adopted by the

Second Brigade General Baird's Division
in camp near Nashville Tenn

March 2nd 1863
Head Quarters 2d Brigade Gen Baird's Division in
camp near Nashville Tenn March 2nd 1863
at a meeting of the field staff and line officers
of this Brigade (composed of the 84th and 92nd Ill
96th Ill and 115th Regt of Infantry and the 9th Ohio
Battalion held at Brigade Headquarters this day of 2^d
March 1863 Col Smith D. H. was called to the
chair and Adj't. G'd Louver appointed secretary. The
following Preambles and Resolutions were read Separately
debated upon and adopted with entire unanimity. The
same was read at the head of each Regt and the Battalion
this of his own authority and acted upon by
the Soldiers with the result certified to below

Preamble and Resolutions

whereas we the officers and Soldiers of this command
here in communion with our comrades in arms
desperately periled our lives and every earthly
interest to serve to ourselves and to our
Country a country and a government the same

which in historic times were bought with Blood and established by that quality of wisdom which though human seems divine: and

Whereas A number of intriguing demagogues at home have recently by word and act sought to create disaffections among us Black the wheels of wise legislation & excite discontent in the public mind and in every way to Baffle all earnest efforts to conquer the Rebels Resolved that we hold in utter detestation the clique of miscreants in the loyal states who under the garb of assumed loyalty are the stolen revenue of each treason to excite just treason in their own communities who have no censures save for the officers of our government - no complaints save that energetic measures are employed to crush the Rebellion - no aspirations save to embroil our

Cye-cyne and Legislative Departments and engender malice in our Arms - and no hopes save for an ignoble peace and the substantial triumph of the Rebels; that we regard them as enemies to our Country and mankind who to accomplish their hellish purpose would not hesitate to blot

forever from the bosom of man the cherished thoughts
of self government and that they merit the scorn of all
loyal citizens and brave hearted Soldiers combining
as they do the deep guilt of the treason with the
essential means of the coward. Resolved
that despite the proudest efforts of our foes before
us and the despotic insolence of our other foes
behind us we will abdicate not one jot of faith or hope
but believing the maintenance of our government
is with all the energies joined in its establishment
we emphatically assure all citizens at home that
not until we have undergone a generous struggle
(if need be) will we cast this contest and not until we
have experienced such sufferings as were bravely
endured at Valley Forge will we begin to murmur.
By all the sacrifices already and hardships endured
by me - by all the sufferings of our comrades in hospit-
-al and camp - by all the precious Blood which has
ever since and our Eastern and Western masters - by
all the hearts more disolute and heart-sickened re-
-sunder because of this wicked rebellion - we do
solemnly pledge our honor as Americans and Soldiers

to see this carried through to a successful issue
or quell of our lives a willing sacrifice to our country's
weal Resolved That we are sincerely opposed to any
omission or cessions of Hostilities until our glorious
flag of thirty four stars moves triumphantly from
the dome of every capital in our land Resolved
That we fully and unequivocally endorse the policy
of our civil rulers in using all necessary means
to strike decisive blows at the unholy Rebellion
and do bring the war to a speedy sure and glorious
termination so that traitors in the South may
meet with deserved punishment and despicable
treason The war can be brought to a terrible
justice that hemp be not created in vain
Resolved That to the loyal millions who encourage
us in our efforts who sympathize with us in our
hardships and who rejoice with us in the
triumphs of our armies we tender such hearty
gratitude as Soldiers fearing a hostile
fire only can feel

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Camp at Brentwood Ten April 6/65

Our camp is station on a nice piece of Ground in the woods right close to the Nashville and Franklin Rail Road we are guarding the rail Road Bridge it is a small Bridge but it is useful to our Troops while they are station at Franklin to carry Provisions to them and we are here to keep that Bridge the 19 Michigan was the Regt that was here to guard the Bridge before they was taken Prisoners the 22 Wisconsin Regt was camp about a mile and a half from when the Rebels attacked them they took the 22 Wisconsin Regt was taken first and then they come down here and took the 19 Mich without firing a Gun and then they set fire to all the tents and every thing else that our men had our Cavalry went to Reinforcements to our men but they was to late they was all gone they burnt the bgs over coats and blankets

the 82nd Regt Ill Vol & the 9th Ohio Battery and
 about five hundred of the 6th Kentucky Cavalry
 is here with us we have been Building
 fortifications here and we have got them most
 done General Atkins acting Brigadier Gen
 said that he could hold this place now
 if fifteen Thous and Rebels should come up
 and attack to day they have commenced Building
 a fort our cannons will be here tomorrow
 they are 36th Pounders A Gun day we was all
 run up in line of Battle in them first the
 Rebels drove in our Cavalry Pickets but
 the Rebels did not come near of the weather
 is pleasant and warm through the day time
 but in the Evening they are cold so that we have
 to put on all of our cloths to keep warm
 yesterday went down to the cars to see Wm Wren
 & Son Mr Brewster and Wall & Co. Chemists
 of they got their discharge and was a going
 home our cavalry picked up these Prisoners
 to day and we came in that had deserted
 from the Rebel Army

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 one hour
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 105th Regime
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Brentwood is between Franklin and Nashville
it is ten miles from Nashville and
Eight miles from Franklin so if we are
attacked we can get Reinforcements in
one hour and a half from either place
Colonel Atkins is our Brigade commander
and General Baird is our Division
Commander the Regiments that belongs to
our Brigade is the 96 Regt and the 92 Regt
105 Regiment of Tennessee and the 85 and 40
Ohio and the 9 Ohio Battery and the 6 Kentucky
Cavalry we have not but one Brigade in
our Division now for the first Brigade
is all taken Prisoners three Regiments
that belongs to this Brigade are back to
Franklin there is thirty Thousand men
station there now it is reported that
the Rebels have fall back across Duck
River but it is not believed by our Generals
the general opinion is that Piece will
be declared by the first of July next

Camp at Franklin Ten April 9th, 1863
yesterday morning our company went out on Picket
we was station ther. at Brentwood about four
o'clock we had orders to come into camp and
get Ready to march when we got there they had
our tents down and ready to march we left
camp at five o'clock in the Evening and started
for Franklin the 42 Ill Rgt. was with us and
the 9th Miss Battery we got in to camp at
nine o'clock in the night and got up our
tents it was a warm and Pleasant day and a
good time to march that is the way after we
got things so that we can defend our selves
first rate we have got to march one more day
we would have the Entrenchments all done and
every thing so that we would be Ready for the
Rebels to come but now if we have a fight we
will have to fight in the open field we gone the
first of to Six Regiments that come of from Nashville
and four Batteries the distance from Brentwood
to Franklin is eight miles the country is rough
and Rocky but it is a great fruit country

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there is not many Apple trees but peach
trees that you can't eat of here not seen
no apple tree since of how long in Tennessee
see and there is lots of Almonds there
the Major said this morning that we was
going to march to Monroe morning over
Columbus river with one hundred and fifty
Thousands strong it is twenty five miles
from Franklin and it lies on Duck River
it is reported that the Rebels has two
hundred thousands men there but not
generally believe the Rebels are about
fifteen miles from us now with a force
of twenty thousand there is here now
of union soldiers sixty thousand

