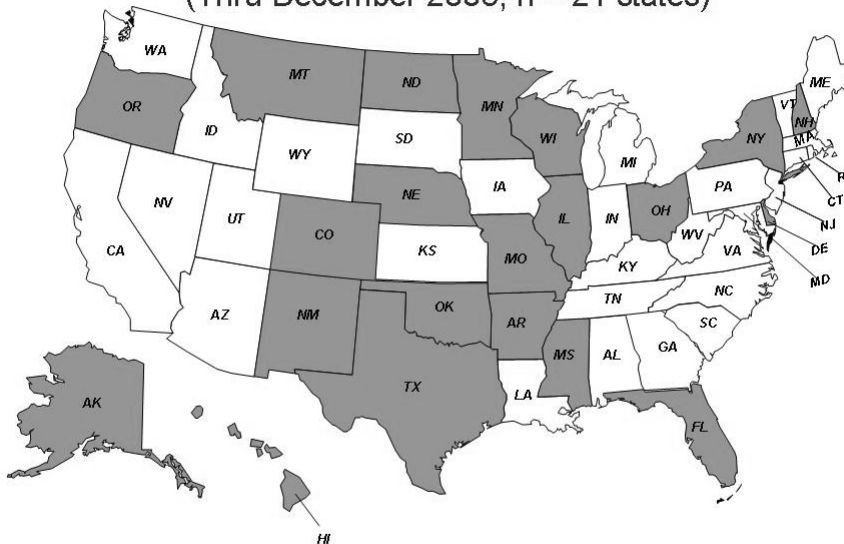

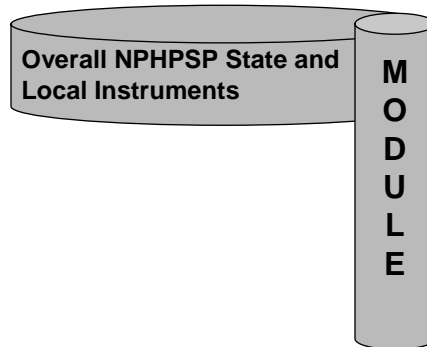

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>■ Key changes: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>– Modernized and updated content</li> <li>– Streamlined and more user-friendly</li> <li>– Added “discussion toolbox” feature</li> <li>– Included optional priority and agency contribution questionnaires</li> <li>– Slightly revised the response options</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

NO ACTIVITY	MINIMAL ACTIVITY	MODERATE ACTIVITY	SIGNIFICANT ACTIVITY	OPTIMAL ACTIVITY
NO ACTIVITY	0% or absolutely no activity.			
MINIMAL ACTIVITY	Greater than zero, but no more than 25% of the activity described within the question is met within the public health system.			
MODERATE ACTIVITY	Greater than 25%, but no more than 50% of the activity described within the question is met within the public health system.			
SIGNIFICANT ACTIVITY	Greater than 50%, but no more than 75% of the activity described within the question is met within the public health system.			
OPTIMAL ACTIVITY	Greater than 75% of the activity described within the question is met within the public health system.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>■ Conceptually <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>– Based on same four concepts</li> <li>– Illustrate linkage between broad public health and specific areas</li> </ul> </li> <li>■ Opportunities for an EH module to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>– Identify national consensus around the practices of EH</li> <li>– Illustrate the linkage with overall public health performance through connection to the NPHPSP instruments</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
