



Oregon will comply with the elementary and secondary education MOE requirements on an aggregate basis using the amount of funds provided to LEAs through the State's primary funding formulae, the State School Fund and the School Improvement Fund.

For FY 2006, this amount of funding is described in 2005 Senate Bill 5510 sec. 4(1).

For FY 2008, this amount of funding is described in 2007 House Bill 5020 sec. 4(1), plus the portion of 2007 House Bill 5021 that was expended during FY 2008, plus the funds described in 2008 Senate Bill 5556 sec. 24.

For FY 2009 "prior-enacted", this amount of funding is described in 2007 House Bill 5020 sec. 4(2), plus the portion of 2007 House Bill 5021 that was expended during FY 2009.

For FY 2009, this amount of funding is described in 2007 House Bill 5020 sec. 4(2), plus the portion of 2007 House Bill 5021 that was expended during FY 2009, plus 2009 Senate Bill 5552 sec. 1(4) for State School Fund and School Improvement Fund.

For FY 2010 and FY 2011, the amount of funding is a *preliminary estimate* (based on maintenance of effort) of Legislatively Approved appropriations for the State School Fund and School Improvement Fund.

3(b) Identify and describe the data sources used in determining the levels of State support for public IHEs:

Unlike primary and secondary education, State support for institutions of higher education is approved on a biennial basis. The following identifies legal authority for State support for IHEs and the additional records that were consulted to identify annual expenditure of authorized funds. State support appropriated to post-secondary education agencies that are not expended on IHEs are excluded for the calculations in this application. Only General Fund and Lottery Funds appropriations are included.

For FY 2006:

- Annual expenditures were identified through the following documents:

2. State's Primary Education Funding Formulae

Identify and describe each of the State's primary elementary and secondary education funding formulae that were used in determining the calculations provided for the levels of State support for elementary and secondary education:

The State School Fund: The State School Fund is a fund established within the Oregon State Treasury. A statutory distribution formula, typically referred to as the equalization formula, directs funds from the State School Fund to school districts and education service districts. The formula distributes available revenue to each district using a measure of relative financial need. The resulting equalization grant actually is the sum of four grants: a general purpose grant, a transportation grant, a facility grant, and a high cost disability grant. Statewide, the general purpose grant is about 94% of the total equalization grant, the transportation grant is about 5%, the facility grant is 0.4%, and the high cost disability grant is 0.6%. The general purpose grant uses weighted students as the primary determinate of funding.

The School Improvement Fund: In addition to the State School Fund, the Oregon Legislature periodically distributes other state funds to school districts for operations. The School Improvement Fund is distributed to school districts and education service districts using weighted student counts. Districts are required to submit applications and tie activities funded by the grants to performance measures.

Unlike primary and secondary education, State support for institutions of higher education is approved on a biennial basis. State support appropriated to post-secondary education agencies that are not expended on IHEs are excluded for the calculations in this application. Only General Fund and Lottery Funds appropriations are included.

5. Process for Awarding Funds to Public IHEs

Describe the process that the State will use to determine the amount of funding that individual public IHEs will receive from the funds that the State sets aside to restore the levels of State support for these institutions:

State support to public universities is distributed by the Department of Higher Education based on two mechanisms approved by the Board of Higher Education: a per-student full-time equivalent basis and a targeted basis. Funding based on enrollment is distributed through the Resource Allocation Model (RAM). Funding values are identified for 19 “cells” (12 for undergraduate students and 7 for graduate students), and campus allocations are based on the number of students in the varying cells. “Full funding” for the cells is based on median support for competitor universities and is discounted based on total state support. Targeted programs provide funding to support policy decisions; areas not reached through cell funding, or; areas in need of enhanced funding due to extraordinarily high program costs or other factors. Targeted programs are generally mission-based rather than enrollment-driven.

State support to public community colleges is distributed by the Department of Community Colleges and Workforce Development according to a distribution formula adopted by the Board of Education. The formula includes a base level of funding for all colleges to ensure a minimum level of support for the smaller schools. Almost all state support is distributed on an adjusted enrollment basis: colleges receive funding for their full-time equivalent enrollment in lower division collegiate, career and technical education, developmental education, and certain adult continuing education courses. A small amount is distributed to support distance learning programs and contracted out-of-district reimbursement. Allocations to the colleges are adjusted to equalize funds received from the State and from local property taxes on a per-student basis, with a hold-harmless calculation that will remain in place until full equalization is achieved.

State support for the Oregon Health and Science University is included in appropriations established by the Legislature. Funds are distributed by the Department of Higher Education in eight equal payments in each biennium.
