#### **Section One: Youth Leadership Forum Description**

CCDO and NeighborWorks® America recognize many Weed and Seed Communities rarely include youth representatives on the steering committee. For some sites, limited youth involved with the steering committee reflects an uncertainty regarding how to identify and engage youth. For others, concerns regarding the leadership skills of youth results in a decision to not solicit youth involvement. Most agree successful implementation and *sustainable* Weed and Seed youth initiatives require expanding the number of youth leaders in the community. The Weed and Seed infrastructure provides the ideal framework for building youth leadership capacity by providing youth with the tools and skills to become visible and engaged in the planning and execution of the overall strategy.

Building the base of youth leaders begins with creating a safe environment to engage in productive learning and dialog about leadership skills, community issues and the Weed and Seed framework. To assist sites across the country in expanding the pool of youth leaders, CCDO has contracted with NeighborWorks America to deliver an innovative, youth leadership and development training. Objectives to be achieved in conducting this training include:

- 1. Provide community youth with an understanding of what leadership means and how to assess their own leadership style, while also addressing some of the challenges associated with being a leader.
- 2. Help community youth leaders understand Weed and Seed, how it operates and its impact in the community.
- 3. Help community youth leaders explore new ways to become engaged in Weed and Seed to promote positive change for other youth and their families living in the community.

As part of the NeighborWorks Training Institute in Chicago, August 16- 21, 2009, up to six sites will be invited to bring a team of youth leaders (ages 16-19) to participate in a highly interactive leadership forum. Airfare, hotel and registration fees will be covered by NeighborWorks America. The Youth Leadership training will cover three days. Youth leaders, along with their chaperones, will participate in various training activities designed to build leadership skills while broadening the national pool of youth leaders involved in implementing Weed and Seed strategies.

#### **Criteria for selecting sites:**

- 1. Site must be in good standing with CCDO (to be verified by CCDO Program Managers and the U.S. Attorney's Office).
- 2. Site must provide evidence that local youth are currently involved in serving on either the Weed and Seed Steering Committee, subcommittee or ad hoc committee.
- 3. Site must provide examples of how youth have been engaged in the implementation of some aspect of the Weed and Seed strategy.
- 4. To ensure the maximum number of WSC participate in NeighborWorks training, sites that have not participated in either a place-based training or NeighborWorks Training Institute (NTI) in FY2009 will have a priority over other sites; however, all sites are strongly encouraged to apply.
- 5. Selected sites will be required to provide all necessary medical and permission documents.

### **Other Requirements**

- Neighborworks will be responsible for coordinating all airfare for selected site teams and cover housing and registration fees. All WSC teams will be expected to arrive in Chicago on Sunday, August 16, and depart August 20. No late arrivals or early departures are permitted.
- Sites must agree to send a team of four youth (ages 16-19) and one chaperone to the training.
- Youth participants must be residents in the Weed and Seed area, and in good standing with their school.
- All youth selected to attend the NTI must submit signed permission forms from parents/legal guardians to attend the training.
- All participants (youth and chaperone) must travel together.

Please note: all youth will be assigned double rooms. Adult chaperones will be assigned single rooms.
