"Head, quarters, army, of the Cumberland
Camp, Crepple, Crepple Tenn, March 5th
Mr. Jonathan Jones, You will find inclosed
James H. Paris, Descriptive Roll which will
entitle you, or his Sisters to Draw his Back
Pay, when you or some one else is appointed
his administrator. I feel it my Duty to say
something in regard as to his Bravery, he was
as Brave Soldier as I had in my Comp. and
was too much so for his own good, for he
exposed him self more than was necessary
it was in one of his bold attempts that he
was shot, Jim was a good Boy and beloved
by all of his comrades, and his death was
regretted by all the Boys who knew him

I had noticed him for several weeks before
we left our old camp ^{at Washville} and also the Sunday
before we went into the fight, and altho ever
chance he had he would be reading his Bible.
I have often thought of him since his Death
and do believe that he had some Idea of never
coming out of Battle, as he went in.

But Poor Boy he has gone from this world to an
other, and may his Sole Rest in Peace where
war is ^{not} known.

My health is good at present. I found the
Boys in good health and getting long fire

There was one Mr. Brock came
to our camp this morning
and said that you wish
to know where your Brother
was shot and what day of the
month and what day how he
was shot by his fellow

Soldiers. well, I did not see
him. after he was shot but
I was told that he was shot
through the head. Capt. Rowe
was close by him when he
fell and he says the same
he will write I fear. being in
this, and State what he saw
to know how he was killed
to by the Boys in the camp
well James was I can say
that he was loved by all

the boys, he was a
favorite of all the boys
and ^{as} regards his
bravery there was none to
exceed him, he stood up
to like a man until
he was killed, dead he died
without a groan. Poor Boy
his death was regretted by all
of his brave soldiers.

you can say to all of your
friends that you have lost your
brother in an honorable cause
and his spirit has gone from
this to another world

RECORD PROOF OF MARRIAGES, BIRTHS AND DEATHS

State of Ohio County of Clinton

On this 5th day of October 1891 personally appeared before me, a Notary Public, within and for the County and State aforesaid Jas. W. Spurgeon, who, being duly sworn according to law, declares that he resides in Sabina County of Clinton, State of Ohio and that he says:

He says he was well acquainted with Wm. B. Paris and Nancy E. Paris - they lived in Sabina Ohio and I was at the death and burial of said Wm. B. Paris which was some years before the war - the date I don't just remember. He left his wife a widow with three girls and two boys. James H. Paris was the only son able to do any work to aid his mother who was destitute circumstances and he worked for me and I paid his mother said Nancy E. Paris.

He was her only defendener. I don't know of my own knowledge of this marriage, but I do know that Mrs. Paris was a good women and firm in character and believe that she would not live with a man illegally and that they were married in Kentucky where they came from as they said. We lived close neighbors and I saw them daily.

Affiant further declares that he has no interest in the prosecution of any claim in behalf of Lida Smith for Pension.

GENERAL AFFIDAVIT

State of Ohio County of Clinton

In the matter of The Pension claim of Mary F. Starr, sister of JAMES H. PARIS Co. K 90 Ohio Inf., Personally came before me a Notary Public in and for aforesaid County and State, William G. Hutchings aged 73 years citizen of the town of Sabina, County of Clinton, State of Ohio well known to me to be reputable and entitled to credit, and who, being duly sworn, declares in relation to aforesaid case, as follows:

That he has resided in Clinton Co. and about Sabina for 50 years - and was well acquainted with the Paris family. They came to Sabina about 10 years before the late war from Kentucky. Wm. Paris the father died soon - and - Ellen his widow, James their son, Jennie, Mary and Lida were the daughters. Mrs. Paris done everything to keep her children together. James doing all he could to help her - he was stout and industrious - He went into the army and at the battle of Stone River he was reported killed. I have never seen him since.

Mrs. Paris died in 1857 or 8 and the children named above got work when they could. I am satisfied they all belong to the one family - looked like and bore the same name - they were of good character, honorable and industrious.

He futher declares that he has no interest in said case and is not concerned in its prosecution.

Sir:

I have the honor to return the papers and submit my report in claim 171992, Mary F. Starr, minor sister of James H. Paris, Co. K 89th Ohio Vol. Inf.

The claimants post office address is Keosauqua, Van Buren Co., Iowa. The soldier was killed in the Battle of Stone River Dec 31, 1862. It is alleged by the claimant and other minor children that they were dependent upon the soldier for support at the time of his enlistment, their parents having died several years prior thereto.

Upon this ground they file claim for pension as minor sisters and in making their applicatiOn they gave different dates of birth for -----(can't read)----

and also correct dates of deaths of John W. and Jennie S.

The claim came to me for the statement of Mary F. Starr one of the minor sisters and an applicant for pension.

She states that the date of her birth was Nov. 9, 1857 and that she took that date from her parents family bible in which the dates of all their births were recorded. The bible was afterwards lost in moving around so much, and she has no other means of knowing her age, and she has always accepted the above date as her birthday.

She is a woman whose education is limited, but of excellent moral character as her reputation for truth and veracity is very good, and her statement is given in an unhesitating and frank manner. From her appearance I believe her to be correct in her dates concerning her age and the same can be accepted.

She has no positive recollection of the dates of birth of the other children but it has been her understanding that:

Jennie S. was born March 5, 1851
Lida was born July 27, 1856
John W. was born Dec. 25, 1857

She is positive that John W. is the youngest child.

She also states that she received a telegram of the death of Jennie S. at Seattle Washington January 19, 1895. The date is fixed in her mind, and she claimed that she had the telegram but was unable to find it.

The date of John W's death she does not know.

Further examination is recommended.

Claimant Lida Smith, New Vienna, Clinton Co. Ohio.
She may be able to give further data for examination in Clinton Co. Ohio as to dates of births.
