Arizona teachers are under appreciated, and I am pledged to do everything I can to increase this State's appreciation of its teachers.

As I have written before, it is extremely important to bring home to the Arizona public that Arizona students perform above the national average on every single broad-based nationally normed test: the Terra Nova (which almost all of our students take), the SAT, the ACT, etc. Considering that Arizona is 49th out of 50 states on what it spends per pupil, these test results are a tremendous tribute to you and your efforts, and one of the many reasons you deserve to be more appreciated!

- My top priority with the legislature this year is to use a reasonable portion of this year's budget surplus for an increase in teacher compensation.
- Our discipline initiative urges school boards to support you 100 percent in imposing the classroom discipline which is a necessary pre-condition to academic achievement.
- Wherever I go throughout the state, I focus on busting negative myths about Arizona public education, and spotlighting the positive. It's nothing more than telling the truth.

Phoenix Union High School District incorporated Scholastic's 180 program into reading classes at all ten of its comprehensive high schools and one alternative high school in school year 2003-2004. Now in its third year of implementation, the reading program, which serves primarily freshman, produced significant increases in the reading ability of high school students. In the first year of implementation, 67 percent showed at least one year's progress, 57% gained two or more years, and 34% jumped four or more years. Approximately 3600 students each year are enrolled in the program. Bother ELL and the special education population are included in the classes. The district has invested both monetary and man-hour resources in supporting READ180. At the onset of the program, the district either hired reading endorsed teachers or paid for reading endorsement classes at ASU for current teachers to ensure that all READ180 classes were taught by qualified teachers. teachers and a full-time instructional specialist at each site, strong implementation is a priority. In addition to ongoing support by Scholastic, PUHSD offers summer training in Read180 to all teachers. The ongoing cadre of READ180 teachers has a district web board for sharing and discussion.



The Role of Professional Development in School Success By Oran Tkatchov, Director of Academic and Instructional Support, ADE

Professional development plays a crucial role in assisting schools to meet today's challenging academic standards. Per No Child Left Behind legislation, professional development activities can include items that facilitate the following:

- * Improve and increase teachers' knowledge of the academic subjects the teachers teach, as well as improve classroom management skills
- * Are part of broad school-wide and district-wide educational improvement plans
- * Give educators the knowledge and skills to provide students with the opportunity to meet academic content standards
- * Are classroom-focused, sustained, and intensive- not short-term
- * Advance teacher understanding of effective instructional strategies for all student groups
- * Offer technology integration and use data to inform educational decisions
- * Improve family involvement

Research shows that high quality or research-based professional development creates gains in student learning. Teachers who understand their content and understand effective classroom practices have the greatest impact on student learning (Killion, 1999). Research also states the most important factor in student achievement is teacher quality (Hanushek, Kain, & Rivkin, 1998, Darling-Hammond & Youngs, 2002).

So what can schools do to ensure that high quality professional development is being offered? When considering what professional development activities to present teachers and staff, the Arizona Department of Education recommends schools and districts follow the standards set by the National Staff Development Council (NSDC, 2001) and the U.S Department of Education (USDE, 2000). Based on these documents, high quality professional development should include the following:

- * Focus on teachers as a crucial component of student learning, but include all other members of the school community
- * Require considerable time and resources
- * Be driven by a coherent long-term plan and provide follow-through opportunities
- * Be evaluated by its impact on teacher effectiveness and student learning
- * Build knowledge, awareness, and practice in new content and approaches
- * Present opportunities for teachers to develop pedagogical practice
- * Provide job-embedded topics relevant to the participant
- * Promote the academic standards
- * Utilize the most current data-based research in education

The Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, in Prescott, is pleased to host two TeachSpace workshops this summer (June 7-11 and July 12-16). Oriented towards High School teachers, these workshops provide teachers experience in developing and implementing lesson plans rich in space-exploration and utilization content. As a participant, educators with a track record of curricular innovation and peer leadership, selected through a nomination process (ending May 17) by their administration, learn how to introduce space exploration and human spaceflight topics to math, science, and technology students.

Participants receive: text, instructional materials, and access to the TeachSpace curriculum website; free room and board and a \$100 daily stipend (for a total of \$300); and one graduatelevel credit awarded by Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University. In addition to academic and professional development credits, each participant is inducted as an honorary university alumnus and is empowered to grant \$1000 annual scholarships to their students who wish to study an aerospace-related major at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University (Prescott or Daytona Beach, FL, campuses).

Arizona Project ChalleNGe accepting applications for next class session

Arizona Project ChalleNGe, a leading voluntary educational program for high school drop-outs, is looking for young people who want a second chance at completing their education.

The 22-week residential program has a high success rate for helping drop-outs finish their education and become productive citizens. Seventy-five percent (or more) of those who voluntarily enter the program successfully earn their General Equivalency Diplomas (GEDs). Enrollees must be in the age range of 16 to 18 years old on the first day of classes, though they can turn 19 during the class session.

Arizona Project ChallenGe offers a new beginning and a brighter future to Arizona's drop-outs. Located in Queen Creek near Phoenix, the program runs two class sessions per year, with no charge to the student or his/her family.

"We are providing a second chance for many young people," said Don Smith, interim director of the program. "It's exciting to see them go on to further their education, or enter the job market as more mature, prepared, and capable members of society. In just under six months, these young men and women experience an incredible transformation, mentally and physically as a result of the program's dedication to education, life skills, volunteerism, and health awareness."

Smith also noted:

- Over the past 12 years, Arizona Project Challenge has graduated 25 classes of students; the 26th will graduate on June 10.
- · While at ChalleNGe, students contribute voluntary service to the community.
- 100 percent of our graduates who are 18 years of age or older register to vote.
- Arizona Project ChallenGe saves the taxpayer an average savings of \$29,000 per student, per year, based on an annual cost of \$14,000 per NGYCP enrollee vs. an annual cost of \$44,000 per youth in a correction facility.
