



USACE Community Support Coordinators

- Army OneSource, launched Oct08 (subsidiary of Military OneSource):
 - 14 Baseline Services
 - 40 CSCs in the field
 - Available on web, handouts, magnets, etc.
- Communications TV commercials, magazines, word of mouth, training, etc.
- Recommendation for Action:
 - Look at 14 baseline actions to identify specific USACE objectives
 - CSCs are responsible





Where we are now:

- Job descriptions have been prepared
- Reviewing resumes now
- Expect to have on board 3rd qtr of FY09
- Provide training, i.e. Army & SERCO
- Prepare for HQ & field assignment (8 Divisions & TAC)





Success of CSCs would include:

- Ensure CSC and technical resources are constantly communicating, i.e., if website is updated, CSC needs to know
- Information stream needs to have ongoing efforts
- Ensure key people are trained during critical times, i.e., AFAP POCs





Major CSC responsibilities:

- Integrate Family Program Services and Community resources to provide direct support to families.
- Serve as primary liaison between deployee, families, USACE and communities.
- Personally engage to evaluate gaps in services and advise HQs / Commanders WRT Program requirements.





GAPs in current CSC Position Description:

- Expand 'injured' to 'casualty' for family travel/transportation assistance
- Communicate regularly with deployed employees
- Responsible for reimbursement logistics
- Foster relationship with deployee and family
- Establish communication with deployment Coordination Administrators
- Support re-entry recognition
- Coordinate reintegration training
- Provide Family Readiness support to HQ/DC Metro deployees (HQ Level Coordination)





USACE Army Family Action Plan

- Issue:
 - Appropriate Scaling USACE AFAP
- Recommendations for Action:
 - Finalize draft AFAP Regulation
 - CSC = MSC AFAP Coordinators (incl. training)
 - Modify USACE AFAP website
 - Ensure confidentiality
 - Direct issue referral to District POC
 - USACE form and DA form match





USACE Army Family Action Plan

- Recommendations for Action Cont.:
 - Quarterly issue solicitation and updates from District POCs
 - HQ-USACE mid-level review = small teams of delegates meet concurrent with WLC to make recommendations
 - 2009 AFAP results update
 - Corps enters "sweet 16"
 - Need a USACE-wide AFAP subject matter expert/resource list
 - Evaluate AFAP funding and manpower needs





USACE Family Readiness Network

- Vision Statement:
 - Building Strong Families
- Mission Statement
 - Establish a uniform Family Readiness Network strong enough to decrease family concerns in support of deployment.





USACE Family Readiness Network

 Goal 1: Institutionalize a sustainable level of funding, staff, technology and other support for the FRN

Objectives:

- Create an FRO and staff at Headquarters.
- Establish Division Community Support Coordinators.
- Establish and appropriate FRN budget.
- Establish USACE-wide Family Readiness Network.
- Clearly define roles and responsibilities of HQUSACE,
 Division, Districts, Centers and Labs.





USACE Family Readiness Network

 Goal 2: Establish USACE standard service requirements with additional augmentation at Division/Districts/Centers

• Objectives:

- Leverage Family Readiness best practices.
 - Develop a process to identify and share best practices in USACE and outside USACE
 - Partner with other military and non-military commands and agencies that have deployed employees.
- Establish baseline services for the USACE Family Readiness Network for specified funding support for families and those injured.





USACE Family Readiness Network

- Goal 3: Establish an effective Communication Process between employees, families, and USACE
- Objectives:
 - Develop a process to identify deployed employees and designated families and their locations in order to inform, educate, update, and respond to families.
 - Develop FRN communications and marketing resources to include family handbooks with customized information (hardcopy and web), and other resources such as magnets and links to other Army resources.
 - Develop a USACE standardized protocol for casualty management.
 Also, augment Department of Defense and Army guidance and assure effective dissemination of protocol thru a network of trained POCs.
 - Develop a two-way feedback process to identify needs and requirements (may include a survey) and deterrents to family readiness.





Family Readiness Workshop Objectives

- Develop family readiness program goals and objectives (and metrics if possible)
- Develop roles and responsibilities of Community Support Coordinators
- Enhance and expand partnerships with other agencies in family readiness
- Determine how to apply Army Family Action Plan in USACE