Franklin Tenn April 10th 1863
got up at five o'clock and fell in line
of Battle and stood till day light
and then we had to move our tents
in line and dig ditches around them
we dug deep and seven inches wide so
as to let the water run off when it rains

Rain & here written to letters to day one to
Sister and one to Sammie for a gun Rock
we did not get any mail to day

Franklin April 11th 1863

I went up to see the fort and when I got up
there our Pickets was attacked the 40th who
was out on Picket they drawn themselves up
in line of Battle and the Rebels made a charge
on them and drove them back & did not
look at the fort. one of had to go back
to the Regiment for they was drawn up in line
of Battle we stand before our Gunners till
four o'clock and then we had orders to march
and follow up the Rebels which we did so
we went out and followed the River down
the name of the River is big Harper we followed
the River down five miles when we had a
a skirmish with the Rebels but drove them
back then our company was thrown out as
the. skirmish being company but the Rebels had
retreated so that we did not follow more

we was thrown out till Nine o'clock
and then we fell in line and march
back to camp we got back to camp at
one o'clock and then we had to get
Gaffer our cavalry captured one of
the Rebels Batteries and one hundred
and fifty of their men and we did
not have cavalry enough there so
the Rebels Recaptured the hell thing
a goin the Rebels made some of the
Baldust dashes that of every heard
of they come right into town and
a captain and three more come right
under our fortifications and the
men that was a guardin the fortion
Bridge shot the three Prisnrs and
took the captain a Prisner we kill
twenty of their horses and when we
Boss the Battle ground our men had
counted one hundred and sixty six
of dead Rebels and they had not counted

all of them of have not heard how many
 more they found after we left there we took
 twenty Prisoners and one was three and
 two lieutenants we kill one major three
 captains and two lieutenants when we came
 back the dead Rebels was not picked up but
 was laying all along the road it look hard
 to see them lay there some was shot through
 the head and some through the breast & some
 fort know that we rebuked the Rebel Battery
 we start six men kill and four wounded they
 was out of the 60 who one was and orderly sergt
 they was a fighting all along the road yesterday
 yesterday the Division is that was in this Battle
 was General Board General Gilbert General
 Stanley and a Division of Cavalry and
 I believe that General Thaddeus Division
 was there they Cavalry fort come in with
 the Rebel Battery and three hundred more
 of their men if we had went out two hours
 sooner we might of taken all of them but we
 could not move till we had orders

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yesterday was a drizzling day we could not
see over a mile went up to the fortifications
to dig two Regiments and a Battery of six guns
can hold it if there was a force of twenty
Thousands come up to take it went down to the
camps and see two hundred Rebels Prisoners
get in to go to Yorkville to be kept in short
confinement we had three burnt one captain
one Major one Lieutenant one Drummer master
and one pay master the Prisoners said that
they thought that we had not but one Regiment
here or they would not of allow'd us now
they said that General Vandorn run past
us soon as we commenced firing our
Guns the Prisoners are what we call the
Teyers Rangers and they are the best men
that the Rebels have we took in all of the
Rebels four hundred they are a dirty set
if men they was dress pretty well some
of them said that they would fight us till
they could not fight no more and some was
tired of it

Comp at Franklin Tenn April 14 1863
came of from Pickett this morning from
Colonel Atkiss Head Quartermaster had a Gold
tent to stay in there was not much firing
last night or Pickett night before last
the 75 oft Regt went out on Pickett and they
had one man shot and one man Wounded
it was so dark that they could not see ten
feet ahead of them and they shot one of
the Rebels Wednesday we went out on
Pickett our Regiment and we had one
man in company 97 shot and one Wounded
where our company was stationed was in
and old house and the Rebels shot at
us twice and the Balls come in nearer
that it made us dodge it rain all day
and all night all night and it was so
dark that we could not see fine tent
before us we did ~~not~~ hit our guns get
out of our hands and we just kept our
Eyes and ears open we expected that
they would come and give us fight in

the morning but it rain so that they
did not come we was relieved at Eight
o'clock in the morning yesterday
some of our men had a fight with
some of Vendome men and whip
them out and took lots of Prisoners
but we have not heard how many
yesterday of got two letters one from
Barine and one to Grolin advised
one of them to attack Grolin said
this morning that we was going
to be attacked and he was up all
four o'clock but the reevs did
not come to day & wrote me letter
to Grolin and me that four months
ago we showed forty-two soldiers
I paid the Grotis eight dollars
per a pair of boots that of got of
him end of wish that he had them
again for they was not worth three
dollars went out in drags piddle
this evening no paper to day

Camp at Franklin Tenn April 18th 1863

we was call out this morning at half past
three o'clock in time of Battle for we did
expect and attack this morning for they
come with a large force and fired at
our Pickets but did not kill any nor wound
any of our men we could not tell whether
we killed any of their men or not nor do we care
we furnish Fifty men on the fortifications
to guard the wood out of our
Regiment to day we have been the most
distant that we have had since we have
been here we hear by the papers that the
General Vandover the Rebel General has
had heavy reinforcements and if that is
so he will give us a fight but if he will
wait a few days we will be ready for him
for we have commisred some new Artificers
and when we get them done we can come with
two hundred Thousand men and we can
not take it off Bought his Branches of Gunpowder
of the Guerrillas and paid 40 cents a Branch

this afternoon I went over the other side
of the Rail Road and seen the dogs tents
that we have got to have all that they are
is to pieces of Cloth Batten together and
a Pole iron through the middle of them
to hold them up both ends is left
open so that the wind and rain can
blow in and they aint long enough but
that our feet will heat of them and
there ent but two men stay in them
and we can not sleep in one so far
we have got at our yet and of batten that
we want get them when we move we have
got to take them on our backs with us
all the tents that of course will do that and
the making Regt Men say them
more Regt but if you know what I mean
the Regt is but they do swear about
them like fur and say that they won't
carry them a step nor do of blame them
for of don't believe of making a mile of
as more we have got to give up our

Knapsacks and all most every other thing now we will begin to know what Soldiering is the captain told me to day that our Regt was a going to be filled up with drafted men and I am glad of that for it is a getting reduced down a good deal the Cavalrymen come in to day and reported that the Rebels have full luck to Chattanooga and that they went out as far as Spring Hill and captured 40 of their tents but who is not exactly believe a woman and her boy the son staying this morning and his father come in for Protection her knapped it the Rebel army if should like to know who would not go where her Husband was General Braxton Bragg lived here this afternoon and of with that he would burn the Hall town for it is the first place that the Rebel flag was set a pole in business but they will protect it nothing scared off any & sent home sixty two dollars to day

