Habitat: English Ivy infests woodlands, forest edges, fields, hedgerows, coastal areas, salt marsh edges and other upland areas, especially where soil moisture is present.

General Description: An evergreen climbing vine that attaches to the bark of trees and other surfaces by way of numerous, small, root-like structures, which exude a glue-like substance.

Distinctive Characteristics: The leaves are dark-green, waxy, somewhat leathery, arranged alternately along the stem.

Growth Habit: Vine

Distribution: Occurs throughout the eastern United States, across the southern states and up to Washington State.
