PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS: Alcohol is a factor in the four leading causes of death among persons ages 10-24: motor-vehicle crashes,

unintentional injuries, homicide, and suicide; and

WHEREAS: 9.7 million drinkers in the United States are between the ages of 12-20; and

WHEREAS: Alcohol is the most frequently used drug by high-school students in Oregon; and

WHEREAS: 37,700 youth in Oregon have a serious alcohol problem; and

WHEREAS: Young people in Oregon begin drinking, on average, at 13 years of age; and

WHEREAS: The average Oregon youth will see 100,000 beer commercials before he or she turns 18 – more than for

sneakers, gum and jeans; and

WHEREAS: 30.1% of Oregon eighth graders and 47.4% of Oregon eleventh graders reported regular alcohol use during

2005, with girls drinking at higher rates at both levels; and

WHEREAS: Young people in Oregon who begin drinking before age 15 are four times more likely to develop alcohol

dependence than those who begin drinking at age 21; and

WHEREAS: Alcohol abuse is linked to as many as two-thirds of all sexual assaults and date rapes of teens and college

students; it is a major factor in unprotected sex among youth, increasing their risk of contracting HIV or

other transmitted diseases.

NOW,

THEREFORE: I, Theodore R. Kulongoski, Governor of the State of Oregon, hereby proclaim April 2006 to be

ALCOHOL AWARENESS MONTH

in Oregon and encourage all Oregonians to join in this observance.
