Dear Interested Party:

Enclosed is the Federal Register notice announcing the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's final designation of critical habitat for the Mexican spotted owl (*Strix occidentalis lucida*) (owl) under the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended. On November 12, 2003, the United States District Court for the District of Arizona, (Center for Biological Diversity v. Norton, Civ. No. 01–409 TUC DCB), ordered the Service to submit a new final rule for designation of critical habitat for the owl to the Federal Register by August 20, 2004. We have prepared a final designation pursuant to that Court order.

We designate approximately 3.5 million hectares (ha) (8.6 million acres (ac)) of critical habitat in Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico, and Utah, on Federal lands. Section 7 of the Act requires Federal agencies to ensure that actions they authorize, fund, or carry out are not likely to destroy or adversely modify designated critical habitat. As required by section 4 of the Act, we considered economic and other relevant impacts prior to making a final decision on what areas to designate as critical habitat.
