**Willamette Valley Genealogical Society’s DNA Project**

WVGS has started a DNA Project for both men and women. To join under WVGS...

1. Go to the State Library URL at: <http://oregon.gov/OSL/GRES/genealogy.shtml>
2. Click on Genealogy Research on the left.
3. Click on WVGS DNA Project
4. Click on the Family Tree DNA icon in the middle of the page.
5. Scroll to the bottom of the next page and complete the form
6. Click CONTINUE to complete the next screen
7. Be sure to click only once when you are done so you order just one test.

You will receive a confirmation in your email box that your order was taken. Remember: Only men can order the Y-DNA test, but both men and women can order the mtDNA. It is cheaper to order the Y-DNA 37 marker test as it will tell you that you have a common ancestor within genealogical time for persons you match. Lesser tests (12 markers) provide information on older ancestors prior to 600 years ago. However, you may wish to start small and upgrade. For the mtDNA order both the HVR1 and HVR2 panels (mtDNA plus) as this will give you the best information on your ethnic origins. Again, you can start small and upgrade, if needed.

I am the volunteer at the Oregon State Library on Wednesday mornings. I am also the WVGS Newsletter Editor (which is why I am writing about myself) and the Membership VP for WVGS. I became a volunteer 4 years ago after retiring from teaching and moving to Salem. I found that WVGS has many opportunities for volunteering, a way indulge in my hobby.

My interest in genealogy started about 20 years ago thanks to my sister who also is a member of WVGS. She always had an interest in the family stories on both sides of our family. Our mother was Greek and we inherited many stories and treasures from our grandparents but are not able to do much research beyond great-grandparents. My father’s mother was English, descended from many early English immigrants, including William White and James Chilton of the Mayflower. My paternal grandfather’s ancestry was mostly German from the Palantine in the 1700’s to Pennsylvania, going to Canada after the Revolutionary War, and later returning to Minnesota, then Washington and Oregon.

The Oregon State Library is a wonderful place to do genealogical research. We have many of the early New England resources as well as resources from all the states. We have over 500 CD’s as well as microfilm and periodicals. Most of our materials are underused. Patrons don’t realize that the Library has so much available that is in the stacks. As Susie always says, check the on-line catalog.

I truly enjoy helping patrons who come in. I enjoy hearing their stories and seeing if we can help with anything. People do need to have some basic information with them and have to realize that we help them do their research, not do it for them. Having Ancestry.com available on all the computers has been a big help, but as all good genealogists know, you still need the paper trail!

**Mexico Vital Records**

The following was written by **FamilySearch**:

The Record Search pilot has added 72 million new names to its Mexico Baptism collection online. The collection was transcribed from Mexico parish records dating from 1659 to 1905, and is not necessarily complete for any particular place or region. It also includes records from the Middle America Vital Records Index--Mexico that was published in 1999 on CD only. The newly expanded database can be searched for free at <http://pilot.familysearch.org>. The data was transcribed by FamilySearch's impressive force of volunteer indexers worldwide (see [www.familysearchindexing.org](http://www.familysearchindexing.org)). Volunteers donate a little time each week or month transcribing select information from digital images of original source documents using FamilySearch's online indexing utility. Anyone interested in joining the global, community-based indexing initiative, or wanting to see what projects are currently being indexed, can do so at [www.familysearchindexing.org](http://www.familysearchindexing.org)

**FamilySearchWiki**

The Family History Department in Salt Lake City has developed a new research support tool <[www.FamilySearchWiki.org](http://www.FamilySearchWiki.org)>. This resource has been developed to help make family history research advice easier to find and share. There are two ways to search the site; Keyword search or Browse by country. **FamilySearchWiki** is intended as an online community for family history researchers and those interested in learning how to be more successful in the search for their ancestors. This site includes all research outlines published by the Family History Library and many other articles never published such as the wiki material for Japan, China and India. Go ahead, take it for a spin and feel free to tell others about it.

**Encyclopedia of Genealogy Updated**

**The Encyclopedia of Genealogy** now has an all-new "look and feel" as well as an updated set of menus. The result should be a bit easier to use. The basic functionality of the Encyclopedia remains unchanged.