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Camp at Franklin Tennessee April 19th 1863
got up at four and fell in line of Battle but
did not stay there long for it rain so that
we could not mix up a pan of dough for
Bread clean up my gun etc wrote two letters
one to Banville and one to Sister got one letter
from Banville and got two papers from home
we did not have any prospect in this forenoon
it rain so that we could not pack up my
over coat to send home to make my load
lighter after we march it will make ten
pounds difference and that is some thing
then we will march all the boys
are dressing their over coats home of hard
states excepting that we was not a going to
leave here in three months and of have not
got much hopes of that for they will send
us of some where to build fortifications
for some other Regiments to come and take
our place when we get them done that is the
way that we have done most of the time

20

Camp at Franklin Tennessee Apr 20th/63
got up at four o'clock and fell in line
of Battle and there till of eight and
then got Breakfast and at six o'clock we
had a Regimental muster to see how many
we had in the Regiment so we could send
the muster Roll to Washington so that
the President can send us some more
men if he has not heard how many men
his Regiment can muster there has done
and order that if the Regiments ~~can not~~
muster five hundred and eight that half
of the Commission officers and half of
the noncommission shall be mustered out
of the Service the Colonel and Major
shall be mustered out and that the Lieutenant
Colonel and Adjutant shall take command
of the Regiment that is the first thing that
I have heard for Government want being
Payings officers such as pay when they
are out of pay one in the army when it can be
done with less of the officers

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yesterday was Sunday and General Granger burnt four nice hours and every thing that was in them it was a nice sight to see them all burnt together the man that own them is in the Rebel army yesterday got a letter from Samie and wrote two one to sister and one to Samie and of got two papers from home to day the most of our Regiment went up to the fortifications to work of was General of the Cavalry Party that went up to fort to work we are getting the fort almost done it will take over about ten days more and then we can put in into Regiment there and a Battery of six guns and then we can hold it if and away of twenty thousand men come to take it there is four regt. here in the fort now and there is two more coming to be put fort of here this afternoon that General Baird told General Granger that if his command was always got to move to other places and Baird

fortifications for other Regiments to move
 in after we have got them done that he would
 Resign his position and his command
 but Gen George told him that we was
 to Build this fort and then his Brigade
 would stay and Guard it that we would
 not have to build any more than is the way
 that I like to hear the General Bond
 talk for we have built fortifications and
 when we get them done then we would have
 to give them up to some one else we have
 fort-build from to two days that we had
 thought had directed of us before we went
 on that trip to Duck River but they did
 not direct they went one day to far from
 camp with out their arms that is their guns
 when some of the Rebels come in them and
 took them Prisoners and sent them to
 Chattanooga and from there to Richmond
 and kept them in York for a short time
 and then they Paroled them and sent

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them to Camp where in which where they
are to be exchanged our Major got a
letter from them to day and they say that
they would do get back to the Regiment.

it has been a warm day and a pleasant one
we have got three birds here almost alone
the names of my relief to day are

we must cut the work on the part of river
0 clock and work till six o'clock at night
we had two Reliefs one Relief would work
one hour and then the other would work for
hour we had to take our guns with us

"Camp at Franklin, Tenn. on 2nd / 63
 got up at four and fell in line of Battle
 and stand there till after daylight and then
 we got Breakfast had some pancakes and
 meat then I went over the other side of
 the Rail Road and getting likeness taken
 it cost me two Dollars and it a very good
 one Colonel Atkins said this morning
 that we would not have them Dog tents &
 was over to the Regiments that have got
 them and they say that they ain't worth a
 cent and that they won't keep them but they
 will have to keep them if the General says
 so the Regiment that was out on Picket
 last night was fired into twice but no one
 was hurt the officers think that it was
 some of the town People the General had
 ought to burn the tall town down to ashes
 and then there would not be a place for
 the rebels to retreat themselves which
 we know that they do a good job as one of
 our men was a riding through town there was a
 woman shot at him but did not hit him

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Comp't Franklin Ten Apr 22nd 77
got up at four and fell in in line of
Bottle and stacked our guns and then
went and got our Breakfast and at nine
o'clock we had inspection of our guns
we detailed out of our company three
men to chop wood three men for camp
guard six men for Picket and a corporal
for Picket and fifteen men and a sergeant
and Corporal for to work on the fortifications
Sergeant Stevens and Capt' Thomson do
work at the fortifications yesterday we
had to detail Sergeant Sinkallow Sergeant
Ferguson Corporal Ellis Corporal Whana
Capt. Youngs Lieutenant Clarkson and
Captain Blackett that is to commission
officers and five noncommission
officers an in one day we have to
furnish more officers out of our company
than any other company in the Regiment
and it aint right for it belches in
our faces every day and I know that

The others Companies does purrake half
as many as we do but there is one consideration
that we havent got so stog here all of our
life if we had of would drent but the longer
that I am in the army the better that is
like it - I know that I would not be contented
if I was to go home now if I live of course
bound to see this war through and I think
that I will for of course had better health
in my life than I have had since I have
been in the army here in the army or more
and cult his soul his own it is worth
every thing for a man to be free when he
wants to going where he can go with out
having to go and ask and officer if we
can go but there is a good time a coming
as the Christians say yesterday one of
the twenty second boys that was taken
Prisoner by the reich at Bretnau come
in to our lines he got a way from them
at Columbia he was glad to get away from
them he said the reich march them

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from Brentwood to columba with out stopping to let them rest till they got there the distance from Brentwood to columba is thirty three miles he said that they missed him a little while after he was gone and that he laid down beside of a boy and the Rebels country came close to him but did not see him but he said that he would be back before he could get to our lines again but he was not he says that the other boys were in good spirits when he left them but once he left them they have all been fraid and don't come to share ohio he says the Rebels force is large he thinks that they have about sixty thousand men and they are all mounted on horses he says that they have three Battalions of six guns each now all the forces that we have is about fifteen Thousand but the rebels can come here with one hundred men and they can take this place from us

This morning our Cavalry had a skirmish with the Rebels but there was not heard how they came out only that we lost some men how many of did not hear we got seven of the Rebels prisoners and they say that we kill over a hundred of their men and wound over a hundred of them the Rebels have come here with a large force we will see some hard fighting pretty hard one two but we are all anxious to whip them and have this rebellion stop General Clark said that need not have them day unless we wanted but I heard to night that have got to get them to morrow but the boys swear that they will burn them up when they get them

The 92d Regt went out on Picket Rd today and we have got to go on today after tomorrow and of will be that it will rain for we have not been out yet but what it rained

Camp at Franklin Tennessee 8/14/63
 came up from good at the Generals head
 Quarters this morning at eight o'clock
 yesterday I was detail as Sergeant of
 the guard and it was my luck to get
 on at the head Quartermaster yesterday morning
 we fell in line of Battle at four o'clock
 and stood there till day light and then
 we got our Breakfast and then we mounted
 good men for skirmishing men for picket
 good four men for camp guard and
 twenty men for practice and to work on
 the fortifications the names of my Guard is

 had some good times we had to sleep right
 out in the open air but it was a pleasant

