Note: "Purchase money" includes all revenues collected during the reporting fiscal year at allowed and approved stages from all ongoing cases leading to patent; however, this money is not always received in the same year that the application is allowed or approved, or in the same year that the patent is issued. Purchase money enters into the land exchange process because exchanges must result in equal value given and received by both parties; this means that cash payments are sometimes made or received by the Bureau to ensure an equitable exchange.
