Five years have elapsed since the Mexican Spotted Owl Recovery Plan was released. The plan was conceived under the auspices of adaptive management, whereby aspects of the plan would be implemented and results of implementation would provide information to validate and/or revise plan recommendations. During these past five years, resource agencies have had opportunity to consider and implement the plan. Thus, it is timely to understand the extent to which the plan has been implemented and how well it has or has not worked. From our perspective, the most useful information comes from actual situations where aspects of the plan have been applied. Information on recommendations that have not been implemented and opinions as to why may also be useful to a certain extent. The information provided will be critically important for evaluating and revising the recovery plan.

Attached is an information request to aid in developing your response. This form is intended to provide a basis for understanding the extent to which the plan has been implemented, understanding the efficacy of plan recommendations, and determining aspects of the plan in need of revision.

Questions 1 through 8 should be answered by the appropriate administrative unit. Examples of appropriate units are Forest Service or Bureau of Land Management districts, Sovereign Tribal Nations, and National Parks.

Questions 9 through 13 should be answered by anybody with interest in the Mexican spotted owls and the conservation of natural resources.
