May 3, World Press Freedom Day, serves as a time to inform the public about the right to freedom of expression and as a reminder that many journalists brave death or jail to bring news to the world. On the occasion of this World Press Freedom Day, the United States joins the international community in celebrating the contributions of free media to the advancement of human dignity, liberty and prosperity worldwide. Freedom of the media -- a right protected by Article 19 of the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights -- is the hallmark of a free society. Wherever media freedom is under siege, all other human rights are under threat.

U.S. COMMITMENT TO PRESS FREEDOM

Supporting World Press Freedom - The United States in particular salutes those in the press who courageously do their work at great risk. The press is often a target of retaliation by those who feel threatened by freedom of expression and transparency in democratic processes. Journalists are often the first to uncover corruption, to report from the front lines of conflict zones, and to highlight missteps by governments. This work places many journalists in danger, and it is the duty of governments and citizens worldwide to speak out for their protection and for their vital role in open societies.

MCC's Commitment to Press Freedom - The U.S. Government's Millennium Challenge Corporation (MCC) recognizes the importance of a free press to the economic and democratic development of a country. A free press increases political transparency; educates citizens, enabling them to make informed decisions; provides information to consumers that leads to competitive pricing; and gives citizens an outlet through which they can voice opinions and ideas. A commitment to a free press is an investment in the longterm progress of any society.

ROLE OF THE MEDIA

Evolving Media and a Free Press - "Congress shall make no law ... abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press." The First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution enshrines a basic U.S. belief: A free press nurtures democracy. Freedom of the press is essential to democracy because it empowers the citizenry and holds governments accountable.