Evening, and it was so warm that we did
not want anything over us yesterday our
Cavalry captured six Wagons and teams of
the Rebels and got some Prisoners but we
have not heard how many they was out
after forage for their teams and they came
to close to our lines and the Cavalry had
a little skirmish with them but we have
not heard how they came out of got two letters
yesterday one from Scamie and one from
of Brown he is in the 33rd Wisconsin Regt
and are Stationed at Memphis and yesterday
we heard that miles Jones was dead
but we are in hopes that it ain't so
this morning our Regiment went out and
Picket the other side of Big Harpeth River
and the rest of the Regt in our Brigade
have gone to work on the fortifications
they are a fucking things right a long
now and there is two Regiments a chopping
down trees so that we can have ~~falling~~ with
our Big guns

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our men got th in four Rebels Prisoners
this after noon that they got in the four
now they Report that General Von Donne
is to attack this place in a couple of
days they said that he would of attacked
yesterday us but his Reinforcements
did not come up in time but he is a
making all the preparation to give us
a Brash off a while General George got
Telegraph news to day from Morpueboro that
they got General Morgan a Prisoner and
fifty of his men at Morpueboro but it
is not believed so here but we are all in
hopes that it is so there is lots of Families
been sent out of our lines for the past week
and they have gone to Calumba where the
Rebel force is Sergeant Glionens have
just come of from guard from the front
and he says that the Rebels Pickets are in
sight of our not more than eighty rods
of each other they will keep a evening closer
when they will have to go back quicker than

they come when them twenty four
 Pounders come after them they will
 think that the old fellow is after
 them himself & wrote two letters to
 day one to Sister and one to Dray
 & help the Cutters some this after
 noon it is reported in the papers
 that our men have taken the boat call
 the Queen of the West and a captain and
 Eighty men that is a good tall if it
 is true General Mitchell has issued
 and order for all the Regiments inside
 of his lines at Parkville to take the
 oath of Allegiance to the United
 States within thirty six hours or
 leave the City and if they don't he will
 put them in close confinement that is
 the way that I like to hear a General
 talk for it shows that he wants to see
 this thing done and returned home
 to the Dear friends that he loves which
 we all do but we can't tell when this

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will be far & ent're that this war
is eng nearer to a close than it was a
year ago now it won't be as long as they
keep paying the officers such big pay
for they don't care a fig for the union
but it is the almighty Dollar of wicked
that the President would eat their pay
down half then this thing would come
to a close they don't care for a private
and how much they make or how bad for
they don't get time for they have a good
horse to ride and they don't look to the
health of the Soldiers they go in to a
house and have every thing as they want
it - have two or three Niggers to wait-on
them all that a private gets is thirteen
Dollars and here got to be out in the rain
all night and day where they will set in the
house the Generals if need and drink their
Champaign and Brandy and smoke their
Cigars but there is one consolation we
have not got so long here for life time

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if we had to stay for life & knew one
that would desert and go where they could
not find him and that one is Ben King
but if will stay till my three years is out
and then they went get get me again another
but if we get in to a fight there will be
some that won't never see home again but
we all knew that it was a dangerous place
to be in but let it come we come here for
to die for our country if need be we did
it come here to die in camp the boys

one of them they will be smart for if have
got and Rubber Blanket and when we
march & will make a horse of that when
we camp on a march for the Blanket is
as soft as good as the tents are and there
will three pounds carried for melting
it out he six months before they will
make us carry a mule and provisions

Camp at Franklin Tennessee April 25th/68,
got up at five and got breakfast and
then I was detail Sergeant of the camp
guard it was not my turn for some
of from guard yesterday morning at nine
o'clock and then to be detailed to do of
work to the eight and he said that I
need not go on to do so of Lemuel Miller
took my place our Regiment come in
from Trickel at nine o'clock they say
that some of the 6th Kentucky Cavalry
went up to the Rebels Trickels and
Shook hands and talk with them
for three hours if our General will
allow that is a Rebel himself and as
for the Kentucky Cavalry I believe that
they are all rebels for their acts show
it four Regiment of northern men
are with the Regiments of Kentucky
men for they always run when they
get into Battle & know that they did
at this skirmish that we had here

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the Regiment has gone out to Practice
longt shooting that is hard when they
have got come of from picket and they
have got to stay out two hours and
when they come in they will have to clean
their guns before they can lay down and
sleep but what does our officers care
they would not care if all the boys was
on duty every day for they don't have
to carry a gun nor do they have to
handle the shovel or pick all day
the Cavalry have just batch in three
more prisoners that they got out in
front there was two come in to our
lines and gave themselves up and
took the oath of Allegiance and they
wanted to go to Kentucky so our General
gave them a pass and sent them there
one of them was engage to be married
to a union Girl and she told him to
do that and then she would marry him
after this was is over she live in
in this place

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Camp at Franklin Tennessee April 26/63
got up at four and fell in for roll call
and then we had inspection of guns
then we got ready for march across of our
Guns and Knapsacks which came off
at ten o'clock & drawed one pair of
pants over hot this morning and some
feathers to put on the hat & we set
going to draw the Cummings to the hat
but Colonel Clark said that we had
to take them and put them on or else
he would put us under arrest that
is the kind of officers that we have
got they will make the boys pay for
things that they can get along with
out who wants three or four pounds
of Brads on their hats for the hats
are heavy enough with out them
& got a little from Samine and some
papers from him it is a running
hard now nothing new in the papers
to day

40

in the after noon about three o'clock
four Regiment of Cavalry has gone
out to the report is that
the Rebels are retreating but it is
not believed but we will know when
the cavalry comes back we have
heard some firing out to the front
a ready General has formed and
order to day that the boys have got
to stop & barking firecrackers and we
have got to eat what the cooks cook
and if we do we will all die before
long for we eat line in beans soup
and salt pork and hard bread all the
time and we get beans soup once a
day and we do get tired of it all the
time there isn't a man in the Regt
that likes General Slocum and I
swear if he takes us in to Battle
that he never will come out a live &
wish that General Sherman was here
things would go difference he done gone
home on a sick furlough

Genen o'clock we have not heard
from the Cavalry that went out to the
front this after noon but have heard
bring in that direction they have not
come in yet we have got 2000 places high
in the fort-powly put high that we can
climb up and look for ten miles we can
see the Rebels camp foot as plain as
though they was not five miles off
it is a nice place to rest and see the
fight-when there is no the 40th Ohio
Regiment-had been on Expia duty for
Borking when they got them off ten's
General Granger put them on for ten
days to work on the fortification that
is hard of how one thing they will have
to put over Regiment on duty when we
get them home for we will make more
noise than the 40 did the General wants
the work and he did not know how to
get it-unless he did that he has got
all other men down on him

Camp at Franklin Tennessee Apr 27/63
got up at four and fell in line of battle
and stood till day light then our Regt
started to chop down some timber but
we had not got forty rods from
camp when we had orders to go the
front and prepare for a fight - for
the Rebels was marching on us with
a big force we marched to the front
and the Yankees now as a coming with
a large force and they burn and rob
all of our country went out to the
front and a Battery went with them and
at four o'clock they made a charge on
the rebel Camp and found them to
sleep all but two companies and they
was a cutting the rail our country buried
into them and the rebels all shot and
ran but we got one hundred and fifty
of them and lots of their wagons and
teams but our men did not have time
to get the wagons and teams away

