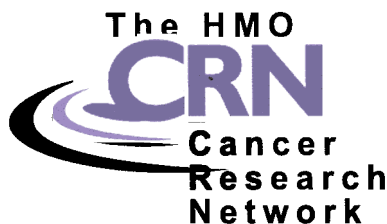
News from the CRN PI
