You probably know that exercise is good for you and that you need to do more of it. Studies show that people who exercise regularly have a lower chance of heart attack, cancer, high blood pressure, and many other chronic diseases. 1. Start slow and gradually lengthen the time of your workouts.

3. Stick to a regular time every day/week.
4. Choose a variety of exercises that are enjoyable, as well as convenient and fun to do.
5. Check your progress. Can you do it faster than when you first started?
6. Find an exercise partner or join a structured group program.
7. Set realistic goals and reward yourself when you reach your goal.
