#### 11:00 am to 12 noon Program Room 103

Our program for May 9th will be presented by WVGS Member Thomas Branigar, Historian, speaking on "The Life and Times of Dwight D. Eisenhower". In his talk Tom will discuss his research on President Eisenhower's family background. He will describe how standard genealogical research techniques enabled him to uncover significant information about the president's father that had been previously overlooked by professional historians.

**Thomas Branigar** was born in Salem, Oregon, and was raised in Monmouth. He graduated from Linfield College in McMinnville (BA degree 1974). In graduate

school he studied archives and records management at Western Washington University (MA degree 1976).

From 1977 to 2008 **Tom** was an archivist at the Dwight D. Eisenhower Library in Abilene, Kansas, a branch of the National Archives. His main task was to organize the records of the Eisenhower administration so they could be made available to historians. Significant collections on which he worked include the White House Central Files; the records of the National Security Council and the Special Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs; and the personal papers of Treasury Secretary Robert B. Anderson, Attorney General Herbert Brownell, USIA deputy director Abbott Washburn, and famed aviatrix Jacqueline Cochran. He also served as the Library's staff expert on the Eisenhower genealogy, and helped answer inquiries about President Eisenhower's family background.

Tom retired in October 2008 and returned to the Salem area. He is now working part time as assistant archivist at the Polk County Museum in Rickreall.

# Willamette Valley Genealogical Society's DNA Project

WVGS has a DNA Project for both men and women. To join under WVGS:

- Go to the State Library URL at: http:// oregon.gov/OSL/GRES/genealogy.shtml
- 2. Click on Genealogy Research on the left.
- 3. Click on WVGS DNA Project.
- 4. Click on the Family Tree DNA icon in the middle of the page.
- 5. Scroll to the bottom of the next page and complete the form.
- 6. Click CONTINUE to complete the next screen.
- 7. Be sure to click only once when you are done so you order just one set.

You will receive a confirmation in your e-mail box that your order was taken. Remember: Only men can order the Y-DNA test, but both men and women can order the mtDNA. It is cheaper to order the Y-DNA 37 marker test as it will tell you that you have a common ancestor within genealogical time for persons you match. Lesser tests (12 markers) provide information on older ancestors prior to 600 years ago. However you may wish to start small and upgrade. For the mtDNA order both the HVR1 and HVR2 panels (mtDNA plus) as this will give you the best information on your ethnic origins. Again, you can start small and upgrade, if needed.

The DNA Project is open to anyone, not just WVGS members. You are not charged until you send in your test kit. You can do the DNA testing through WVGS and submit it to other groups.

#### Historical Books Digitized through FamilySearch.org

An addition to the notes from last month's program by Carl Taylor of the South Salem FHC. Family history books are being digitized also. On the familysearch.org, select Search Records, then Historical Books. You will be connected to the Family History Collection at BYU and can easily search by family name. At this point there are **32102** books in the online collection.

#### **Sandy Graham**

Sandy is a volunteer on Wednesday afternoons. She has been volunteering for about 2 years. She began volunteering because she needed experience in a research room for her Master's degree in Library Science (which she will finish this month!) and enjoyed genealogy and history. She worked on her own family history in the '90s, doing research at the National Archives in Seattle. Her mother's family is Slovakian, coming to the US in the early 1900's and her father's side is German, arriving in the 1880's. She has used a society in Wisconsin to help her with letters in Czech, sent letters to the towns of her ancestors and found a great-uncle and cousins. Her research her is limited, most of it has to be overseas.

Sandy hasn't made any genealogy trips, using the information now available on the internet. At the OSL she says there are so many primary resources in the stacks that are seldom used. Especially if you have ancestors who have been in this area for awhile, the library has lots of material. Sandy worked with Evelyn Gatlin in the **Oregon Trail Emigrant Resources at OSL** (list available on the website or in the Reference Room). She also says volunteers have lots of information and advice so be sure to ask when you come in!

#### **British Genealogy**

So many of us have British ancestry. We are always getting questions about how to search for information, sometimes just finding where our ancestor came from in the British Isles is a challenge. This website is an amazing compilation of websites for English Family History and Genealogy. Categories for sites are Genuki, Burial Indexes, Occupations, Civil Registration (BMD), Probate Records, Census and Census Substitutes, Surname Studies, Surname Distribution, Baptism Indexes, Emigration Records, Old Handwriting Aids, Religions, Marriage Indexes, Migration, Land and Court Records, Maps and Gazetteers, Military Records and much, much more. #### Research Sites

#### **April Program**

**Emily Aulicino** was the speaker for the April program. Emily is a member of ISOGG and a project administrator for WVGS through Family Tree DNA. Emily went through the basics of DNA testing for genealogy, a complex subject. She recommend several books to help one get started as well a list of helpful websites. She also provided cost information from several companies doing DNA testing, both Y-DNA and mtDNA.

