(2) San Diego County District Attorney's Office, Gang Unit- provides funding to staff the Sheriff's crime laboratory with a dedicated National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN) technician trained to enter computerized images of fired cartridge cases and bullets from crime scenes. (3) Youth Gun Violence Reduction Initiative- 10 schools implement a Gun Safety Campaign to reduce youth access to firearms. (4) Handgun Violence Prevention Curriculum- implements a handgun violence prevention curriculum in eight after-school programs (5th through 8th grade) in neighborhoods where handgun violence has been identified as a problem, including the San Diego Police Department's Southeastern Division, a focus of the PSN Task Force. Of the PSN funded initiatives funded to date, approximately 31% has been devoted to juvenile programs with a specific focus on gangs. After completing an extensive review process, the Selection Committee identified five local initiatives that would serve as the fundamental building blocks of the Maryland PSN strategy. The Maryland jurisdictions that received FY 2003 PSN funding include Baltimore City, Prince George's County, Wicomico County, and Baltimore County. Many of the initiatives that were selected in FY 2003 have just begun to receive and expend their grant funding. While many of these programs have already begun to make an impact, it has been challenging to gauge each initiative's ultimate likelihood of success in such a short period. Based upon this premise, the PSN Task has decided that it would be most prudent to continue providing support to these programs in FY 2004, while continuing to evaluate the full impact of these interventions. After having identified which initiatives are working most effectively, with respect to reducing gun crime, the Task Force will make any future funding available on a competitive and meritorious basis - which a specific focus upon implementing replicable models of best practice. Such areas to be targeted include the City of Seattle, King County, Tacoma, Lakewood, Pierce, Kelso, Cowlitz, Bernton, and Kitsap counties. The FY 2004 PSN funding will also focus on prosecution and enforcement in targeted hot spot areas and media/community outreach regarding PSN activities and initiatives throughout the district.
