KEY DEVELOPMENTS

- Security remains volatile in Mogadishu despite the first deployment of African Union troops to the city. On March 13, mortar shells struck the presidential palace in Mogadishu after a decision by the Transitional Federal Government to relocate to the traditional capital. President Abdullahi Yusuf was unharmed in the incident.
- As of March 9, the Office of the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) received reports of more than 40,000 people leaving Mogadishu as a result of growing insecurity. The USG Disaster Assistance Response Team (USG/DART) is monitoring the situation and working with partners to assess emerging needs.

CURRENT SITUATION

Population Movements

• The U.N. is reporting large numbers of people departing Mogadishu due to escalating violence. According to UNHCR, approximately 40,000 people have moved to Lower Shabelle, Middle Shabelle, Bay, Gedo, and Hiran regions in February. Of this total, an estimated 9,400 individuals—many of whom were internally displaced persons (IDPs) living in settlements in Mogadishu—are returning to areas of origin in Bay and Gedo regions. UNHCR and partners are often unable to verify and quantify reports of population movement due to the fluid environment. The USG/DART is staying abreast of the situation and working with U.N. agencies and partners to assess the situation.

Humanitarian Access

- According to the U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA), unrest in Mogadishu is limiting mobility and negatively affecting the ability of humanitarian agencies to implement programs and respond to emerging situations.
- While USAID partners have returned to pre-conflict staffing levels in Somalia, humanitarian presence in specific areas fluctuates due to the fluid security situation and transportation arrangements. Humanitarian agencies are often limited to locations accessible by the U.N. Common Air Service, which has reported challenges securing flights into Merka, Jowhar, and Mogadishu airports. In addition, the U.N. has restricted missions to Buale and Kismaayo due to instability.
- Delivery of humanitarian cargo to beneficiaries in southern Somalia is gradually improving. In March, some U.N. agencies and non-governmental organizations (NGOs) have successfully sent humanitarian convoys across the border from Kenya into Somalia.
- The USG/DART maintains regular contact with humanitarian agencies on the ground in Somalia to monitor access to vulnerable populations and to identify and evaluate emerging needs.

USAID AND STATE HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

- USAID/OFDA emergency relief activities in Somalia benefit more than 2 million people affected by repeated shocks of drought, floods, and conflict. Current USAID/OFDA relief efforts in southern and central Somalia complement ongoing programs from FY 2006. USAID/FFP is providing food assistance with carryover commodities from FY 2006 funding, supplemented by additional stocks funded in FY 2007.
- State/PRM is assisting Somali refugees in Kenya and Ethiopia and relief efforts in Somalia through FY 2007 and ongoing FY 2006 refugee programs. To date in FY 2007, State/PRM has provided \$5.6 million in earmarked funding for UNHCR operations in Kenya, Ethiopia, and Somalia, and \$2 million to CARE for assistance to Somali refugees in Kenya. In FY 2006, State/PRM provided nearly \$15 million in earmarked funding for vulnerable populations in Somalia as well as Somali refugees in the Horn of Africa.