Why test your DNA? Paper sources may be inaccurate or missing, adoptions and illegitimate children are not always recorded, and name changes are not always recorded.

How does DNA help Genealogists? It can determine if two people are related or descend from the same ancestor, prove or disprove you family tree research, provide clues about your ethnic origins and find researchers interested in the same family lineage.

Emily talked about how to choose the person for which you wish to obtain DNA. Y-DNA tests an all male line or mtDNA test an all female. Male testing can also include mtDNA, since mothers pass on mtDNA to all their children. Sometimes you need to look a your pedigree chart to find other relatives that will give you the information that you want.

Anyone can sign up through WVGS, not just members, and get help from Emily. Emily's hand-out is available at the Reference Desk.

#### Seeking Michigan

The Seeking Michigan website is opening up Michigan's history to information seekers. A major project is the digitization of 1 million death records covering the years 1897-1920. Also currently included are more than 100,000 pages of Civil War documents, 10,000 photographs, WPA data and oral histories, a collaboration between the Archives of Michigan and the Library of Michigan.

#### Jackson County Genealogy Library, Oregon

The Jackson County Genealogy Library (JCGL) is operated by the Roque Valley Genealogical Society, an allvolunteer organization located in the Rogue River Valley in Southern Oregon. The Rogue Valley Genealogical Society has made a number of indexes available on the Jackson County Genealogy Library website. Copies of the records contained in many of the databases described below may be ordered from the library for a fee. Vital Records: The Vital Records databases include birth for the period from 1863 through 2007+. The Marriage Database indexes marriage records for the years 1853–1946 and wedding announcements gathered from Jackson County newspapers are for the years 1942– 2006. The Divorce Database indexes three volumes of records that cover the period 1856-1949. An index to a published volume of records for the Conger Morris Mortuary in Medford, Oregon, for the years 1904-1922 can also be found here. The Death Index contains records of Jackson County deaths for the period from 1906 to 1926. Death Certificates from local Jackson County records for the years 1904-1943 have also been indexed.

Also indexed are Family Records containing a list of the surnames of pioneers and early settlers of the Rogue Valley and five-generation family history charts submitted to the Rogue Valley Genealogy Society by its members. The library's Early Records from the mid-nineteenth century include juror lists (1854-1899), attendance records for the Roosevelt Elementary School (1889-1891 and 1895–1897), and the diary of William Hoffman that records the family's trip from Indiana to Oregon and his life in Jacksonville, Oregon. The Cemetery database currently includes more than 3,000 linked headstone photographs. For Land Records the deed index is the only JCGL resource available online. For **Obituaries**, you will find four obituary indexes for the following newspapers: the Ashland Daily Tidings, the Medford Mail Tribune, and the Upper Rogue Independent (1953-2006); Medford Sun (1910-1925); Gold Hill News (1910-1927); and Central Point Herald (1 of 5 volumes). The library has a Naturalizations database and Court Records and abstracts of court records from the Oregon State Archives containing will, probate and estate files.

#### **1840 Census Names**

The 1840 U.S. Census does list the exact age and the name for those collecting a military pension or a widow's pension. They are often the head of household, but occasionally they are listed living with another family member. These names and ages appear on the second page of each enumeration sheet. The statistics for this was used to publish A census of pensioners for revolutionary or military services, with their names, ages, and places of residence, as returned by the marshals of the several judicial districts, under the act for taking the sixth census. #### **WVGS Constitution Review**

The Executive Board is still reviewing the Constitution and Standing Rules. This recommendations for revisions will be discussed at the May General Meeting. We still have the last of the Standing Committees to review before we are finally finished! (Current language is in parentheses and italics), revisions in bold and underlined.

# 1. Program Committee—we don't have a need for such a large committee.

#### STANDING RULES ARITCLE IV

Section 2 The Program Committee shall be composed of the First Vice-President for Program, who shall serve as the Chair, and (*four* (4)) <u>other</u> members, one of whom shall be the Publicity Coordinator selected by the Chair and Approved by the Executive Board.

