the primary case processing system for the adjudication of applications for naturalization (N-400). Initially developed and deployed over a 5-year period (from October 1995 to December 2000), CLAIMS 4 is now operational at 92 locations nationwide (4 Service Centers and 88 District Offices) and offers a standardized automated process for adjudicating N-400 applications. In addition, the US Citizenship & Immigration Service (USCIS) adjudicators have the ability to travel to off-site locations, such as community-based organizations, and perform the examination process (interview and adjudication) for individuals who cannot travel to a CIS office without great difficulty. The CLAIMS 4 application has initially been divided into subsystems, which support the major functions that CLAIMS 4 is required to provide as specified by the CLAIMS 4 Functional Requirements Document (FRD). CLAIMS 4 system architecture comprises several major subsystems, which include the following: 1) Receipting, 2) Adjudication, 3) Batch Status Update (BSU), 4) Case Status, 5) Case Management (CM), 6) Scheduler/Batch Scheduler, 7) Notices, 8) Reports, 9) Oath Ceremony, 10) Management (formerly DocProd), 11) System Maintenance, 12) External Interface, and 13) Workflow Administration. CLAIMS 4 is a two-tier "fat" client/server workflow management system designed to: a) support high-volume processing of naturalization applications received by USCIS as part of the Direct Mail program at CIS Service Centers; b) capture fees and provide funds control for all monies received via the application process; c) support and record the results of the adjudication of each application; d) provide case status to applicants (customers) throughout the period of case processing; e) provide primary case processing for the adjudication of applications for naturalization (N-400); f) improve USCIS fee and fund accountability by automating the production of receipts and fee registers; and, g) provide automatic scheduling for fingerprints, interviews, and oath ceremonies. It is expected that CLAIMS 4 will remain in operation through FY12 at which time it would be phased out as newly developed case management systems come fully on line.