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so they piled their guns together and
burnt them and also the tents it was
and advanced guard of the Rebels that our
men charge on we kill twenty of their men
and wounded about thirty all that they
wounded of our men was four and didn't
not kill one of our men we took one Major
one Colonel three captains and six
Lieutenants that was a good haul before
Breakfast we found in the Colonels
spurs on the ball discription of our boats
and fortifications and general how we
are encamped and the men that gaves them
to the Rebel Colonel was a man that does
live in town but we can't find him
now but he will be catched off in a while
for the General here got some men to
watch him and if he comes in town a
gain he will be catched and then he will
be sent to Nashville for safe keeping
that is the way that we like to see the
General do it shows that he is buried

to have the rebels all leave the town
or be taken to Yorkville and he have
punished and order that if any one is found
a giving intelligence to the rebels or
aiding them any way that he will burn
the hall down down in less than ten
hours after he finds it out and if
the one is hatched he will treat him
as a spy and his sentence will be
death & if that will not a stop to
their demnable Skinner they have sent
all the prisoners to Yorkville to
day and there they will be kept in
safe keeping for a spell dead and
entombed & when they will rise and that
that this Brigadier shall get up at four
o'clock and fall in line of Battle and
stand there till sun rise and that
we shall not make a bit of noise while
we are out there and that we shall not
have any Rebels and we have got 100
Revolvers to do us every morning

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Till we gets further orders from
him that is done so that the Rebels
won't find us to sleep if they should
make and attack on us and if we
glad of that for we don't want to be
a surprise when they come out of the line
we have slept so long in the morning
it is reported that Vandence has been
reinforced by General Price if that is
so we will have some hard fighting before
we whip Price but I believe that the
report is not sensibly believed but we
know that the rebels have got a much
larger force than we had when we got the
other side of Big Muddy River we was
drawn up in line of battle where we stood
two hours and then we was ordered to
move back to camp and leave our things
and then report to Generals Brodys Head
Quartermaster and get our arms and then go
to cutting down the timber that was back
of our camp which we did we commenced at

ten o'clock and stopped till four
and then we went to camp and got our
gear and then we had to go out on
dry ground we cut down ten acres of
timber and it was the best timber
that I ever saw it laid so thick together
that a man could not get through it
there was one tree that had a tree fall
on him but did not hurt him very far
he fell down flat to another log if he
had not of done that he would of been
killed instantely I was present at one
of the Rehearsal and the names was

Scamp at Fort Helen Reserve 5/18/53
we got up at four o'clock and fell in
line of Batts and stand till the sun
rises up and then we had Battalion drill
for one hour and then we got breakfast
and then the detail came for guard and
for to work on the fortifications we had
to take four out of our company for camp
guard six for Picket and twenty four
for Camp on the fortifications and
what was left in camp had to police the
Regimental parade grounds and it didn't
go till three o'clock in the afternoon
Colonel Clark will have all the men
work all the time or less he can't stand
it all the boys in the Regt. here to be
detached every day we here to work all
the time here the boys say that they did
not enlist to work all the time so night
the boys did not get in to camp a half and
hour before dress parade and they had to go

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out in dress parade and then General Clark sent all our officers to drill the boys in the manual of arms but the officers told him that the men had worked hard enough to day and we did not have to drill and when of course been to work all day of went drill we go an dress parade they can not me under and over first and then of went we police all of five acres to day there has been some hard skirmishing three miles from here but we have not heard the results that is the report and there has been some guns heard that way there was a private sentence to be shot to day but he was reprieved and sentence to prison for three years the cause was that he tried to desert three times and go into the rebels but he was caught every time first before he had got to the Rebels lines it took hard to see one of our Soldiers sentence to be shot

but we have got to make and example
of some of them before long and he
knows what the penalty was before he
went but of our glad that they sent him
to prison instead of shooting him
for it will give him time to repent and
return to the wrong, and of girls shot before
this time is out he will wish that he
had stayed with his Regiment - he belongs
to the 115 Ohio Regt that is the first one
that of have heard of being executed so
he shot or sentenced to be in prison
of went over the other side of the rail
road and got my likeness taken and
paid three dollars for it - we had orders
from General Atkins to day to turn over
half of our teams and he said that we
would have to march in a few days to
Charleston but it is not generally
believed there is nothing new in the
papers to day except Wm McCay was detailled
for Pickett and Lang & Daubelle for frantique

Camp at Franklin Ten April 29/63
got up at four and pull in line of
Bottle and drill in the command of
ours till day light then we had inspection - we
= elions of arms Sergt Ferguson was detailed
as Sergt of camp guard of made a letter
to Scamie and of got one from sister
this after noon we drewed our dogs
tent there was four of us bollar
together so thot it makes all the room
that we want we can not stand up in
them when we are in them we have to sit
down in them but they wont keep the
cold out much but they are better than
nothing we had a heavy rain this morn
got up and they did shield the rain
better than we thought they would the
names of them that is in this tent is
Sergt Ferguson Sergt Stevens Sergt
Ring and Capt W^t McCay all good
boys the Report have got around that we
are nine months over again but it is not
believe

camp at Franklin Tennessee April 30th/63
got up at four and fell in line of battle
and stood there about and hour and then
we had an drill for and hour and then
we had inspection of arms and then we
got ready to be mustered for pay
we had no take our knapsacks out or
mail in General Baird was here to see
of inspection he spoke very high of
our Regiment we had a General muster of
all the Regiments that that is here sent
over to see the beauty they are camp in
some mud and they are first rate bat-
talion horses are all poor and broken down
of course all the soldiers to day we had
to find you men for picket their
names are W Davis of Hovin & Shaw
of Stewart and one horse of his name
is M. Deselin and Lieutenant DeLoach
but DeLoach has come into camp and General
Branger has sent over and taken his sword
away from him but don't know what for

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Baptist at Franklin Tennessee May 1st 1865
we got up at four and left in time of
battle and shied there till day light and
then we drilled one hour and then we
had inspections of our guns we did not
make a delay of any men but do go out
on Picket for we expected and it took
here to day so we wanted all the men here
General Von Dorn sent in a flag of truce
yesterday and told General Granger that
he would give him till three o'clock in
the after noon to Surrender or less he would
take the fort by force but General Granger
sent word back to him that he would not
Surrender and that he was ready to fight
him at any time if you that the Rebel
Von Dorn don't know how many officers
boys there is he if he did he would not
of sent in here and went to here us
to Surrender for he knows that the boys
from Illinois never will Surrender

