Willamette Valley Genealogical Society's DNA Project

WVGS has started a DNA Project for both men and women. To join under WVGS...

- 1. Go to the State Library URL at: http://oregon.gov/OSL/GRES/genealogy.shtml
- 2. Click on Genealogy Research on the left.
- 3. Click on WVGS DNA Project
- 4. Click on the Family Tree DNA icon in the middle of the page.
- 5. Scroll to the bottom of the next page and complete the form
- 6. Click CONTINUE to complete the next screen
- 7. Be sure to click only once when you are done so you order just one test.

You will receive a confirmation in your email box that your order was taken. Remember: Only men can order the Y-DNA test, but both men and women can order the mtDNA. It is cheaper to order the Y-DNA 37 marker test as it will tell you that you have a common ancestor within genealogical time for persons you match. Lesser tests (12 markers) provide information on older ancestors prior to 600 years ago. However, you may wish to start small and upgrade. For the mtDNA order both the HVR1 and HVR2 panels (mtDNA plus) as this will give you the best information on your ethnic origins. Again, you can start small and upgrade, if needed.

The DNA Project is open to anyone, not just WVGS members. You are not charged until you send in your test kit. You can do the DNA testing through WVGS and submit it to other groups.

Emily Aulicino will be the speaker for the April 18th meeting, so if you have questions on how to get started or what to do after you get your results, plan on attending that meeting!

Joan Kaiser

Joan is a volunteer on Thursday afternoons. She has been volunteering for about 13 years, starting after attending a WVGS meeting in which a request was made for volunteers. She is the current WVGS Treasurer and conducts the Beginners' Classes. Joan began working on her family genealogy in 1991. An uncle has worked on her father's side, had a book about the family and it led to researching at Family History Centers. She has early ancestry from Nantucket Island, used films from the FHC and has worked on Quaker ancestors. For the Massachusetts ancestors, the Massachusetts Vital Records that we have at the OSL have been a great help.

Joan's mother was Norwegian on both sides and Joan is a member of the local Scandinavian society. She had her great-grandmother's name, used microfilm from FHC and has learned how to read Norwegian. She has also found more on her father's side which is early English, also Scotch-Irish and Pennsylvania Dutch (German), and has made 5 trips to the Family History Library in Salt Lake City. Her ancestors have migrated from Massachusetts to Ohio to Iowa to Washington and the Norwegian side from Wisconsin to Washington in 1889.

Joan is the family historian, also researching stepchildren's families and daughter-in-laws. At the OSL, Joan learned the system here and helped Susie Niggli with setting up the county boxes. She has done a lot of reorganizing at the OSL, especially on the family history section. Assets at the library are ancestry.com and volunteers to help people. It is important to know that we have more than Oregon information, but do have newspapers from Portland and Salem and other cities in Oregon in which people can look for obituaries.

Parking costs during the week (free on the Saturday that we are open) and there is no fee to come to the library. People can contact us by phone, e-mail or through our website.

The Ancestry.com Library Edition is a valuable resource used by both OSL patrons doing genealogical research and others doing State related business. Obituary Database, Wakarusa Public Library, Indiana http://www.wakarusa.lib.in.us/historical/obituaries.asp

Wakarusa is a town in Harrison and Olive townships in Elkhart County, Indiana. It is in the north-central part of the state, not far from the Michigan border. The Wakarusa Public Library's Historical Room Collection includes an online obituary database. The records are from the latenineteenth and early-to-mid-twentieth centuries. The database can be searched by first name and last name and searches can be limited by providing a range of dates for the deceased's birth and death. The search results are returned as an alphabetical list of full names.

Spotlight: The DeKalb History Center by Valerie Beaudrault

DeKalb County, located in north central Georgia, was created in 1822 from Fayette, Gwinnett, and Henry counties. Until the formation of Fulton County in 1853, Atlanta was part of DeKalb County. Decatur, home to The DeKalb History Center, is the county seat. Click on the Online Research link on the homepage to access the website's databases.

Cemetery Database

This cemetery database is comprised of cemetery records for DeKalb County that were transcribed by Franklin Garrett in 1930 and 1931.

Marriage Database

This database indexes marriage records recorded in DeKalb County for the period from 1840 to 1900.

Freedman Record

This database contains information about all free African-Americans residing in DeKalb County from 1851 to 1864.

1821 Georgia Land Lottery for DeKalb County

This database contains records from the 1821 Georgia Land Lottery for DeKalb County. This was the fourth of seven land lotteries to distribute the land ceded by the Creek Nation of Indians to the United States via the Treaty of Indian Springs (January 8, 1821).

1870 and 1910 Census Records Databases

These databases contain surname indexes to the 1870 and 1910 federal census for DeKalb County.

DeKalb Confederate Database

This alphabetical database contains the names of DeKalb County's Confederate soldiers.

Land Records Database

This database indexes deeds showing transfers of land recorded in the DeKalb County Courthouse from 1821 through 1903.

Superior Court Records Database (1836–1843)

There was a fire at the DeKalb County courthouse in 1842 that destroyed most of the records. The minute book indexed here is the only volume of official county records that survived the fire. The volume covers all cases tried in the DeKalb Superior Court between 1836 and 1843.

Will Records Database

This database indexes DeKalb County wills for the period from August 1839 through October 1917.

Stone Mountain Cemetery

Click on the "Information on the Confederate Soldiers Buried in Stone Mountain Cemetery" link to view a document containing detailed information not only about the cemetery and the veterans buried there, but also a history of the town of Stone Mountain during and after the Civil War

Research Recommendations: Preparing for a Trip to the Family History Library

Create a Research Plan

What problems will you work on while you are at the library? Make a decision to focus on one or two specific problems. Then decide on secondary questions you will work on. Too much time collecting negative evidence can be frustrating. Having several problems to work on allows you to move back and forth, increasing the odds that you will find information and solve some of your problems. The Society asks tour participants to submit their research interests on a form in advance. This helps participants focus their research once at the library.

Prepare Your Materials

Sift through all of your unprocessed research findings to make sure you have a list of everything you have looked at for the problems you have decided to work on. This will help keep you from duplicating your research. Ever gotten home from a research trip with a bunch of "new" findings, only to find the same material in a pile from two years ago that you hadn't put into your computer files yet? Create pedigree charts, family group sheets, and narrative reports to help you see where the holes in your documentation are. Back up electronic files onto a flash drive so that you can access them from computers in the library (even if you don't have a notebook computer with you).

Check the Family History Library Catalog

Take some time to explore the catalog before you leave. Make lists of microfilms you wish to consult while you are there. If you make printouts at home, it will be cheaper than printing them off at the FHL.

Order Vault Microfilm

Check the location of all microfilm (this appears under the microfilm number on the right side of the details page). Some microfilm is kept in vault storage, and most be ordered. This process takes at least a day. Did you know that you can order films in advance? You can order them by telephone or online. You can find more details about ordering films at www.familysearch.org/eng/library/fhl/frameset_library.asp?PAGE=library_preparing.asp.

Taking some time to perform these four steps will make for a greatly enhanced research experience at the library. Prepare well for your trip, and you may come home with twice the material you would have otherwise.
