## Biography of Hal R. Varian

Hal R. Varian is the Dean of the <u>School of Information Management and Systems</u> at the <u>University of California</u>, <u>Berkeley</u>. He is also a Professor in the <u>Haas School of Business</u>, a Professor in the <u>Department of Economics</u>, and holds the Class of 1944 Professorship.

He received his S.B. degree from <u>MIT</u> in 1969 and his MA (mathematics) and Ph.D. (economics) from <u>UC Berkeley</u> in 1973. He has taught at <u>MIT</u>, <u>Stanford</u>, <u>Oxford</u>, <u>Michigan</u> and other universities around the world.

Professor Varian is a fellow of the <u>Guggenheim Foundation</u>, the <u>Econometric Society</u>, and the <u>American Academy of Arts and Sciences</u>. He has served as Co-Editor of the <u>American Economic Review</u> and is on the editorial boards of several journals.

Professor Varian has published numerous <u>papers</u> in economic theory, industrial organization, financial economics, econometrics and information economics. He is the author of two major economics <u>textbooks</u> which have been translated into 11 languages. His recent work has been concerned with the economics of information technology and the <u>information economy</u>. He is the co-author of a bestselling book on business strategy, <u>Information Rules: A Strategic Guide to the Network Economy</u> and currently writes a monthly column for the <u>The New York Times</u>.