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when we are so well fix to defend our
selves nor will we ever cowardly went out
at eleven o'clock last night and General's
Gibbons Division went out to the
front at two o'clock in the night but the
Rebels did not come to attack us our
coward made a charge on the Rebels at
four o'clock and made them run for
their lives if they had been and hour
sooner we would of got about a thousand
of the Rebels we kill a number of the
Rebels and wounded about fifty of their
men and took lots of them prisoners
but of have not heard they did not kill
any of our men but wound twenty five
or thirty of them but not so but what
they will all get well if our cowards had
of attacked them and have sooner they
would of found them all to sleep they
went out time enough to of attacked them
and have sooner end of don't see why they
did not do it

it is reported that we are to have a
 heavy reinforcement here in a couple
 of days and then we're got to move ~~to the~~
 front and whip the Rebel Yank out or
 to drive his hell bronce back to
 Columbia and then we will have to fight
 him in his camp and build some more
 fortifications to hold them in check there
 for a while we has picked six men for
 Picket-guard and one sergeant for camp
 guard the boys likes these day intoller
 than they thought that they would and
 we have all the room that we want and
 they are more healthy than thos large
 one all the full that we can find with
 them is we have got the drags our selves
 out of doors the doctor says that there
 won't be half as many sick as there
 was in thos large tents and of gds that
 it is so far we won't have to break the
 same air more so many times and if
 one of us are sick we won't be trouble
 half as much as we was in the large tents

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The nine months talk is still high & rising
and some have gone as far as to bet twenty
five Dollars that we will be discharged
at the end of nine months of duty see what
makes them think so fair of us see eng
Sizzas of it and I can not find out where
the boys gets their news but of hope that
it is so far off home got sick of the Suburb
if we are mustered out at the end of our
nine months of will enlist in the Artillery
or cavalry & think that of would enlist in
the Cavalry for they do have a Thrush
with the Rebels every little while and they
are in the more all the time they cant in camp
twenty four hours at a time when Suburb
moves they have got to carry our Knapsacks
and guns Blankets and every thing else that
a Soldier has but we did not have enough
to carry before so they had to give us some
lents to carry or less go with out shelter
the weight of one lent is five pounds and
no man carries that one man takes two
lents and a half

Camp at Franklin Tennessee Mo 3 st/63
 we got up at twelve o'clock and fell in line
 of Battle and stood there till one o'clock
 and then we went into our tents to
 sleep but we had to keep our cartridge
 boxes for we was liable to be call out
 at any moment - the reason that we was
 called out was Captain Falloway was
 a going the grand rounds and he pitched
 in the news that the Rebels was between
 us and Brentwood with a large force
 and that they was close to our Picket
 lines and that they was a making preparation
 to attack us at day light - but they did
 not come this we slept till after day
 light this of was detailed as Sergeant of
 the Provogue men we went up on the hill
 where the Signal Corps was and where
 they are now we had to go first to the
 Brigade Head Quarters to Colonel Atkins
 then to the old fort and from there to where
 we worked if we had went right from our

leamp we would of some of two miles
Travel of didn't see what we had to go that
round about my the fort that we are a
Buildings now is made of stone for we
can't get dirt enough with out the stone
it is a perfect bed of slate stone and
we can't tell how deep it runs for we
did not get half way to the bottom of it
all that we had to do was to iron under
a crow bar and it would come up in
Big sheets the names of my relief is

 morning to get more things for their
 teams but they had not gone three miles
 before they was drove in we could see
 the Rebels with the glasses three miles
 out and we seen them when they drove
 in our teams but the guards that was
 with the teams kept the Rebels back
 till our teams got back in to our lines
 again we had six teams taken by the
 Rebels yesterday on the Nashville pike
 while they was a going to Nashville I
 believe that the teams was from the
 84th Ind Regt we sent six teams but
 I believed that they got through safe
 for the Seaboard and that went with
 them none been heard from.

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It was Telegraph here to day that General Hooker has crossed the Rappahannock in three places and he will do something before long and it was Telegraph in here to day that General Meade's corps has all been annihilated in Missouri and that we had taken him and all of his corps but it is not believed that we have got him we hope that it is so but if all of to day's news are true it will hurt the Rebels cause awfuly we have just received some sealed orders there is something in them but of hope that it won't be marched for we have got so that we can live now of Received two letters to day one from Sister J did not go out on drags Parade for my head Ach is so that I did not feel like going out we got a paper from San Diego to dated April 30th and it says that General Hooker is on the move we had a Telegraph about Gen Banks but I did not hear what it was

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Camp at Franklin Tennessee April 27th/63
we got up at three and fell in line of
Boat but we did not stand there long for
it rain so that we could not we expected
and attacked this morning by the Rebels
they got between us and Brentwood so
we expected that the Rebels would attack
us at the front and rear both at once
but they did not come we had inspections
of arms and had the Regulations read
to us Mr George White invited them to
day from looks so it seems good to have
some of our friends to come and see us
he has a gun in camping & there has
one Regiment of Cavalry just gone out
to see where the Rebels are and to see
how large a force they have if they did
not get a daily to day of got two
papers from home but they was told ours
of wrote his letters to all of me to my
sister and one to H. H. Gerrit at Alton
Illinois

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Comp't Franklin Tennessee Aug 4th/63
we got up at three and fell in line of Battle
and stand there about one hour then we
went to our tents and got ready to go out
on Picket our whole Regiment went out on
Picket this morning we started from camp
at about 5 o'clock and relieved that other
Regiment our company was stationed right in
the Timber about one hundred rods from the
Reserve in an old barn between the Reserve
and us is all Prairie so if we should be
attacked we would be right in open fire of
the Rebels while they would be in the Timber
and behind trees last night our company fell
back about half way to the Reserve but we
had to leave four men and a Sergeant I was
left there and W Davis & Farris & Worth
& Haggard and the Company Pickets fell back
with in ten rods of us now that isn't right
to let the Company fall back so close to
us for if the Rebels should make a charge on

camp at Franklin Tennessee May 5th 68
we came off from Pickett at nine o'clock and
got some things to eat it rained all night-
as what boys struck up to the old barn was
as dry as could be, the company that fell back
got as wet as could be at day light the
army advanced out to their outer fort
and our company advanced to where it
was station about seven the Rebels came
up to our cavalry Pickets and fired at them
but as they come up our Pickets had some
Reinforcements so our men made a charge
on them and drove them back but the
Rebels made another charge on our men
and was driven back again we have not
heard how the skirmish resulted and we
have not heard whether we had any soon kill
or not and there has been heard some more
pretty hard firing at the same place this
afternoon two Regiments of cavalry have
gone out there so we will hear from them
pretty soon

will go on forever & you will be happy ever

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Camp at Franklin Tennessee May 7th 1863
came off from guard at eight o'clock and
then cleaned my gun yesterday I was

men we have commenced a new way
to stand Camp guard on Camp only
stands one day and then another takes it
so it patches us on camp guard every
tenth day and it is a better way to stand
guard for we know where the boys are when
we let them go to their tents all the men
that we had on a relief is to one before
the Redonado tent and the other back where
the horses are so that the Cavalry men
would not steal them the other night one
of the Cavalry men took our Major's horse
but our Major went and found him in
the morning for as they was going to
Reward him and they was going to cut of
his main end tail so that the Major could
not prove him