# **2. Genealogical Research**—materials are now housed at OSL, library and research procedures have changed. **STANDING RULES ARTICLE IX**

Section 2 A (checklist of these Marion County sources and publications, which are either located in the home of the Corresponding Secretary or are readily available to the Secretary in the Oregon State Library,) <u>list of WVGS</u> <u>publications</u> shall be prepared by the Society.

The (checklist shall be printed in the NEWSLETTER once a year) <u>list will be available on the WVGS website</u> and shall be prepared as a brochure appropriate for mailing to research inquirers. This brochure shall include a complete outline of the Society's research policies as well.

- Section 4 It shall be the policy of the Willamette Valley Genealogical Society to assist (*non-resident*) researchers in Oregon or other states with their family history research according to the following policies:
- A. Free research (shall be provided to non-resident researchers in the sources listed on the checklist described in Section I) is available with assistance from volunteers at the Oregon State Library.
- B. There shall be an hourly charge (or request for donation). to be approved by the Executive Board, for (additional research beyond that described in Section I) research requests received by mail, phone, on-line or through OSL.
- (C. Names of local researchers who are willing to research for a fee may be sent to nonresident inquirers whose requests will require more time than defined above.)

# 3. Treasurer—we don't prepare a budget ahead of time as income changes each year STANDING RULES <u>ARTICLE I</u>

Section 6 The Treasurer shall:

C. prepare (an annual budget) a report of expense and income for the past year and recommend any changes for the coming year, in conjunction with the Executive Board

#### STANDING RULES ARTICLE VI

- Section 4 (A proposed annual Operations Fund budget shall be prepared by the Treasurer and the Executive Board and submitted to the general membership for Adoption) A budget report for the past year shall be prepared by the Treasurer and the Executive Board and presented to the general membership for discussion for the current year each January. The adopted budget shall be authorization for spending, with the following policies to be observed:
  - A. The Executive Board may approve expenditures or Commitments under (*Two Hundred* (\$200)) **Three Hundred** ((\$300)) dollars, or may refer such expenditures to the general membership.
  - B. Any expenditures or commitments over (*Two Hundred* (\$200)) **Three Hundred** (\$300) shall be brought to the general membership for vote.
- C. Transfer of funds from (the Operations fund to the Publications or Book fund) one fund to another shall be presented to the Board and approved by the general membership. (In addition, funds over those needed for publications may be transferred to the Book or Operations fund if approved by the membership.)

# 4. Librarian—procedures have changed over the years STANDING RULES <u>ARTICLE II</u>

Section 1 The position of Librarian may be held by one person or two, and may be assisted by a committee (*composed of at least three persons, or any odd-numbered amount of per sons over that*).

The Librarian(s) shall:

- A. solicit and collect through purchase and donation, genealogical, historical and biographical materials for the Society *and State libraries* (*library*).
- (C. keep custody of all library materials and equipment)
  (E. offer members the opportunity to order AGLL, microfilm or fiche either to rent or to purchase for their personal use, by establishing a procedure whereby such material may be ordered, by collecting the charges due, and by depositing with the treasurer any monies received; and by maintaining the AGLL catalog kept in the Genealogy Services Room at the Oregon State Library.)

#### STANDING RULES ARTICLE VII

Section 1 Library Policies:

D. In. accordance with the Society's agreement with the Oregon State Library, the Librarian(s) shall periodically transfer books from the Society Library to the State Library. Such books should be ones that first have been available to

members for research, and have not attracted circulation requests for a period of time. (Transfer of the books shall be made after a recommended list of such books has been prepared by the Librarian(s) and submitted to the Executive Board for approval.)

#### Section 3

- D. send information to the Newsletter editor each month regarding new periodicals
- the list of books that have been approved for transfer from the Society library to the Oregon State Library (a copy of such lists to be furnished to the Recording Secretary to be maintained in the Society's historical record file as well).
- F. Maintain the Society's collection of periodicals, newsletters, audiocassettes, microfiche, and research videotapes acquired by exchange, donation, and purchase
  - (*Bring*) **Display the collection and make** all materials **available at** (to) the Society's monthly meetings
- H. Help Society members
  - ( understand the types of indexes, catalogs, books, and the Society library
- -by making suggestions of books and periodicals where they may find information
- -by making suggestions of books and periodicals that may benefit the members and the Society for purchase)
- H. Help Society members <u>understand the types of indexes</u>, <u>catalogs</u>, <u>books</u>, <u>and the Society library by making</u> <u>suggestions of books and periodicals where they may find information and by making suggestions of books and periodicals that may benefit the members and the Society for purchase.</u>
