

Grade 4: U.S. Studies to 1877

Fort Moultrie

The purpose of this document is to help educators see the relationship between the state learning results and the information presented at Fort Moultrie. The learning result is on the left and the connection is on the right.

I. Time, Continuity, and Change: History

(4.1) The student should demonstrate an understanding of the major developments in the history of the United States from the earliest human settlements through Reconstruction. He/She should be able to:

- (4.1.6) Identify the developments, major events, and notable figures involved in the separation of the thirteen colonies from England.
- (4.1.7.) Describe the key events and effects of the American Revolution on the new country.
- (4.1.16.) State the causes and events leading to the Civil War.

(4.1.17) Identify notable figures of the Civil War and the roles they played

(4.1.18) Describe the Civil War and its effects on the nation.

The Time, Continuity, and Change: History learning results are addressed at Fort Moultrie.

- (4.1.6) Fort Moultrie was part of the American Revolution.
- (4.1.7) Fort Moultrie was the first decisive naval victory.
- (4.1.16) Fort Moultrie was part of the Civil War. After seeing a signal shot from Fort Johnson on James Island, Fort Moultrie started attacking Fort Sumter, the beginning of the Civil War.
- (4.1.17) Brig. Gen. Pierre Gustave Toutant Beauregard was the commander of the Confederate military operations in the Charleston area.
- (4.1.18) The Civil War showed that African Americans were able to fight in a war; The Massachusetts 54th proved this.

II. English: Listening

The student will listen to oral presentations and reports.

1. Use subject related information and vocabulary.
2. Listen and record information.
3. Demonstrate active listening skills and respond appropriately and accurately to oral information.