it commenced to rain before I went on guard and it rain steady till I came off and it is a raining now & stop from eleven o'clock till morning I might as sleep all night but I staid four hours for the Guard so that they could sleep some it was awful dark and cold so that we wanted our over coats on but we did not have them for we have sent them all home the names of the guard is Sergeant H. of Ringo, Corp W^t McKee Corp G. Ellies Privates of Replagon } C. Webb J. Hosty
 G Paddock A. Thorne G. Smith
 and we was relieved by Company I it is not hard work now to stand camp guard for we all can go to our tents but them that is on duty but we bys come on guard or in Replagon every day yesterday our Regiment went and cut timber all day in the rain they cut down one of the prettiest trees that I ever saw the timber that was cut was on a Major's place he is in the Rebel army he is now at Fredericksburg

and our own ways though many try
to do us wrong and we do the same to
us and bring us in with all kinds of
trouble off which you may be the
cause and go on to your punishment if
you will not give up all your unrighteous
ways and live righteously to the end
of your life and off the lip of death
going into another world and get out of it to God.
We are not here now or of this world
but we are off from it and our bodies
will return to earth and our souls to God
at the last day when we shall be
judged by the works of our hands and
the works of others. We are here
now just to help you and to teach
you the way of salvation and to tell
you the truth about God.

68

Camp at Franklin Tennessee May 8th 1863
got up at three and fell in for roll call
and then we formed a line of battle and
stood there till day light then we drilled
one hour and then came the detailed for
Picket we had to furnish ten privates
one Sergeant and one corporal Sergeant
Linklater went and then all the privates
that was left in camp had to go on fatigue
and one Sergeant sergeant Stevens went on
fatigue. The boys had to work on the fortifica-
tions on the big hill where the signal corps
one the boys have to come on duty every day
now and when they work all day they have
got to get up at three and stand till day
light and then drill one hour and then
have to go to work just as soon as they
get their Breakfast the Colonel takes the
night to drill the boys for he cant in the
day time but the boys swear that they wont
stand it much longer they dont get time
to wash their clothes

Colonel Champion got back to the
Regiment yesterday he has been here on
a sick leave & does not look as well
as he did when he left they think that he
won't be able to take command again but
we all hope that he will for we like him
better than we do Colonel Clark for he
looks to the boys comfort and all that Colonel
Clark cares for is to get the work out
of the boys yesterday there was a fight at
Brentwood where we was stationed we heard
the Cannonading as plain as though we
was close to it we have not heard how
the Battle terminated one Regiment of Cavalry
went out three from here but they have
not got back and one Regiment has gone
out to the front we are expectation a fight
here every hour we have got our buts fire
so that we are compell'd now we are stand
up in it and we have built us a bad out
of Boards and raised it one foot from
the ground.

Camp at Franklin Tennessee Aug 9/63

got up at three and fell in line of battle and stood there till day light and then we had to drill one hour then the detail came for guard we had to furnish ten men for Pickett none for camp guard and all other men that was left in camp was detailed to work in the fortifications we got the news that General Hooker had to fall back this side of the river on account of the River a rising so that he could not get his Reinforcements across to help him we had fine more guns come to day to spot in the fort that will make eight guns in it and we expect a lot more since General Hooker has been defeated the boys are a gittin's dis couraged and think that this war won't never come to a clared out two letters from home and all are well it is reported that the Rebels are a fallings back to Columbia

Scamp at Franklin Tennessee Aug 10, 1863
got up at four and fell in line of battle
and stood there till day light and then we
had drill for one hour camping drilled then
we had to get ready for inspection of the
clock of guns got a Nashville union and
it reports that our lost at Fredericksburg
was ten thousand and the Rebels lost was
Eighteen thousand and the paper starts
that General Meade is going to
supersede General Hooker that is the way
when one General does a good deed he is
sure to be superseded and it is reported
that General Von Donne was shot at Spring
hill a couple of days ago by a man by the
name of Dr Peters he shot him while he was
in bed with his wife it comes from a
true source and it is believed we might
as well shoot them that way as another
there is nothing new in the day's paper
of home front got to work being here

it was Telegraphed here this after noon
that General Stoneman and General
Gigl are in Richmond and have got
men enough to hold it till they get some

down his apple trees and "peach" trees
the trees being full of fruit the peaches

full size to cut them down but he had

let us here to destroy their property
but if he had been a union man we
would of had to cut it down for it was

fine peaches through the largest trees

The Rebels have off this we all wish
that there was some more Georgians
in the Rebel army that would do the
same thing that is the quickest way
to kill off the Generals this paper starts
to say that General Hooker has not crossed

The Rebels have offered us forty
Prisoners for that Dr Peters that

be given up to them they say that they will
shoot him if they do ever get him and

The papers states to day that General Hooker has not crossed the River again and that both armies hold the same position as they did before this Battle and the paper states that General Hooker was under and over and the paper reports that Gen Hooker lost seventeen Thous and men in this late Battle and the Rebels lost eighteen Thous and men but Hooker cut off all the Rebel communications to Richmond and the paper report that General Stoneman went with in one mile of Richmond City and captured a rebel Battery and that he might of went clear in if he had a mind to but he was afraid of being cut off from the main army and he taken all of them prisoners and the paper says that General Grant has got Dickburg surrounded and has got the Rebels supplies all cut off from it and we are in hopes that he will take the place pretty soon

we did not move to day waiting for order the Rebs have all crossed duck River and its reported that we are going to Palaska and go into winter quarters

Conf in the field Pen dec 30th 1864

we moved at seven in the Evening our supply train come of to day with Rations Gen Sherman has whiped the Rebs in East Pen and took 33 Cannon and some to day

Conf in the field Pen dec 31st 1864

we took the Atchase road and marched seventeen miles and went into camp snowed all night - nothing done

midfusson Pen Oct 2/64

there was lots of women at my front door
said that they wished that Forrest would come
in here and kill all of the blue yankeys I
made them stop back talk where I was or
I would shoot them one woman said that
she would not stop and some of the boys
got their guns and they would of shot her
but she kept still act 3/64 there was one
guard shot on the manchester picket last
night by the rebels and one wounded and
three killed on the nashville picket by bushwhackers
the rebels kill and old man last night that was
eighty years old because his son was a union
man it is reported that Gen Grant took four
thousand prisoners & fifty cannons with Richmond
it is reported that the Reb Gen Harriet is a mopping
for Nashville in hopes of taking it act 4/64
our schools went out to day and found lots of overseers
that went out for apples yesterday they were taking
prisoners and that each had four ball holes through
them they were thrown into a ditch and covered

over with leaves it was and awful sight to see
them they was bored to see at his a drunk the man
was Cleare offered two hundred dollars for the man
that done it he was a Reb there was thirty homen
taken by the rebels to day and killed seven miles
from here all was from Penn Marfield Pen Oct 14/64,
when I got to Tallahoma I asked the Scent that was
in charge of the cattle if I was relieved he said
that I would have to go to Chattanooga and I
was not to go only to Tallahoma I went to
the Colord commanding the post and he told
me that I was not able to go and I got my trans
- pation and got relieved of the Scent he was
mad because I went up to the Colord and we
had some words he was going to put me under
and arrest and I dared him to do it but he did
not do it for I had so much against him
he found that he could not scare me
Anupushno Pen Oct 24/64 the Illinois boys are
a going home to visit the officers come around
and got the names of all the boys from Illinois
and sent them down to the hospital for them to