**The Encyclopedia of Genealogy** is a free-content encyclopedia created by its readers, people like you. It is loosely modeled on the Wikipedia example. I created the "shell" of the Encyclopedia and I then "seeded" it by creating a few pages of information myself. However, most of the pages are the contributions of people like yourself: someone with a bit of expertise on a particular subject who would like to share that knowledge with others.

**The Encyclopedia of Genealogy** serves as a compendium of genealogical tools and techniques. It provides reference information about everything in genealogy except people. Look to the Encyclopedia of Genealogy to provide explanations on how to look up your family tree and definitions of terms found in genealogy research, including obsolete medical and legal terms. It describes locations where records may be found. It also will describe how to research Italian, German, Polish, French-Canadian, Jewish, Afro-American, Indian, and other ancestors. In short, the Encyclopedia of Genealogy will serve as your standard genealogy reference manual. If you see anything in this encyclopedia that is incorrect, YOU can change it! If you see anything that is incomplete, YOU can add to it! If you note anything that is missing, YOU can add it! This encyclopedia will succeed because people like you contribute nuggets of information. When enough "nuggets" are added, the Encyclopedia of Genealogy will become a gold mine.

**NOTE:** This encyclopedia is not a place to find all the ancestors of John Doe or all the descendants of John and Mary Smith. The World Wide Web already has many online message boards and databases that perform that function well. Instead, the Encyclopedia of Genealogy serves as a clearinghouse of genealogy techniques: where to find records, how to organize the data found, what the terminology means and how to plan your next research effort.

**The Encyclopedia of Genealogy is available to everyone, free of charge. Everyone can also contribute information, again free of charge.**

**Research Recommendations: *Preparing for a Genealogical Research Trip***

The more preparation you have for a trip, the better the chances that you will have a successful experience. Like most researchers, you likely wish to conduct as much research as possible in the limited time you have in a distant repository. **The first thing to do is to visit the repository's website and find the hours of operation.** For example, unlike many other archives, the main research facility in Montreal for the Bibliothèque et Archives Nationales de Québec (BANQ) is open every Saturday and Sunday, but closed on Monday. We planned the trip so that on Monday and Tuesday the group researched at another repository. Some individuals were able to conduct additional research on Sunday, prior to departing for the airport.

**While you are on the repository's website, use the online catalog to find materials you wish to consult.** Many materials will be in open stacks, but many will need to be paged from secure areas. Being familiar with the materials you wish to consult beforehand will allow you to continue researching while waiting for paged materials to arrive. Having a list of call numbers to consult when you arrive at the repository means that you will hit the ground running as soon as you arrive.

**In addition to the catalog, look around the site and see what materials they have available online.** Many repositories are putting parts of their collection online, and those searches can be conducted from home, either before or after your trip, allowing you to focus your time there on materials unavailable remotely. In addition to these collections, you will often discover finding aids and indexes that will allow you to access materials more easily.

**You will also want to read the repository's rules for access.** Many repositories, such as BANQ, have restrictions on what you can take into reading rooms (e.g., no bags, pens, limited papers, etc.). You may also find their policies on photocopying, scanning, and photography. BANQ, for example, allows photography within the research areas if you would like to remember the repository and your trip, but photographing items from the collection is not allowed.

**The more homework you do before leaving on your trip, the better organized you will be on your arrival, and the more you will be able to take advantage of the brief time you will have in the repository.**



**Civil War Soldiers and Sailors**

The National Parks Service hosts the Civil War Soldiers and Sailors System (CWSS) at [www.itd.nps.gov/cwss](http://www.itd.nps.gov/cwss). The system provides basic information on those who served during the Civil War. In addition to service information on individuals, you can find histories of various regiments, battles, prisoner of war records, and cemetery records. The CWSS is a partnership between the National Parks service and other private and public organizations, such as the Allen County Public Library, Utah Army Corps, National Archives and Records Administration, United Daughters of the Confederacy, and the Civil War Preservation Trust.
