## **October "Garden Council Yard of the Month"**

The Native Plant Society chose the yard of Frankie & T. J. Fox of Rockport as yard of the month for October. The yard is a small one that lies between the street and the house, which fronts on Copano Bay. The location poses unique challenges to any landscaper. Nonetheless, the yard is always lovely and a great draw for hummingbirds and butterflies. The plants are almost entirely native and include: esperanza, frogfruit, coral honeysuckle, Turks cap, red yucca, spider lily, fragrant mistflower, Copper Canyon daisy, Texas mountain laurel, dwarf Barbados, prostrate rosemary, cape honeysuckle, yellow sophora, fig, butterfly weed, whitebrush, spiny hackberry, and colima.

Low prairie clover [*Dalea scandens* (P. Mill.) Clausen] is a native perennial member of the legume family. It is a subshrub that reaches about 1 m in height. It flowers from September to December and reproduces by seed. The pinnate leaves have leaflets 6-12 cm in length. The small flowers occur on short spikes, with petals up to 6 mm. long that start out yellowish and turn to a light violet. The fruit is a single



seeded pod. Low prairie clover occurs in loamy soils in openings or around brush and is known from east of Calallen, west of Portland, and extreme south Texas. It is easily identified as it has no thorns and crushing green leaves will turn your hand yellow. It makes a nice low maintenance addition to a native garden.

The PMC is working on releasing a native ecotype of low prairie clover for the conservation practices of 512

Pasture & Hayland Planting, 645 Upland Wildlife Habitat Management, and 550 Range Planting. However, more collections are needed to represent the entire range of this species in South Texas. If you find a population of low prairie clover in South Texas, the PMC would appreciate a seed collection.