make out our parole we will be off to start tomorrow if they do get them made out soon enough we gone to think that we would not have a chance to go home there is ten out of the some company that I belong to that is going home and all is a going to vote for Lincoln and Johnson there will be about one hundred leave camp and all a going to vote for Lincoln Oct 28/64

some citizens went out to where the bushwhacker Smith lives and four soldiers with myself went with them and we laid in ambush for him we laid there about one hour when he come up to a citizens house and sat down to it and told them if they tried to put it out he would shoot them and as he spoke he killed both of them and then he come towards us as he come over caught his shotgun and let him have it we put six ball holes through his body and one through his fore head and we killed one of his other men their bodies will be fetched into camp tomorrow

at home have recently by work and act

order the good of assumed loyalty — the

Camp at Brentwood Ten April 6 163

Our camp is station on a nice piece of ground in the woods right close to the Nashville and Franklin Rail Road we are aguarding the rail Road Bridge it is a small Bridge but it is useful to our troops while they are station at Franklin to carrie prouision.

to them and we are here to keep that Bridge the 19 Michigan was the Regt that was here to guard the Bridge before they was^{all} taken Prisoners the 22 Wisconsin Regt was camp about a mile and a half from when the Rebels attacked them the took the 22 Wisconsin Regt. was taken first and then they come down here and took the 19 Mich without firing a Gun and then they set fire to all the tents and everything else that our men had our Cavalry went to Reenforcements to our men but they was to late they was all gone they burnt the boys over coats and Blankets the 92 Regt Ill Vol and the 9th Ohio Battery and about five hundred of the 6th Kentucky Cavalry is here with us we have been building Fortifications and we have got them most done Col Atkins acting Brigadere Gen said that he could hold this place now if fifteen thousand Rebles should come up and attack to day they have commenced building a fort our cannons will be here tomorrow they are 36 Pounders a we was all drawn up in line of battle in them for the Rebbs drove in our Cavalry Pickets but the Rebbs did not come near us the weather is pleasant and warm

through the day time but in the evening they are cold so that we have to put on all of our clothes to keep warm yesterday went down to the _____ to see Wm Warren to

_____ Mr. Brewster and Wallace Chamberlin if they got their discharge and was a going home our cavalry fetch in three prisoners today and one came in that had deserted from the Reble Army

Brentwood is between Franklin and Nashville it is ten miles from Nashville and eight miles from Franklin so if we are attacked we can get reenfoursements in one hour and a half from eather place _____ Atkins is our Brigade Commander and Gen. Baird is our Division Commander the Regiments that belongs to our Brigade is the 94 Regt and the 92 Regt 115 Reg Ill Vol and the 85 Ind 40 ohio and the 9 ohio battery and the 6 Kentucky Cavalry we have not but one brigade in our Division now for the first Brigade is all taken prisoners three Regiments that belon to this Brigade are back to Franklin there is thirty Thousand men _____ ther now it is Reported that the Rebles have full pull back across Duck River but it is not believed by our Generals the General

Opinion is that Piece will be declared by
the first of July next

Camp at Franklin Ten April 9th 1863
yesterday morning our company went —
on Picket we was station then at Brentwood
about four o'clock we had orders to come into
camp and get ready to march when we got
there they had our tents down and ready to
march we left camp at five o'clock in the
evening and started for Franklin the 92 Ill
Regt was with us and the 9th Ohio Battery
we got in to camp at nine o'clock in the night
and put up our tents it was a warm and
pleasant day and a grand time to march
that is the way after we get things so that
we can defend our selves first rate we have
got to march one more day we would have the
entrenchments all done and every thing so
that we would be Ready for the Rebles to
come but now if we have a fight we
will have to fight in the open field we
gave the — of to Six Regiments that
came from Nashville and four Batteries
the distance from Brentwood Station is eight
miles the country is rough and rocky but it
is a great farm county
there is not many apple trees but peach trees
that you cant — — have not seen

one apple tree since I have been in Tennessee
 and there is lots of Almonds trees the Major
 said this morning that we was agoing to
 march tomorrow morning for Columbia Ten
 with one hundred and fifty thousand strong
 it is twenty five miles from Franklin and it
 lays on duck river it is reported that the
 rebels has two hundred thousand men there
 but not Generally believed the Rebles are
 about 10 miles from us now with a fource
 of twenty thousand there is here now of
 union soldiers sixty thousand

Franklin Ten April 10th 1863

got up at 3 or 4 o'clock and fell in line of
 Battle and stand till day light and then we
 had to move our tents in line and dig
 ditches around them one foot deep and
 seven ~~8~~ inches wide so as to let the water
 run up when it does rain I have written to
 letters today one to Lester and one to Leannie
Rock we did not ~~get~~ any
mail to day

Franklin April 11th 1863

I went up to see the fort a when I got up
 here we Picketts was attacked the 40th Ohio
 was out on Picket they drawn themselves up
 in line of Battle and the Rebbs made a

charge on them and drove them back
I did not look at the fighting for I
had to go back to the Regiment for they
was drawn up in line of battle we stand
before our Quarters till four o'clock and
then we had orders to march and follow
up the Rebbs which we did do we went
out and followed the River down the
name of the river is big Harpers we
followed the river down five miles when
we had a skirmish with the Rebbs but
drove them back then our company was
thrown out as the skirmishing company
but the Rebbs had retreated so that we
did not see anymore we was then thrown
out till nine o'clock and then we fell in line
and march back to camp we got back to camp at
one o'clock and then we had to get supper our
cavalry captured one of the Rebbs Batteries
and one hundred and fifty of their men
and we did not have cavalry enough there
so the Rebbs recaptured the holl thing
again the Rebbs made some of the ~~badde~~
dashes that I every heard of they
came right into town and a captain and
three men came right under our fortification
and the ~~men~~ men that was a guarding the
Bridge shot the three Private.

and took the captain a Prisoner we kill twenty of their horses and when we pass the Battle ground our men had counted one hundred and sixty-six of dead Rebbs and they had not counted all of them I have not heard how man more they found after we left there we took twenty Prisoners and one was three and two Leutnants we kill one major three captains and two Leutnants when we came back the dead Rebbs was not picked up but was laying all along the road it look hard to see them lay there some was shot through the head and some through the heart I have past heard that we retook the Rebbs Battery we lost ten men kill and four wounded they was ~~out~~ of the — ohio one was and orderly sergt they was a fighting all along the Murfreesboro yesterday the Divisions that was in this Battle was General Baird General Gilbert General Stanley and a Division of Cavalry and I believe that General Sheridans Division was there their Cavalry — came in with the Reble Battery and three hundred more of their men if we had — out two hours — we might have

taken all of them but we could not move till we had orders yesterday was a smoky day we could not see over a mile went up to the fortifications to day two Regiments and a Battery of six guns can hold it if there was a fource of twenty thousand come up to take it went down to the
